Brian revealed to his audience the secret world of the spy pilot and what it was like to fly the fastest and highest flying aircraft in the world at speeds faster than a bullet at 80,000 feet over hostile territory.

Among the stories he told occurred near Los Angeles International Airport. Brian said he will always remember a certain radio exchange that occurred one day as Walter (my back-seater) and I were screaming across southern California 13 miles high. As I was thinking to myself how ripe a situation this was, I heard a familiar click of a radio transmission coming from my back-seater. It was at that precise moment I realized Walter and I had become a real crew, for we both were thinking in unison. "Center, Aspen 20... you got a ground speed readout for us?" There was a longer than normal pause. "Aspen, I show 1,742 knots." No further inquiries were heard on that frequency.

To SIR with love: Club for retirees a work in progress

When Dwight Eisenhower was president of the 48 United States and the San Francisco Giants were settling in for their first summer in Seals Stadium, a retired engineer named Damian Reynolds got together for lunch with three other retirees at the Clarimar restaurant in San Mateo.

Eisenhower and Reynolds are long gone, of course, as are the restaurant and the stadium. But just as the Giants have grown in popularity throughout Northern California over the decades, so has the legacy of the lunch.

When they got together on June 23, 1958, Reynolds suggested to friends Lorenz Hansen, Claus Hink and Wallace Plummer that they form a club for retired men like themselves, gathering once a month not for some grand purpose, but for a little camaraderie. The next lunch had nine men, then 18. Now their casual club is a nonprofit organization with 170 branches and about 27,000 members from Fresno to the Oregon border.

And although one early member suggested calling the group the League Of Aimless Fellows, they decided on Sons In Retirement — figuring that SIR was a heck of a lot better acronym than LOAF.

Even though men-only clubs have become almost extinct, demographics suggest that SIR will thrive. People in the large Baby Boom generation are starting to retire or at least cut back their hours, making them eligible for membership. There is no age limit; members simply can't hold full-time jobs.

"We run from the 40s to 100," said Bob Lillo, the president — officially called the Big Sir — of the original branch, named after Reynolds. SIR has seven branches in San Mateo County and 18 in Santa Clara County (11 in San Jose alone). Lillo said Santa Clara County is drawing even younger retirees from the erstwhile high-tech boom.

Many people look forward to retirement but then get bored with it, settling into unhealthy patterns of isolation and inactivity, said Lillo, a Hillsborough resident who worked as an orthopedic surgeon for 33 years before retiring in 1992

"I've known many an individual who retired and six months later was dead, "Lillo said. "They just lost their interest."

Lillo said the socializing helps people develop relationships and stay mentally sharp. "There's an old rule of medicine that I learned at Johns Hopkins during my training there: You use it or you lose it."

Although obviously there are exceptions, Lillo said that men don't tend to socialize as much away from work as women do, so the threat of feeling isolated after retirement is greater for them.

"They're really married to a second woman," he said, "and that's their career."

Inactivity and isolation have hardly been problems for Jim Wyatt of San Mateo, who wrapped up a 38-year career in

education in 1989, spending the final six years as vice chancellor of the San Mateo County Community College District. Wyatt still works part time as the game day operations coordinator for the San Francisco 49ers, supervising about 450 employees, including ushers and ticket takers.

When he was an administrator at Skyline College in San Bruno — he was president there from 1977 through 1983 — Wyatt was in the Daly City Rotary Club, which at the time was for men only. He argued against having such a restriction in a service club, but doesn't mind it in SIR because the club is not designed for business networking or public service.

"It's kind of nice to meet just with men," Wyatt said. "In Rotary or Kiwanis or Lions, you represent a certain kind of business or opportunity. If you didn't allow women in, they didn't get that opportunity."

SIR members have no dues or initiation fee. They simply pay for their own lunches, and many donate a couple of bucks a month to help with the club's expenses.

Lillo said that wives do get involved in his branch's gardening group, and are invited to SIR's various travel events, which range from seeing "The Lion King" in San Francisco to cruising China's Yangtze River. Some luncheon speakers have been women, including state Sen. Jackie Speier.

He said that besides its all-male membership, what separates SIR from many senior centers is that so many people stay involved for years in some of the club's activities, such as golfing, studying stocks and researching genealogy.

"There is a greater continuity of friendship," Lillo said. "We have fellows in the computer group who have been in it for 20 years."

But Wyatt said there's no pressure to be involved in a bunch of activities. "It's kind of low key. You can make of it what you want."

He hadn't even heard of SIR until he had left his career in education, and just joined because he wanted to play more golf. But he ended up getting more involved, becoming the organization's state president in 1999.

"It's been a wonderful outlet," said Wyatt, who has particularly appreciated the camaraderie in recent months; his wife of 52 years, Trudy, passed away in November. "I've made a number of new friends."

Golf was also the lure for San Mateo resident Mike Murphy, 66, who retired last year as an insurance attorney. The Damian Reynolds branch has weekly golf outings, and some members are still golfing into their 90s.

A few months after Murphy joined, the Golf Committee chairman stepped down, so he took over.

Murphy said that before he retired, he sometimes wondered if he would find enough activities to avoid being bored. But now he has caught himself saying, "I don't have time. I'm retired. I'm too busy."

Editors Note: Ray Lang of Damian Reynolds Branch 1 worked for over a year to get an article about SIR in the San Francisco Chronicle and recently, was successful. SIR – a Primer on its use

Use the word SIR incorrectly and you may make a gay rights organization angry by Sir Dwight Sale

When I first became involved with Sons In Retirement administration as Branch Secretary, I was never quite sure how to refer to either my fellow members or the organization in my written documents. I have not been able to find a good "guide" for this but have found little snippets of information here and there and will put them all together for your information.

"SIR" stands for "Sons In Retirement, Incorporated." Note that there are no periods. S.I.R. stands for a gay rights group in San Francisco and they do not want to be confused with us.

SIR can never be plural as there is only one "Sons In Retirement, Incorporated" even though "Sons" is plural. That is why we write "Sir" when referring to a member and not SIR as it makes no sense, in my opinion, to say he is a "Sons In Retirement, Incorporated."

The possessive would be: "I gave the SIR's Manual to John."

A single member reference is the most difficult for me. "John is a member of SIR " seems OK to me but "John is a SIR" meaning "John is a Sons In Retirement" is very awkward (probably because of the plural "Sons"). I suggest we say "John is a Sir." What this means is that "a member of SIR" is a "Sir."

A group of members would be: "Many Sirs gave their SIR's manuals to their Big Sirs."

"Sir" is also used as a courtesy title and serves to recognize the individual as a member of SIR. As an example: "Sir Dwight Sale wrote this Primer"

Combined: "SIR's activities include outings with many Branches of SIR having picnics to which Sirs' wives attend. At one picnic a Sir's brother came as a guest. Sir Dwight Sale furnished this information"

If you agree with this "Primer," great. If you don't agree, then let me know your suggestions/ideas. This "Primer" has no official sanction and I promise to never bring it up as a rule change.

About thirty-one years ago some members of Peralta Branch 12 came up with the idea of forming an amateur radio club within SIR. It became our first statewide activity and was shortly followed by golf and bowling. Today, nearly 200 SIR members are licensed radio amateurs and are part of over a million others around the world who enjoy this exciting hobby. The Sons In Retirement Amateur Radio Club... (SIRARC for short)... meets three times a year for a luncheon meeting and has its own newsletter which is published three times a year. Club Secretary, *Richard Shappee*, Mount Diablo Branch 8, says that SIRARC is a close-knit group because communication is our hobby and we are in contact with each other all the time.

Amateur radio has a proud tradition of providing emergency radio communication in time of need. During the 1989 earthquake, for example, amateur radio operators provided radio communications for the Red Cross Shelters and messages for persons separated from their loved ones. On 9/11, they provided thousands of hours of disaster related activities and they have regularly provided communication services to law enforcement and fire fighters. While most SIRARC members are beyond the age where they can be on the front lines, they are still active at their home radio stations in time of need.

SIRARC members enjoy making radio contact with other amateurs around the United States as well as all over the world. Becoming a licensed radio amateur is now easier than ever because it is no longer necessary to learn the Morse code.


Play Ball



Marathon Runner


Pete Angelides, Branch 59 Historian, ran the 26.2-mile Mayor's Midnight Sun Marathon, June 19, 2004 in

How to Honor an Outstanding Sir -- Make Him an HONORARY LIFE MEMBER

When you stop to think about it, you probably have a member — or two — who really makes your Branch function.

The HLM Certificate and Pin should be a surprise - bestowed in front of all the members. Greater appreciation results if his wife (who is in on the surprise) does the actual "pinning."



World War II, she made numerous voyages to various parts of the world and endured eleven trips across the

English Channel to the beaches of Normandy during the D-Day invasion.

After the war, like so many other ships, she was mothballed at Suison Bay, but thirty-three years later she was rescued from the scrap yard and brought to San Francisco for restoration.

The O'Brien is shown in the picture leaving San Francisco in 1994 on an epic voyage that took her through the Panama Canal and then across the Atlantic to England and France to participate in the 50th anniversary of the Allied invasion at Normandy.

Chet Robbins, the Public Relations Director of the Memorial, gave an exceptionally good presentation at a Branch 128 luncheon and informed members that the ship is open for tours on most days and there are several San Francisco Bay cruises scheduled each year. Dear Editor:

I receive Bulletins from all the branches in our area, and around this time of year, many are asking for someone to volunteer for Little Sir. The first thing I do, when I read this, is to look at the makeup of the Branch Directors. In most cases the Directors are almost all Past Big Sirs. A few years ago, our Branch had this same problem. Our solution was to ask all PBS (except the last Big Sir) to resign from the board. We then selected new Directors who were SIR members for 1 to 4 years (new blood). We told them that at some time they might be called upon to be our Little Sir. We had no problem filling these positions. We then sent the Directors to the State Training session. When we have nominations for new officers, we tell the Nominating Committee to look first at the Directors to fill the Little Sir vacancy. We also limit the PBS's term as Director to a maximum of two years. This allows us to select a new Director each year and have 2-4 years of training for our Little Sir. This has worked out great for our Branch and when we lost our Little Sir in the middle of the year, we had 4 directors ready to step in and assume his duties. This is by far the best idea our Branch has come up with since I've been on the Board.

Information Systems Committee (INFOSYS)

EDITORS NOTE:

This is the second in a series of articles to acquaint our members with some of the SIR Administrative functions. This article tells about the Information Systems Committee and its five subcommittees. We hope our readers find this series interesting, as well as informative.

Good communication is important in any organization and communication within our organization has not always been as effective as we would have liked. Branch information is communicated pretty well within the branch and most of the time the information gets out to the members. On the other hand, information sharing from the State to our 160 Branches, has always been a daunting task so, in 2003 President *Jim Faverman*, gathered up the disparate groups involved in SIR communication and formed INFOSYS, which is composed of a five member standing committee, with five sub-committees.

The following is a brief outline of committee functions:

Website:

Our Webmaster, *Bill Winslow*, continues to improve our website. Sirinc.org is the home page for the general public. Candidates interested in becoming members can communicate directly with the Database Manager, and more than 200 new members, including 80 this year, have done just that. The members section, sirinc.org/sirforms, contains documents of interest to our members, including such items as, forms, the State Roster, the Rule Manual, plus much more.

Database:

The SIR Database currently contains the names of all those who have served as SIR Officers and Committee Chairman since 1974 and all Branch Officers since 1994, as well as Branch Corporate information. Today there are 5647 names in the State Database and the Database Manager is making the program more "user friendly" for the many SIR administrators that find the database quite useful in helping them carry out their responsibilities.

Email:

You may have received this copy of "Happenings" through our email system. Currently there are 1931 email addresses in the database and every Branch is represented.

State Roster:

This very useful document is the responsibility of the Second Assistant Secretary, *Gary Gruber*. Gary inputs the information for each new year, as well as all the updates during the year, into the database which then produces the roster.

State Forms:

This sub-committee was added in 2004, with **Len Stohler** as its Chairman. Len, under the direction of the Rules Committee and the approval of the Executive Committee, produces the forms in both an electronic and hard-copy format. The electronic format is sent to the Webmaster for inclusion in the forms section on the website and the hard-copy version is sent to the Supplies and Printed Forms Chairman for distribution.

State Newsletter:

"SIR Happenings" is a quarterly publication with the first two editions a huge success. **Don MacGregor** and **John Skarpelos** are doing a superb job of putting all the news together in this great publication. They will be joined by **John Mahafy** in 2005. More and more information is flowing in from the Branches as they become more aware of "Happenings." It is distributed to all 1931 SIRS with email addresses in our database and we hope more members will ask to have Happenings emailed directly to them.

Doctronics:

This Committee's vigorous pursuit of "electronic distribution" has resulted in eliminating the costly and time-consuming task of distributing hard copies of the State Rule Manual and State Roster. Instead, both documents are now available on the SIR website and *Gary Gruber* is in charge of publishing and updating all these documents.

INFOSYS' purpose is to make SIR communications as effective as possible. We are most interested in your comments and suggestions. Every comment gets answered, even the negative ones. Send them to dwight.sale@comcast.net

This helps to bring the members back month after month and makes them feel good about bringing a guest to an exciting meeting.

ACTIVITIES! This one word says it all. No SIR branch can survive without an array of interesting activities that invite participation. In Branch 8 there are too many to write about each one, but the current list includes:

BARBEQUE; BOCCE BALL; BOOK GROUP; BRIDGE (Rubber); BRIDGE (Duplicate); CRIBBAGE; DOMINOES; EXPLORE AND EAT (local touring, sightseeing & lunch); GOLF; WALKING; I.Q. BUNCH (single men's dinner); LET'S DINE OUT (couples dinner group); PINOCHLE; POKER; THEATER FEST (attend local theater production); TRAVEL; HIKING and MOVIE GROUP. These are not just activity names on a sheet. Each has a large number of participants. Some suffer from growing pains; some have to limit attendance; others have expanded from one to two, three or more days a month. There is virtually something going on almost every day of the week and every week of the year.

Area 2 has a number of activities that include participants from other branches. These are all very popular and we promote and have many Branch members who participate in those Area activities such as BOWLING; COMPUTER USERS; FISHING; GOLF, POOL (billiards); SUMS IN RETIREMENT (financial/investments); and TRAVEL.

The luncheon accomplishes some communications BUT the primary means to tell our membership what is happening is thru the *HOTLINE*. It includes articles about the branch, next month's speaker, and details on **every** activity - including what was done last month and the plans for the coming month. We constantly remind members to bring guests and they do (an average of 6 per month). The *HOTLINE* is an excellent newsletter and it just keeps getting better. The result is the members look forward to receiving it, reading it cover to cover, and getting involved in the activities. And wives read it to find out about the activities in which they participate.

WEBSITE. This isn't one of the key elements that currently make up a successful branch, but it is the wave of the future. Branch 8 has created the position of Web Master and he is currently working to polish up our site. We recently installed on-line golf sign up capability and the members love it.

SO LET'S SUM IT UP — you need an active SIR area, interested and involved members who are willing to accept a leadership role, a good newsletter for communications, well balanced and interesting luncheon programs with good speakers, and plenty of activities that provide something of interest for everyone with a number of them involving spouses and of course...an activity coordinator to help them along.

State SIRARC

SIR Amateur Radio Club Richard Shappee, Secretary

Members of the Sons In Retirement Amateur Radio Club (SIRARC) enjoy many aspects of their hobby. Some participate in Emergency Services, ready to provide communications for the Red Cross, hospitals and inter-city communications between police departments at times of emergency. Others enjoy talking to fellow hams in foreign countries and adding to the number of countries they have contacted. There are more than 300 countries with amateur radio operators and many amateurs in the United States have contacted all of them. Still others like to construct their own equipment and learn more about the technical side of their hobby. Many amateurs use their radio transmitting privileges to participate in another hobby, flying radio-controlled aircraft.

What do radio amateurs need in order to enjoy their hobby? First of all they need a readily obtained U.S. Government license. Upon receipt of this document, the "ham" operator has an official radio call sign. In the United States the call sign consists of letters, a number and more letters. The number roughly identifies where the amateur is located (if he does not move). For example, all California stations include the numeral "6". My call sign is W5HQJ.



The "W" portion dates back to the early days of government issues of licenses. The "5" indicates that I received my license in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Mississippi, Arkansas or Louisiana. If you live in Hawaii, you will have a prefix of KH6. Other Islands

have other unique designations. The last letters in the call sign are assigned in alphabetical order.

In addition to a license, amateurs need a transmitter, a receiver and an antenna. Depending upon how much one wishes to invest, the equipment can be quite inexpensive. As one becomes more involved and active in the amateur world, one may choose to make a substantial investment in equipment. It is up to the individual.

Amateur radio is different from Citizens Band radio (CB) in that licenses are earned, not awarded, and the community of amateurs self-regulates its members to insure that abuses are kept to a minimum. Because the amateur operator is able to transmit with significant power, amateurs are able to talk world wide rather than community wide, as is the case for CB.

From Movie Actor to Pilot ...This Sir has enjoyed Quite a Life

Brad Slaven, who is a member of Rossmoor Branch 81, gave a very interesting talk to his fellow members about his life as an actor and his war experiences.

He began a movie career in 1929 at the age of 6 or 7, as one of the many kids in the "Little Rascals" movies. He played several kids pictures and then one of the big directors at the Hal Roach Studios said of him... "Boy, with all those freckles and that mop of curly hair, he's a regular little "Buster." "...So, Brad was stuck with that nickname for many years. He then graduated to better films with lines of dialogue with such actors as Spencer Tracy, John Wayne, Mickey Rooney, Jane Withers, and Clark Gable.

In 1942, Brad joined the Army Air Corps as an Aviation Cadet. After completing his flight training, he volunteered for fighter pilot school and became a pilot of the great P47 Thunderbolt. He flew this plane during the battle of the Bulge, in 1944 over Germany, dive bombing and strafing




with its eight .50 caliber machine guns. On His 36th mission, Brad was shot down and was a wounded POW in Germany until about May of 1945.

Shortly after returning to the States, Brad went back to movie acting, playing mostly Western bad guys, doing his own horseback riding and stunts. He also played speaking parts in some nonwestern pictures like the, "Ghost and Mrs. Muir" and "Mother Wore Tights."

The movie business got a little slow in 1950, so, he became

a copilot for the old "Western Air Lines" and flew for them for 30 years, the last 10 or 12 as a Captain on the San Francisco-Hawaii run in the Boeing 707 ... with that choice run, you can see why Brad hated to retire when he reached age 60.

Brad is now enjoying 12 years of retired life in Rossmoor and would be willing to talk to other Branches if the time and situation could be arranged. His number is 925-935-5322.

Air cargo is surging at the FedEx Western Region Sort Facility with 100 FedEx flights in and out each day on average. Oakland is now the center for all FedEx air freight west of the Rockies, with 1,600 employees working day and night, hurrying cargo through the sprawling 350,000 square foot facility to and from the aircraft gates and truck docks.

FedEx Strategic Market Manager, Tom Shaddle, told a Branch 60 audience that FedEx has the world's largest all-cargo air fleet. Last year FedEx carried scheduled air freight to more than 210 countries, flying nearly 500,000 miles every 24 hours, while its couriers logged another 2.5 million miles every day, equivalent to 100 trips around the world.







This Sir Always Wanted to Build His Own Airplane

Sir Wayne Bonesteel has many interests in life, especially his family, golf, and Sons In Retirement. But



ranking right up there with the others is his love of flying. He took ground school and flying lessons back in 1991 at the airport in San Martin, soloed in a 2-place Cessna after about 20 hours of dual instruction, and earned his private license within the year. Over the years, he went in and out of airplane ownership twice, before deciding to try building one at home.

He looked into several home-built types, and settled on the Van's Aircraft 2-place model RV-4. He chose an engine that develops 150 horsepower and enables him to break wind at over 200 miles an hour ... although Sir Wayne claims he is not a speed demon by nature. The new plane is a "tail dragger" (most are tricycle) so Wayne started lessons toward FAA certification in this type of aircraft.

It was a big day in 1997 when the kit arrived and he and his wife Terri said goodbye to their garage for a while. Over the next couple of years he worked on the assembly of the fuselage and wings (separately). Storing the parts during construction was a problem, so tail sections, rudders, ailerons, elevators, flaps and other items were under the beds and leaning against the walls inside the house and on the patio. When two hands weren't enough Terri pitched in, especially as Rosie the Riveter. Wayne admits to making several mistakes that he had to scrap and re-do, such as the time he tripped and stepped on the vertical tail and ruined it.

Eventually it came time to move it all to a hanger at a nearby airport for attaching the wings, installing flight instrumentation and applying the finishing touches. It took





about three years, until mid-2000, to assemble the aircraft from start to finish. After FAA certification, came the most important day of all when it was time to see if this thing would actually fly. Terri stayed on the ground with radio in hand, while Wayne went aloft in the new RV-4. All went well, and he has been flying regularly since. He goes back and forth to his old Bay Area haunts and flight time from the local airport is an hour and fifteen minutes. Terri flies with him sometimes, but little screams can be heard from the rear seat when they hit the thermal bumps in the summertime.

When not logging hours in his pride and joy, Sir Wayne still manages to get in a couple of rounds of golf most weeks and rarely misses a Branch luncheon meeting where he has been a member since 1996. At the January meeting, he was

Draft: While we would have preferred not having a 2 win, 14-loss record last year, it does provide us with the # 1 pick in the entire draft and in all subsequent rounds. Assuming we manage these choices wisely, we should be able to acquire some very talented players.

Players: There have been two significant additions to this point. While speaking to Branch 5 in Palo Alto recently, I was asked what position I thought we should concentrate on with the 1st pick in the draft. I answered ...offensive left tackle, because pass protection from that position is vital to the success of any quarterback, so, I was delighted to see that we acquired Jennings, who had been outstanding with Buffalo for many years. I was disappointed when we lost Peterson, our place kicker, to Atlanta because he had been one of our few bright spots last season. That setback was offset by our acquisition of Joe Nedney who, if fully recovered from injury, will prove to be a most capable replacement.

Free Agency: Our losses to this point have been minimal and nothing like what occurred the previous year. I keep hearing about some possible new acquisitions and I am hopeful some of these will come to fruition. We do not have the severe CAP problems of previous years and there is at least the possibility of our becoming active in acquiring free agents that would improve the team.

Injuries: There is no question that we were hard hit by injuries last year. With the return of Newberry to center, and Julian Petersen, Plummer and Webster, healthy, this should help in bringing about a turnaround in our wonloss record.

Administration: In spite of the criticism by the media, I am convinced Dr. York is serious about doing what is necessary to return us to past glories. He has spent huge amounts of money replacing the coaching staff and the Director of Player Personnel. I believe he has all the parties pulling together with the purpose of restoring pride in the organization and achieving success on the field.

I am looking forward to my 54th season with the Niners with renewed enthusiasm and hope. I have set no timeline



on how long I will remain in my present capacity. While I recognize that the 49ers may make that determination on their own, I know that I will realize when it is no longer rewarding or that I cannot carry out my duties appropriately. In the

meantime, I continue to view my work as an important and a satisfactory way to spend my retirement.

The Day World War II Ended

Hats OFF to all those Sirs who'll be marking the 60th Anniversary of V-J Day

If you were a member of our Armed Forces in World War II, you have good reason to celebrate on August 14th—the day back in 1945 that hostilities ceased.

We must have hundreds and hundreds of Sirs in our 168 Branches who served our country honorably and well, including...

Charles "Chuck" Moore on V-J Day was in Sookerating, India, where he had flown more than 100 missions "over The Hump." Post-war he commanded an air base at Bucharest ...where he met and married his wife Marta in 1947. They happily reside in Foster City. Chuck served 24 years, retiring as Colonel, U.S. Air Force.

Jim Wyatt, our SIR State President in 1999, graduated from San Francisco's Polytechnic High in June 1945 ...and quickly volunteered for the Navy. He was first based in San Diego and then at Great Lakes Naval Training Station. And he recalls exactly how long he served ..."11 months and 8 days!"

Dwight Sale, State President in 2001 and Chairman of our State Information Systems Committee, volunteered – as a teenager – for the Army AIR Corps Aviation Cadet Program in 1944. He trained at some famous flight schools: Kelly Field at San Antonio, Mather Field in Sacramento, and Luke Field near Phoenix. But the program came to a halt in 1945. Again a civilian, Dwight then enrolled at Stanford.

Navy pilot **Ned Broyles** won his wings at Pensacola in 1937, when they were still flying tail-dragger biplanes off dirt landing strips. He flew countless missions in the Pacific, retiring as Captain, U. S. Navy, after twenty years of service.

Stan Harris, our State Certificate Chairman, had completed his senior year at Elk Grove High, south of Sacramento, when the Navy ordered him to forego his graduation ceremony ...and report for duty immediately in May, 1945! He was stationed at San Pedro and shortly before V-J Day "invaded" Catalina Island on a training mission.

I have written an extensive trip report regarding our itinerary, experiences, observations and my own personal feelings. However it is much too lengthy to be included in this column. I strongly recommend that you read the report because it gives a brief glimpse of southern China which is totally different from the tourist places in China, such as the Great Wall, Forbidden City, the Terra Cotta Soldiers, etc.

We are moving forward with our golf tournaments in Ixtapa, Mexico on November 2nd – 9th, and November 9th – 16th. As of today, we are 3/4 full. If you wish to participate, you may call Golden Gate Tours at (800) 874-4345 or by going to their web site at www.ggtours.com and click on "SIR Golf". You may register online.

Entry forms for the tournament in Solvang on September 11th to 15th and the open play at Poppy Hills on November 1st and 2nd have been posted on the SIR Golf web page. At our last committee meeting in May, we finalized and approved the weeks of March 27th – 31st and April 3rd – 7th for the Las Vegas Tournaments. We will again stay at the Palace Station Hotel and Casino and will be golfing at the two courses (Sun and Snow Mountain) at the Las Vegas Paiute Golf Resort and the Painted Desert Golf Course. Some consideration was given to extending the tournament week by one day to break up the three days in a row of golfing, but the Committee decided that the membership would not appreciate the extra cost of an additional night's lodging.

Amazing Singing GroupBob Keldgord, Past Big Sir Branch 33

Sacramento's Country Club Branch 33 is probably unique in that it has, for more than 34 years, sponsored a men's chorus which annually performs before some 7,000 persons at more than 70 venues, including performances at the California State Fair. The group, known as the Country Club Aires, regularly appears before audiences of 288-308 persons at local hotels, community centers, lodges, and restaurants, as well as before groups of 58 or so in area retirement centers. All performances are in the Greater Sacramento Area.

The Aires feature those songs which are longtime favorites -- sometimes with a sentimental flair. Except for July, when the group is on vacation, a new program of songs is presented each month, usually in an hour long format. The performers range in age from 63 to 95! The average age is 78!

The "moving force" behind the organization is Sir **Clyde Kidd**, the Director and in addition to his duties with Branch 33, also directs the choir for a large Sacramento church. The group includes some fifty persons, including seven musicians who play in the Aire's own band, plus an announcer in the person of PBS **Bob Keldgord**, a criminologist, who retired in 1995 as Sacramento's Chief Probation/Parole Officer, and worked as a broadcaster during his undergraduate days at the University of California at Berkeley.

Several members of the choir are featured soloists, and others provide "novelty" numbers ...among them is Sir **John Giles**, who regularly delights audiences as "Professor Johann Stumpf" with his "Stumpf Fiddle". Also frequently featured is Sir **Gary Goodenough** who is blind, but who nevertheless shares his many talents as a musician, vocalist, and composer; his specialty being Country and Western music and he was recently inducted into a Country and Western Hall of fame. Another frequently featured, crowdpleasing performer is banjoist, Sir **Glenn Lee**, who formerly played professionally in Southern California.

One additional performer that should be mentioned is the poet laureate, Sir **John Sidebotham**, who regularly composes and recites poetry that is appropriate for the particular program. In addition, Sidebotham, regularly designs displays for the group that feature the songs that are performed during the concert.

Director **Clyde Kidd** is assisted in the administration of the organization by PBS, and HLM **Fred Stallcop**, who serves as Business Manager. Sir **Bob Fitzgerald** publishes the group's schedule and roster, and works with Sir **Don Sparks**, in handling the Aire's sound system.

Without exception, the most popular member within the ranks of the performers is an individual who is not a member of SIR. She is **Jean Weathers**, an extraordinarily talented pianist who is the senior member of the band ... Jean has been accompanying the Aires for almost 16 years!

While most of the performers are members of Branch 33, some ten vocalists are members of other SIR Branches in the Greater Sacramento area.

out.





When the first bomb struck, Hal recalls, "I could throw a stone from where I was standing and hit one of the Battle Wagons lined up in Battle Ship Row." He will never forget that Sunday

morning. Hal retired from the Navy after serving for 20 years.

He lives on the edge of the world. His back door opens onto the wild lands of a deep canyon which contains the Mokelumne river. Near his home over the past 27 years, Hal has built two main trails – The River Trail and the Quail Ridge Trail. These two main arteries split off into 30 other trails, some more difficult to hike than others and many with tremendous views of the Mokelumne River Canyon with its pines, oaks, wild flowers, deer and eagles. Walking

down one of the many trails that Hal built, is like exploring another world.

Hal is a picture of health. At age 87, he spends time nearly every day on one of the trails, building and repairing bridges, fixing slide-out areas, enjoying the wild flowers, or taking people on one of his guided tours. For either groups or



individuals, he charges nothing and simply likes to show people the wild life. It is also a challenge to keep up with him as he moves swiftly along, naming trees, flowers, or birds. San Jose Branch 10



Writer Brings Princess Diana's Message to SIR

When **Susan Maxwell Skinner** recently addressed Branch 50, **Al Walton**, Big Sir of the branch, described the author/speaker's presentation as "one of the most outstanding messages it has been my pleasure to hear."

Maxwell Skinner, who was part of Princess Diana's 1980's press entourage, shared anecdotes of eight years in royal coat tails. Most importantly, here audience learned that Diana inspired the speaker's own community service and why the Princess – almost eight years after her death—



remained a relevant role model to those who share Diana's zeal for bringing light to people's lives. "She thought that feeling unloved was the worst disease. She worked to show affection where it was most needed," said the author, who is now married to a Californian and lives in Carmichael.

"Diana always crusaded for love, despite jealousy from those around her. As the world's most high-profile celebrity, she showed the famous they should use celebrity to aid the downtrodden. After she died, 42 nations signed a treaty against landmines, in tribute to her work for limbless children in war zones. Despite her own fractured youth and unhappy marriage, Diana is proof that with love in her heart—*one woman can make a difference.*"

The speaker also detailed how Diana changed the face of the British monarchy forever. "Through the confidence she gained from being a hands-on mum, Diana prototyped a warmer kind of royalty. Though they railed against her populism, the Royal Family learned much from Diana." Prince Charles now visits AIDS hospices, notes

the royal historian. Princes William and Harry's budding humanitarianism show that 16 years of Diana's tutelage has shaped their lives, for good.

"She was not a saint," conceded Susan. "Diana acknowledged her mistakes. But gossip about a woman's private life should not trivialize her legacy for humanity."

In her 40-minute address, Diana's champion cautioned her audience: "Unkind gossip often contains some fact. But salacious stories are often lavishly embroidered. Diana showed poor judgment in those she trusted and she can't defend herself any more. People can run to the press with any half-truth. And they do."

Not this speaker, who wants her mentor celebrated for a commitment to motherhood and community service. "And mostly, for the fascination and joy she brought to the world," adds Susan. "Remember Diana for that. She changed my life. She inspired my volunteer service (Maxwell Skinner is active in Sacramento). Diana can still motivate people."

Frank Falzon, a retired San Francisco Police Homicide Inspector, who compiled a remarkable record during his 28 years on the force, recently gave an entertaining talk to our Branch. As an Inspector, he handled some of the City's most notorious cases ...He was the lead Inspector in the Zebra murders, the Zodiac case and was directly responsible for the arrest of Richard Ramirez, "the Night Stalker," and David Carpenter, "the Trailside Killer," as well as Dan White for the murder of George Moscone and Harvey Milk. Falzon was named Policeman of the Year in 1972, and received the Gold Medal of Honor, SFPD's highest award.

Frank's topic was "The Lighter Side of Homicide:" Even so, we expected to hear some pretty macabre incidents; after all, 28 years in Homicide, might be expected to make a person pretty hardened and cynical about human suffering ...but, Frank's anecdotes were about his reactions to situations as a human being. For example, his story of approaching a crime scene in a playground in San Francisco, where he had played baseball, football, and basketball as a youngster. With old reminiscences running through his head, when asked by an officer on the scene how they should handle matters, he tells his partner "You cover right field," and to another "You take left field, while I cover center field." At which point another officer said, "Frank, maybe it's time to consider retirement."

Busy Private Pilot

Jim Hager of Alameda put a positive spin on things in a recent talk to Isle City Branch 60. The former professional photographer said that, because of the resolve that he and his wife, Bonnie, had to help others, it helped softened the blow of her unexpected death six years ago.

When she collapsed at their home from a brainstem blood clot, it was at first devastating for him and their sons ... "But," he said, "Bonnie and I had both signed up long before as organ donors and so it turned into a way for her to help save the lives of other people ... she did not die in vain." Four of her organs were rushed to operating rooms where anxiously waiting patients, all near death, experienced the miracle of a second chance.

The then 60 year old pilot found it "such a positive experience that I decided I had some skills that I could use to help other people." Now he is a volunteer pilot for the Northern California Organ Transplant Network, zooming off whenever needed—often in the middle of the night, since time is of the essence—frequently to small airstrips in communities off the beaten commercial airline track.

It can get pretty exciting, he says, including the night he and co-pilot *Jackie Kirschner* rushed two kidneys to UCLA Medical Center on September 11, 2001. "It was the eeriest night I've ever experienced in my entire flying career," he recalls. They were given a special emergency permit to make the flight and found themselves totally alone—the only civilian or commercial plane, in an otherwise empty sky—everyone else was grounded!

Hager also uses his abilities as a pilot in other volunteer activities—locally and elsewhere—including an impoverished village in Baja California, where he helps young people pursue educational opportunities. In some cases, the emphasis is on studies leading to meaningful careers in aviation. In these endeavors, he uses some of the resources of his family charity, the Hager Hangar Club Foundation. In addition, he serves in an advisory capacity on the scholarship program of the National (Tuskegee) Airmen's Foundation.

The Jeeterbug Crew: Mission over Iwo Jima

John Weller, Branch 141, was the navigator on a B-24 during the latter part of World War II. The story of his plane and its crew is the subject of a PBS documentary, recently aired on KCSM, San Mateo. "The Jeeterbug Crew: Mission over Iwo Jima" tells how the plane was forced to land on that tiny island after its #2 engine had been knocked out by anti-aircraft fire during a night bombing mission over Chichi Jima.



As the battle for Iwo raged below, the Jeeterbug's radio operator tried to make contact with troops on the ground, but failed. Suddenly a Black Widow (P-61) fighter appeared, its lights trained on the B-24. After confirming that the bomber was not an enemy aircraft, the pilot gave the Jeeterbug permission to land on the island's unlighted air-strip.

At that moment—a miracle happened—U.S. forces called for a cease-fire until the plane was able to land. "If I can call something beautiful in war, this was it," says Weller. "The fighting actually stopped!" When it resumed...all hell broke loose and the crew had to stay inside the plane until daybreak.

Then came another challenge ...how to rebuild the damaged engine, so, it could be flown back to Saipan, its home base. Fortunately for the crew, Marines were flying injured soldiers to hospitals on other islands, and were somehow able to find a rebuilt engine, which they brought back to Iwo Jima. Once the Jeeterbug's crew had installed it, the plane was ready for takeoff ...two days after the emergency landing.

The Jeeterbug and its crew went on to complete 38 missions before the war ended. According to Weller, the greatest thing about the experience was the bond that developed between the men. "We learned trust and responsibility", he says. "We were responsible for each other's lives."

Several years ago, John Weller had a chance encounter with retired photo-journalist Charles Sullivan, who asked to see some old 8-millimeter film that had been shot by the crew. Sullivan then contacted San Jose State University journalism professor Grace Provenzano, who convinced PBS station KCSM to make the documentary. Recently, six of the remaining members of the Jeeterbug crew, gathered at Santa Clara University to enjoy the premiere of the filmnearly 60 years after their remarkable story took place.

Theodore "Dutch" Van Kirk was the navigator on the famous B-29 Bomber, "The Enola Gay," on the first atomic bombing mission to Hiroshima and he was recently a guest speaker at a Branch 7 luncheon. He told the audience that



they took off from Tinian on that eventful day on a mission that was to be just over 12 hours. The plane had been stripped down, with no guns, except at the tail and they flew the mission at about 30,000 feet. They encountered no flak, no enemy aircraft and had no real glitches of any kind...navigation was right to the target, they had no visibility restrictions and Dutch said it was probably the most

uneventful mission he'd ever flown...and he had flown a lot of missions during his career.

The bomb they dropped was a gun sight type, in that black powder was used to drive two batches of uranium together to reach critical mass...the only bomb of its type ever used. All others were plutonium implosion-type bombs. After releasing the bomb and executing a hard turn away from the drop zone, they were buffeted by two strong shock waves that initially felt like bursts of flak. Looking back, they could see the mushroom cloud rising above them, but couldn't see anything on the ground because it was obscured by smoke.

Dutch answered the philosophical question—"did we have to drop the bomb?"—by saying that it ended the war; that even though Japan was a defeated country, with its navy and air force all but destroyed, it still had a huge army and an invasion would have cost thousands and thousands of more lives...on both sides. Hiroshima had many military targets that had never been bombed, including a major military headquarters. The Japanese regularly sited military and related manufacturing facilities in their populated areas, so, collateral damage was unavoidable. The cities selected as possible targets --Hiroshima, Nagasaki and others—were chosen because they had never been bombed before, and the U.S. wanted to be sure that whatever damage was caused was clearly attributable to the atomic weapon and not prior bombings. Kyoto had once been on the target list, but was dropped because of its religious and cultural importance.

His talk had the rapt attention of the audience and drew lots of good questions. A Branch 7 member, *Herb Swasey*, was also a member of the 509th, and brought in several easels with photos, along with newspaper reports of the time—a nice supplement to Dutch's talk.

Tony Perrone qualified for submarine service straight out of high school in Connecticut in 1941. Transferred west to Mare Island Naval Station, he met a girl named Marian. After returning from combat duty in the Pacific, he and Marian were married. Tony enrolled at San Francisco State, later became principal of Cabrillo School, and never went "Back East" (except to visit!).

John Barber, our State Chaplain and Parliamentarian, went directly from ROTC at the University of Wisconsin into the Army following Pearl Harbor. He served in the Selective Service System in the Pentagon and later, at the request of General Omar Bradley, as CEO of the Veterans Administration in Wisconsin. He retired as a Colonel, U.S. Army, in 1970, after 33 years of service to his country.

Editors Comment: Ray Lang, the author of this column, saw lots of action during WWII, piloting a B-24 Bomber in the CBI theater of operations (China-Burma-India). Flying 62 missions from June 1944 until July 1945 ...half of those missions were over the "hump," Ray returned to the States via Calcutta, Karachi, Cairo, Casablanca, the Azores, Bermuda, and finally arrived in Miami on August 6th, the day the first "A-bomb" was dropped." He figured that after 30 days of R&R he would probably be sent back into combat in the Pacific ...but, the boys in the Manhattan Project changed all that and he is grateful to Harry Truman for his decision to use the A-Bomb, which ended the war and probably saved his life.

Ray learned to fly in "The Mighty Stearman," as he calls it, and is shown in this recent picture admiring one that has been beautifully restored.






State RV Column

Aviation Pioneer

"Clear left -- Clear right" ... were the words heard thousands of times by guest speaker Richard Atherton Bridgeford. Those words continue to echo in his mind as he remembers instructing more than 7,000 students during in his long flying career.

Dick Bridgeford truly is an icon in the history of flying ...proficient in more than 100 different aircraft ...ranging from the Interstate Cadet to the Lear Jet. He has also piloted six different helicopters, five gliders and three seaplanes. He founded the Bridgeford Flying Service in Napa and then operated the flight service at Stockton Metropolitan Airport for more than 20 years.

Bridgeford spoke about chronicling his experiences in a book titled, "Flying the High Life," which he wrote and dedicated to the thousands of fellow pilots. In the book, he told of one of his more spine-chilling experiences involving an incident at San Francisco International Airport: "Following normal procedures at SFO, I requested clearance to taxi and takeoff on runway 28 Right. Takeoff and climb were normal and I then executed a right turn to my assigned direction of flight to Stockton, as directed by the tower. At 1900 feet — while still climbing — I was suddenly hit hard by a Pacific Southwest Airlines, Boeing 727. The impact was

something that is very difficult to describe ...the PSA aircraft was on my right side and had crashed into my Cessna 182. The noise was tremendous



— frightening — and indescribable! The belly of the PSA aircraft appeared close to my windshield and I experienced a terrible blast of noise and air turbulence from the other aircraft. His belly was right in my windshield and I was in danger of losing control —and then—all of a sudden—he was gone. My propeller and engine were still operating, but lateral control was reduced because my right wing was so heavily damaged and my aileron was also badly mangled, with most of it gone ...so, I only had a few moments to react. I desperately needed to compose myself and negotiate a safe landing back at SFO. The tower told me to land on any runway that I could and I somehow made it in successfully ...I had instantly become famous, for all the wrong reasons."

He wrapped up his interesting talk by saying "I could go on and on, but these are just a few of the great experiences I have had as a 91 year old pilot and few people are privileged to view life from so many different perspectives, while truly …"Living the High Life."

Sirs and their Flying Machines Chuck Roberts, Social Activities Chairman

A small group of us from Branch 125 recently drove over to Moffett Field for a guided tour of their Historical Society Museum. We were guided through the museum by docents and found it most interesting. We saw lots of artifacts from WWII ranging from, aircraft, uniforms, weapons, and much more. There is even a unique scale model of the USS Macon Dirigible on display.

Two Dirigibles — the USS Macon and the USS Akron — were housed in Hanger One during the early 30's and had the mission of patrolling the waters off the West Coast, but unfortunately, both crashed. The Field is named after Admiral William A. Moffett, who perished with 72 others, in the crash of the USS Akron. These rigid airships were replaced by non-rigid blimps, which flew from Moffett until 1947, when P-3 Orion sub-hunters took over their mission.

After our interesting tour of the museum and the gift shop, we went over to the airstrip and were able to climb up into two famous WWII aircraft ...a B-24 and a B-17. Two of our Sirs were particularly interested in the aircraft. **Bob Stephens**, because he had logged over 1200 hours in a B-24 in the early 1940's and long time Branch 125 member, **Phil Olavarri**, who piloted 35 missions out of Italy during WWII in a B-17. We found that both planes were very confining — no doubt partly due to our expanding waistlines — but very interesting to see. We were even offered a flight in either aircraft — for 400 bucks — but declined the offer.

Tours of the museum require a \$2 "voluntary" donation and are conducted Wednesdays through Fridays, from 10 A.M. to 2 P.M. Reservations are required and can be made by calling (650) 603-9827

Global Hawk

Early morning headlines read: *Pilot Dies, as U.S. Spy Plane Crashes in Southwest Asia* ... Manned aircraft have been used for reconnaissance from the First World War to this day. These reconnaissance missions are generally performed by standard combat aircraft modified to carry cameras, or by light utility aircraft with observers using binoculars to survey the terrain. With the turn of the century, a new type of very sophisticated aircraft called an Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (UAV) has saved countless lives and is now an important source of reconnaissance.

Lt Colonel Craig Morris — Chief of Wing Plans and Programs at Beale Air Force Base — spoke to a Branch 37 luncheon about the amazing UAV, called the Global Hawk, and its impact on modern warfare. This versatile unmanned aircraft is being used extensively in both Afghanistan and Iraq, providing battlefield commanders with near real-time, high resolution imagery. The Global Hawk can carry out reconnaissance missions at a "loiter altitude" of 65,000 feet — without endangering a pilot — while conducting surveillance over an area the size of Illinois.

In April 2001, the Global Hawk made aviation history, when it completed the first non-stop flight across the Pacific Ocean by an unmanned, jet powered aircraft, flying from Edwards AFB, California, to the Royal Australian AFB, Edinburgh, South Australia.

The Colonel's talk was quite informative and drew many good questions from the audience when he finished speaking.

the service commemorating the liberation of the village. At that time, Mayor Fuchs was approached with the idea of placing a sign in Bennwihr that prominently displays the 3rd Division Marne Patch. It was suggested that the village honor the Division or a member of the Division. He very much liked the idea, but wanted to name a place after a living veteran so that the children could touch and hear living history. John has visited Bennwihr numerous times over the years and he so impressed the villagers, with his friendly manner and his very interesting relationship with the village, that the Mayor decided to name the square in front of the fire station -- just below the school -- in John's honor. The Mayor said that it his fervent hope that the children will long remember John, and the event on May 14th, and pass these memories on to their children so that what the American soldiers did for the village 60 years ago will never be forgotten. Both John and the Mayor stressed these thoughts in their respective addresses.

John's visit to Bennwihr lasted two days and while there, he was able to visit many of the places where the liberating action took place and meet many of the Villagers, who were only children at the time, but they still have vivid memories of that time and were able to relate many interesting stories.

At the conclusion of his visit, John said, "It is hard to imagine how they can appreciate their liberation with their village completely destroyed and 20 civilians killed by our fire and another 15 dead from exposure, heart problems, stress, etc. The fact they are grateful for the liberation is a commentary on how much they disliked the German annexation and

Bob St. Clair joined the San Francisco 49ers as a third-round draft selection in 1953. Standing 6 feet 9 inches tall and weighing 263 pounds, St. Clair's mere presence on the football field tended to intimidate opponents. He wasn't just good — he was mean — and hit with such ferocity that he left a trail of broken bones throughout the National Football League. His teammates nicknamed him, "The Geek," because of his flamboyant lifestyle, such as eating all his meat raw.

A hooligan from the City ...St. Clair's early days played out as a tough kid — gang violence and run-ins with the law — and luckily football

captured him before the cops did. He went on to become one of only a few athletes that played high school, college, and professional football in their hometowns. His football days include the famous undefeated and untied season at University of San Francisco, and of course, those fabulous 49er years from 1953 to 1964.

Extremely popular with the fans and teammates, St. Clair served as team captain three years in a row and also won numerous honors, including being named to the All-NFL team several times and playing in five Pro Bowls.

After football, St. Clair settled down to a life in business and politics ...he's been a mayor, a councilman, a lobbyist and marketing and sales executive. Now he has the field at Kezar Stadium to call his own and a jersey retirement that was long overdue and the biggie ... a trip to the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Bob gave a terrific talk to Branch 118 in November, telling all about his very interesting career and his new book entitled ... "I'll Take It Raw."

So what's this all about? ...a Ham Radio Remote Controlled HF station is an Internet Remote Base (IRB) HF station, available for use by almost any licensed amateur. An IRB is easy to install and operate and does not require expensive equipment or advanced computer skills. The concept has been in use continuously for several years and literally scores of hams, worldwide, have made hundreds of over seas and local contacts, without the use of radios, antennas, or towers.

Why should you be Interested? ...Among other things, you will have a lot of fun and current, as well as new amateurs, will be able to remain active on the air with just a computer and an Internet connection without all the usual equipment.

One of the questions that usually comes up ..."is it legal?" Having researched this matter extensively with the FCC, the short answer is "yes." Of course, US operators must abide by their own license privileges.

As antenna restrictions become more severe throughout the country, remote-controlled stations like these offer a viable alternative for enjoying Amateur Radio.

 In Retirement so, never write or say
 SIRS when referring to Sons in Retirement
- SIR is always capitalized
- There are no periods between the letters
- The possessive of SIR is SIR's

Some examples:

- John is a member of **SIR Not SIRS**
- SIR's annual meeting is held in August

 possessive

Sir Refers to an individual member of SIR Some examples:

- Sir John Jones is a member of SIR Singular
- Many *Sirs* attended the SIR luncheon
 Plural
- A Sir's son attended a SIR luncheon Singular Possessive
- Some Sirs' wives attend SIR picnics Plural Possessive

In Memoriam - Irvin M. Craig



Irv Craig passed away on January 27th at the age of 84. He was a founding member of the first SIR Branch in Fresno and went on to become an Area Governor, a Regional Director, and was elected State President in 2002.

He was a graduate of Fresno State College and earned his Master's Degree from the University of Southern California. He became a licensed psychologist and was the county's first school psychologist. He also started the Kings county Mental Health Association and Mental Health Clinic and helped mentally and physically handicapped children for many years.

Irv Craig led quite an active life and among other things, was a teacher, a ham radio operator, a licensed pilot, and loved to play golf and travel. During World War II, he was a member of the Naval Reserve and served on the U.S.S. Argonne in 1941 at Pearl Harbor and later became an officer in the Army Air Corps.

In 1986, Irv retired from the Kings County Schools Administration in Hanford, where he had served as an Assistant Superintendent for 34 years, and moved with his wife to Fresno.


Branch Honors Centenarian Ken Wright, Big Sir

It is every golfer's dream to make a hole-in-one and I want to use my column in this edition of Happenings to increase the awareness of all SIR golfers to the **FEATHER-IN-THE-CAP AWARDS**, which have been presented to members of Sons In Retirement since 1988.



From information that I have gathered, the awards originated when **Jack Wood**, a member of Branch 76 and also a wood carver hobbyist, was playing at Bennett Valley in Santa Rosa when one of the men in his foursome made a hole-in-one. At the end of the game, the lucky golfer bought the members of the foursome a beer. Jack had a plain rooster hackle feather in his cap which he took out and presented to his fellow golfer, telling him that he should have a feather in his cap for making a hole-in-one. Jack's comment was "you would have thought that I had given him \$50." Jack went home and designed the Feather-In-The-Cap Pin, which is still awarded today. The following week Jack told his playing partner that he would like to trade him for the rooster hackle feather and the partner resisted until he saw the pin that Jack had made. Between 1988 and May of 2002, Jack made over 500 pins, most of which were presented to members of Sons In Retirement, lack Wood passed away on December 19, 2003.

The State Golf Committee adopted the Feather-In-The-Cap Award and it was administered by **George Bokanich**, a member of the State Golf Policy Committee for many years, until George left the Committee about 18 months ago. After Jack Wood passed away, George found another wood carver to make the pins. The pins are now made by **Don Dugan**. Presently, the program is administered by **Andy Ferreira**, a member of the State Golf Policy Committee.

The State Golf Committee has expanded the award to include SIR members playing in SIR sponsored events that shoot their age as well as the hole-in-one awards. In 2005, fourteen hole-in-one awards were presented and four awards for Shooting-One's-Age.

To qualify for the awards — Branch, Area or Division Golf Chairmen must complete Form No. 7, which is in the Golf Manual, and mail it to Andy Ferreira as instructed on the form...the form must also be authenticated by two witnesses.

I sincerely appreciate the efforts and dedication of George Bokanich and Andy Ferreira in making this award available to all SIR Golfers.

As reported by Andy Ferreira, during 2005, the SIR golfers listed in the adjacent column have been presented a "**FEATHER-IN-THE-CAP**" award for their golfing achievements.



Army Sergeant, Ben Waldron, held a Branch 13 audience spellbound during his luncheon speech in January, talking about his youth during the Depression and of joining the Army in June of 1939. Had the Japanese found the book, he certainly would have been executed. He was shipped to Japan to work in a factory and the 62-day boat trip was brutal. Life at the factory was gruesome and his weight had dropped from 165 pounds to 97 pounds by the time he was liberated.

He wrote a book entitled "Corregidor: From Paradise to Hell" to document his story. The book earned Best Book of the Year Award in 1989 and 90.

What's it Like to be a Park Ranger

Ever wonder what it is like to be a park ranger in a place like Yosemite National park?

Tom "Smitty" Smith — a former Region 7 Director, and Professor Emeritus of Park Management from West Valley College in Saratoga — spent 15 summers as a park ranger in Yosemite National Park where he rode a horse for about 700 miles every summer, patrolling the backcountry of the Park and the area around Tuolumne Meadows.

During three of those summers, he had his family with him in a cabin located 14 miles from the nearest road with no electricity, where everything had to be brought in on the back of a mule. During this time, he patrolled the Wawona backcountry and while he was stationed in Tuolumne Meadows, he patrolled the High Sierra. His wilderness job included a lot of search and rescue and as a horse patrolman in Tuolumne, his job was much the same as the mounted police officer you see in downtown San Francisco or San Jose.

Most people don't realize that Yosemite is a piece of Federal land, and only Federal law applies. Local enforcement agencies and the Highway Patrol do not have jurisdiction within the boundaries of the Park. That makes the Park Ranger a "jack of all trades." You have to be able to protect people from other people — people from themselves and the park — and the park from the people.

Tom has written a book about his experiences titled, "I am Just a Seasonal," and it describes what it is like to be a park ranger in a place like Yosemite. He has also spent considerable time telling his Yosemite story to SIR branches in the South Bay as far away as Watsonville and Hollister. He has very much enjoyed this experience because it has extended his SIR friendships a lot farther and he would like to continue speaking to SIR Branches.

He led an active life in retirement. During these years he visited many foreign countries and traveled throughout the United States.

Warren was known as a good and honest man, who stood by his beliefs and family. He also had an enviable sense of humor. During his lifetime he witnessed the coming of age of our country through six wars, the intervening prosperity, the Great Depression, and the marvels of science like radio and television.

Sir **Bob Sherman** is 78 years old and certainly in his golden years by most standards. However, the real gold has come in the form of medals he has won while competing in Masters National Diving Events.

In the 75 – 80 age group at the World Games in July 2005 in Edmonton, Canada, Bob finished 2nd in the 1 meter board, 1st in the 3 meter board, 1st in the 5 and 7½ meter tower.

In the same World Games, he and his 68 year old female partner finished 3rd out of 24 teams in Synchronized Diving. This event was open to all divers age 25 and up – quite a feat!

And then, in May, 2006 at the Masters Indoor National Diving Competition in Dallas, Texas, Bob won 1st Place in three different events in the 75 – 80 age group: 1 meter board, 3 meter board, and 5 and 7½ meter tower.

Bob jokingly attributes some of his success to the fact that he has worn down the competition. "There aren't that many divers left in the 75-80 age group so it's easier to get a gold." He may joke about it, but you have to be in good shape – competitive and focused – when you're looking down at the water from a 7 meter tower. Then you spring up and out, twist and turn your body and after falling 20 feet, cut the surface of the water like a knife.

Bob started swimming and diving at an early age and in 1961 started the Sherman Swim School in Lafayette, California, which is still operated by his son, Steve... and of course, Bob helps out while keeping in shape.

Bob isn't hanging up his suit. He is training for the FINA World Masters Diving competition at Stanford University in August. Good Luck, Bob and keep going for the gold!



Need Any Rattlesnakes Removed? Mike Nickey, Little Sir

There was noticeable apprehension at this Branch 37 luncheon when the speaker walked to the podium carrying two cages of deadly rattlesnakes, with their rattles buzzing.

Len Ramirez was formerly a world-class tennis player, playing against the likes of John McEnroe, when his

fascination with snakes caused him to make a drastic career change. In 1985, he and his wife, shown in the picture at right, started the Ramirez Rattlesnake Removal Company in the Santa Cruz Mountains, but later moved to Auburn in the Sierra Foothills, because he said... "that's where there are more Rattlers." Since then, their business has grown and been featured on both local and national TV and in newspaper and magazine articles.



They are on call 24/7 and will do removals anywhere in California, but operate mainly in Northern and Central California. Last year, they responded to about 3,000 calls and captured 1,000 rattlers. Len says snakes are very beneficial to the environment by keeping the rodent population down, and so, he doesn't kill the snakes, but releases them after capture... someone in the audience wanted to know how close to Auburn they are released.

Ramirez has been bitten once on his little finger, causing a three-week stay in the hospital... that finger will always be larger than his other finger. Someone asked

about treatments for snake bites. He recommended caution on using the common treatments most people have read about and said the best treatment for

a snake bite is a set of car keys to get to the nearest hospital.

Spring is the biggest season for Rattlesnake removal... he had just come from a call where he caught six rattlesnakes... two in the garage, two next to the house, and two in the house... he told the audience to be sure there is no open space at the bottom of your garage door, because that's how the snakes get in.

Ramirez said he loves what he is doing and has the best job he has ever had... most of the Sirs in the audience would disagree.

Currently Branch 57 has two singing groups... The SIR-N-AIDERS and The CHANTICLEERS. Singers from each group sometimes practice and perform in a combined chorus, for a bigger sound and a better performance. Most performances are in the afternoon, usually at 2PM. 

NCGA Membership has continued to grow during the Spring and Summer ...as of August 1, membership totaled 6,218, another nice improvement over year end numbers. I encourage each golfer to bring in one new golfing member during 2006 and 2007.

The State Golf Committee is looking for ways to get more input from our members, about their desires for tournament venues, dates, formats, etc. We began by asking the participants in our tournaments — starting in September, with the Solvang Tournament — to complete a questionnaire as a first step in this continuing effort and the information gathered will influence the decision making of the Committee. At the Las Vegas Tournament this year, members expressed a desire to have one of the weeks, with a day off, between golf rounds. In our negotiations for tournament dates and golf courses in Las Vegas, we are working to make this happen in 2007.







requirements and described the continuous evaluation program that is in place for all the NFL referees. All games are reviewed every week and an official judged to be performing poorly will be put on probation, leading to removal if the problems persist.

He commented on the "instant" nature of decision making, noting that the angle of vision is critical. A watchword for all officials is ... "if you think it happened — it didn't," ... "You need to know it did happen."

One example he gave was about an official who was asked by a coach, "what happened?" The official responded, "I don't know, but I'll find out."...he isn't an official anymore. Another example was the sideline official who signaled that controversial play, in last year's Super Bowl, was a touchdown. He actually ran quite a way onto the field before he raised his arms, signaling a touchdown. The requirement is that he signal the touchdown from his normal side position and enters the field only to identify the actual point of the touchdown ...it was not a touchdown and his signal was actually illegal.

Russ said that while top officials are well compensated, it's a long way from rookie to the top, meaning ...refereeing in the Super Bowl.

His talk was well received, with quite a few questions, and afterwards, members gathered around him for even more questions.


Crazy Shirt Day


Rooster Tails Fishing



Tuskegee Airman

Captain Leon "Woodie" Spears flew 51 combat missions over Europe during World War II before he was hit by ground-fire on March 24, 1945 and crash-landed in enemy territory in Poland. Nazi soldiers captured him, but five days later Russian troops had taken over the area and he remained with the Russians for several months. After a 2500-mile trip through Russia to the Black Sea port of Odessa, he boarded a French liner with 2000 other allied airmen and was transported back to Italy, where he rejoined his Group and Squadron. He then returned to the states, and was discharged into the reserve forces.

Woody was born in Pueblo, Colorado in 1924, the second child of parents who had originally come from Louisiana. Growing up in Pueblo, he didn't experience any racial bias. He had always dreamed of being a flyer, but his parents knew that the likelihood of a young, colored-lad becoming a flyer was not likely. With war looming, he went to the army recruiter, with his high school buddies who were all white, and asked for an application to become an aviation cadet in the Army Air Corps. After a certain amount of cajoling, the recruiter gave him an application and he and his schoolmates filled them out. After a substantial waiting period, he learned that he would be trained at the Tuskegee Institute in Alabama.

Most of the instructors at Tuskegee were southern white officers. "They let you know that you were not white and not to expect much respect from them." After about two years of training, he was assigned to the 301st fighter squadron in the 332nd Fighter group, escorting bombers into Germany. Woodie, along with about 996 others, were trained at Tuskegee, but he was one of only 450 black airmen who went into combat.

Years later, he flew again as a reservist in the Korean War, where he flew 17 missions and then was sent home after seeing his brother shot down and killed.

Woodie Spears, now 82, and one of the few surviving original Tuskegee airmen, recently gave quite an interesting talk to Branch 94 about his experiences in two wars.





Guess What? There's another new guy on the block. Relax you only have to hear from me three more times in 2007. Speaking of 2007, may you all enjoy a happy and prosperous New Year in this great organization of retired men, called Sons In Retirement, Inc.

You may wonder why we have so many rules, and you may also wonder why do we have Area Governors, Regional Directors, a State Board, and State Committees? The answers are that we have to comply with the legal requirements of a non-profit public benefit corporation in the State of California, of which there are many. This requires some oversight. We also provide our members with some activities and events to give you something to get involved in.

Some of you may wonder what does the State Organization of SIR do for us at the Branch level? Since this column is limited, I will only tell you a few things we do for our members and Branches:

- 1. The State SIR files annually with the California Secretary of State and the Attorney General to maintain our non-profit status. The State also pays on behalf of each Branch a \$10 filing fee each year.
- 2. The State SIR files Income Tax Returns annually on behalf of our Branches with the Internal Revenue Service and the State Board of Equalization.
- 3. The State SIR conducts three regular State Board Meetings each year, the Annual Meeting on the first Monday of August and numerous State Committee meetings to exchange information, keep our Bylaws and Rules current, and to provide our members with State activities and events.
- 4. The State SIR, through its Information Systems Committee, provides the members and Branches with a ton of information on the SIR Website, www.sirinc.org, including its quarterly publication of SIR Happenings.
- 5. State SIR pays around \$68 to \$70 thousand dollars a year in liability insurance premiums. Our corporate status along with our third–party liability insurance is designed to protect our Branch and State Officers in the event we are sued.

All of the foregoing is paid for by the quarterly pro-rata amount assessed each active member by the State SIR. Where else can one obtain the above services for \$4.60 per year?

Pearl Harbor Survivor Joe Bigham, Bulletin Editor

Many members of SIR weren't even born when *Joe Ruggles* joined the Navy in 1931.

Service life was peaceful until December 7, 1941, when Ruggles found himself "right in the middle of things" during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor... "I got an ambulance out and started picking up people and putting them on the lawn," recalls



Ruggles, who was a chief pharmacist mate. "The hospital didn't have enough room and the worst part were the burn cases... we tried to ease their pain with shots of morphine."

Ruggles spent 24 years in the Navy – through World war II and Korea – before retiring in 1955. For a long time, he wouldn't talk about the day America entered World War II... "I can talk about it now," he says, but "I didn't want to talk about it for about 15-20 years."

Ruggles joined Sons in Retirement in Walnut Creek, then transferred to Branch 179 in Fresno 2 ½ years ago to be near his daughter. Ruggles was 95 in December and was honored as the branch's oldest member.

Aside from December 7, Ruggles' most traumatic service experience was on Okinawa, two months after the war ended... "We lost 129 ships in a typhoon on October 9, 1945," he says.



From a humble start of six members, the Group has grown and flourished to over 20 members. Some are long time Branch members, some are newly sworn-in members, others are on the waiting list, and three are from other branches.

The program is based on the idea that, by reading from the great books of our civilization, discussing them, sharing insights, and asking questions, one can reach a fuller understanding of these books... there is no teaching, except by the authors of the various fiction and non-fiction selections.

The paperback books we use are short selection anthologies, supplied by the Great Books Foundation, so that all of the members are reading from the same page. It's fun and it exercises the mind, which is most important.

President Tom's Column

Let me tell you a couple things that have happened during the first quarter of 2007. The State Board has reduced the pro-rata amount that Branches pay to the State Organization of SIR, starting with the second quarter of this year. Upon the recommendation of our State Treasurer, Bob Mannell from San Jose, the Board reduced the pro-rata from \$1.15 per active member to \$1. That is significant, especially for Branches with memberships in excess of 100 members.

Although it was unfortunate that the original 50th Anniversary Cruise to Hawaii aboard a Celebrity Cruise Line ship was cancelled, it was our fault, because we did not generate the minimum 1,000 fee paid participants by the extended deadline of December 31, 2006. The new 50th Anniversary Cruise with Norwegian Cruise Lines, aboard the Pride of America, promises to be a great trip. Passports will not be required, because this is an American registered ship and it will not be going to a foreign port merely to satisfy the foreign registered ship requirements.

Participants will be picked up at centralized points by bus and transported to Sacramento, Oakland, San Francisco and San Jose on Thursday, April 3, 2008. They will fly to Honolulu, Oahu, Hawaii where buses will meet and transport them to the Marriott Resort Beach Hotel. On Friday April 4th, there will be a SIR 50th Anniversary Gala Hawaiian Luau. On Saturday April 5th, buses will transport participants to the Pride of America and their cruise and port stops in the Hawaiian Islands will begin. After touring the Islands, the ship will cruise to San Francisco arriving the morning of Tuesday, April 15th. Buses will transport participants back to the centralized points where they were picked up.

As a bonus for those who paid the initial fees for the Celebrity Cruise, you will be treated to an extra night in Honolulu and you will depart on Wednesday, April 2, 2008. This cruise is guaranteed, so I hope you are able to take advantage of this event. If you need further details, please contact your Branch Travel Chairman.

A Different Kind of War Roger Pease, Past Big Sir

I was a motion picture photographer in China-Burma-India in WWII and as such, I had some unusual experiences, which I recently shared with my Branch at one of our monthly luncheons. The following is one of these stories:

Kachins are one of many tribal cultures in the remote Northern Shan States of Burma. These people were friendly to Americans from an earlier time when Gordon Seagrave, known as the "Burma Surgeon," worked with them on health concerns and, as a missionary, brought them Christianity. When the war came to them, the Kachins organized "Rangers" to harass the Japanese. Some also worked with the 7000-man Mars Task Force, scouting Japanese positions.

While with Mars, I joined a 15-man squad of Kachins to go on a patrol of a mountainous region to gain information on Japanese positions. This was a two-day mission which included staying overnight in a Kachin village. Toward the end of the day as we entered the village of bamboo



houses -- all on high stilts -- we were greeted enthusiastically by the villagers. An elderly lady came up, grabbed me by the hand, and with a big smile said something which, when translated. was, "I am an American Baptist happy to meet another American

Baptist!" To them all Americans were Baptists.

That evening the Head Man shot a young pig with a flintlock rifle. The pig was immediately butchered for dinner. I was to stay in the Head Man's house of one large room. Dirt was piled in the center to make a base for a wood fire for light and warmth and the smoke sifted up through an opening in the reed roof.

After the dinner, which was very tasty, some of the village people came to visit. Young people gathered around the fire and sang "Onward Christian Soldiers" and other hymns in their language, which gave a strange effect, because one of their words is simply the sound of "nn" and this seemed to leave gaps in the music. Back in the shadows, the old men of the village were quietly smoking opium.

This was truly another world of new friends and for a moment, the war was very far away. In the picture, I'm filming a Kachin celebration after the Japanese had been driven from the area.

Remembering Iwo Jima

Excerpts from an article that appeared in "The Salinas Californian" which was provided to Happenings by

Jim Westphal, Area 21 Governor

Not a day goes by that **Adolph Brusa**, an **Honorary Life Member** from Branch 89 in Salinas doesn't think back to 9:05 a.m. on Feb. 19, 1945. "That time...that date...will

always be etched in my memory," said Brusa, 84. That's because he was going ashore that morning on Iwo Jima, in one of World War II's most famous battles. He was part of the first wave of Marines to hit the rocky island's shell-pocked - soon to be blood-soaked - black sand beaches. Brusa, a Marine Corps corporal in charge of a mortar squad, was soon a battle



casualty. After 24 hours on the island, he'd been wounded by shrapnel in the top of the left foot and in his left arm and rib cage. A piece of flying metal had also split open his lip and chin and clipped off the tip of his nose. "A corpsman bandaged me up," Brusa said and "he'd been hit, too."

A pork chop-shaped island, 2 1/2 miles wide and less than 5 miles long, Iwo Jima was attacked because it was a key point in the Pacific War. For one thing, it was a part of



Japan. "It is the gateway to Japan, and I mean to keep the gate closed," said Lt. General Tadamichi Kuribayashi, the Japanese commander. Iwo Jima sat strategically along the path flown by B-29s en route from bases in Saipan to bomb Japan. The bombers had to fly at least 1,000 miles each way, a distance

too great for fighter escorts. Japanese pilots, meanwhile, rose up off the island airstrips to threaten the U.S. planes. Many returning U.S. bombers, crippled by enemy fire or low on fuel, had no choice but to ditch at sea. Once U.S. troops secured Iwo Jima, however, the U.S. planes could land on the island, saving the lives of countless aircrews.

For Brusa and his fellow Marines, invasion day started with a traditional pre-battle breakfast..."steak and eggs," Brusa said. Then the original assault force, of which he was a part, headed for shore. "Go get 'em, you glory hounds," one sailor shouted by way of trying to lighten the mood. The ride to shore was deceptively calm. As the first Marines stepped onto the gritty black volcanic sand, they faced only silence. But..."it wasn't quiet for long, "Brusa said. The fighting quickly heated up. The stench of diesel fumes from the tanks mingled with the salty taste of the air and burnt powder left by bursting artillery and mortar rounds. "They (Japanese) had every inch of land zeroed in," Brusa said. "The Japanese mortar shells were falling in a killing pattern.

People were getting hit all around---men yelling...men screaming...shells screaming---you could not believe there was that much sound on Earth," he said.

The Japanese had dug a network of tunnels and had built other heavily fortified emplacements from which they aimed withering fire. "I saw one Japanese soldier jump out of a pillbox with a satchel charge and head for a tank," Brusa said. "He lasted about 10 seconds. "Mostly though, we were firing our weapons at where we thought they might be." By nightfall, Brusa had been bandaged and given morphine, but he was unable to speak and was bleeding heavily. He and other wounded Marines took shelter in the shattered shell of a pillbox. Flares floated down, shedding brilliant white light and casting unnerving shadows. On the morning of Feb. 23, Joe Rosenthal, an Associated Press photographer, climbed Mount Suribachi and snapped World War II's most famous image. "A roar went up all over the island," Brusa said.

Later, aboard ship, a skillful surgeon was able to repair Brusa's chin and lip, though it took three surgeries. His unit was next slated to take part in the invasion of Japan, but then the U.S. dropped atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki and the war ended. Brusa served in Japan as part of the occupation forces and was discharged on November 10, 1945.

When his thoughts take their frequent trips back to Iwo Jima, he feels anew the loss of his fellow Marines. Of the 236 who landed in Company C, only 46 walked off the island and when he speaks of that loss, emotion rises quickly in his voice. Thoughts of Iwo Jima also leave him with a persistent yet unanswerable question... "I'm always wondering, how the hell did I ever come out of that ordeal alive?" he said.



We played at Painted Desert for 2 days and at Las Vegas National for 1 day each week. The courses were in great condition and their staffs did a fine job of accommodating both tournaments. 
Book Swap



Mission Trail Branch 35, Palo Alto

Story of Charles Cook, a B-17 Pilot Edited by Rich Scholz, Member Branch 35

I always wanted to fly, and WWII gave me an opportunity that was far beyond my expectations. As a new B-17 pilot, I arrived in England on my 21st birthday. When I stowed my gear, the previous occupant's belongings were still in my assigned room... two days in a row, the 94th

Bomb Group went on raids, with none returning. That day, I confronted the realities of war.

Mission days started at 1:00 AM... then breakfast, mission briefing, takeoff, join



formation, bomb about noon, come home, debrief, dinner around 6:00 PM, and finally back to our quarters for sleep. The missions themselves were exciting and sometimes very frightening. Weather was often bad. At times takeoffs and landings were in near zero visibility... some didn't make it! Flak was so dense, we wondered how anyone could survive. One time a burst took off our rudder and stabilizer, missing our tail gunner by six inches. Another time, flak hit our bombardier, blowing him into a bulkhead... his flak suit saved his life. Another time, flak hit our top turret, spraying our flight engineer with shards of Plexiglas... he also survived. Raids included hundreds of fighters – ours and theirs – swarming all over. On a Hamburg raid, we got credit for part of a German fighter. One time over the North Sea, a submarine fired on us, blowing out my windscreen... we completed the mission in minus 57 degree temperature.

We were shot down twice, but the crew was able to get back to England. In one case, a fighter led our limping plane to an abandoned German airfield in France. In spite of very bad weather and some unfilled bomb craters, we were able to land. Later, a C-47 picked us up to return home. On one run, we barely missed ditching in the Channel, when all four engines quit, due to carburetor ice... we got them running just in time. Survival time was a matter of minutes in that icy water.

There were many more experiences, but the foregoing is an idea of what it was like. Overall, my crew and I were very lucky to survive our assigned 35 missions and forged a bond, lasting a lifetime.

A Lucky Pilot

We recently had quite an interesting speaker by the

name of **Frank Fasmer**, a member of the branch, and a former P-47 pilot during World War II shown in the cockpit of his P-47. Frank enlisted in the Army Air Corps in 1942 and completed his flight training at Luke Field in



Arizona. He was then sent to England and two months after "D" day, he sailed across the channel on an LST and from there he hitchhiked to Lyon, France, where he joined his P-47 Squadron.

Most of his missions were to find and destroy "Targets of Opportunity." The enemy territory was divided up into grids and each squadron was assigned a grid... any trains, planes, tanks and military equipment that were sighted, were destroyed. The P-47 Thunderbolt—also called the "Jug"—came equipped with eight 50-caliber machine guns, and could carry two 500 pound bombs and four, five-inch HVAR rockets. It was the largest, heaviest, and best-equipped fighter in WWII. It also had a supercharged Pratt & Whitney Double Wasp 2435 HP engine that pushed the Jug to over 470 mph.

During one of Frank's missions, he encountered one of the new German jet fighters -- the Messerschmitt ME262 -- head on. They both closed so close and fast, all they could do was give each other the infamous one-finger salutation.

During his tour, Frank flew 100 combat missions, and earned 20 air medals along with the Distinguish Flying Cross. Although several pilots in his squadron were lost in combat, Frank's plane never received a hit. Either the Good Lord was watching over him or he was a pretty good pilot... or maybe a little bit of both!

Frank retired as a Battalion Commander from the LAFD in 1979 and moved to Amador County. He now leads a much calmer life as a Master Gardener.



Our recent speaker was Vernell Crittendon, former



senior public information officer for the prison, seen in the picture. Vern gave us a fluid, interesting and very thought-provoking presentation on San Quentin, its history and the current situation of what can only be described as, "this hell on earth". We are really indebted to people like Vern who have dedicated their ca-

reers to this very important, but distasteful area of public service.

It is appalling to realize that there are a total of approximately 176,000 people in prison in California and that the recidivism rate is 76%! The situation seems hopeless... and, at San Quentin in 2006, there were 196 men and 4 women on Death Row. Why do so many people, in increasing numbers, fall into a life of crime? Vern quoted an FBI source that claimed that you could spot the bad ones by the time they reach Third Grade. They come mostly from single family, lower class homes and have problems socializing in First and Second Grades. The problem is how to correct this core societal issue.

One bright spot in this gloomy situation is that in times when our nation is threatened, the inmates show an amazingly patriotic side. During World War II, they made a lot of support material, including the torpedo skirt underneath the Golden Gate Bridge... and, after 9/11, San Quentin raised \$8,000 for the dependents of those killed in the attack.

Vern gave a great presentation and now that he is retired, we hope he will consider becoming a member of Branch 47.





Tin Can Sailor

William Bryson, Member Branch 35

I became a Tin Can Sailor on October 8, 1944 when I swung aboard the *USS Burns*, a Fletcher class destroyer operating with Task Force 38 in the Pacific. Two days later, I received a Japanese "welcome" in the form of an air attack during which a Japanese twin-engine aircraft fell – trailing smoke and flames – into the water near the *Burns*. I had found the ship I had been seeking for over two months, and the Pacific war had found me.

Late in 1944, the Japanese formed a Special Attack Corps of suicide pilots called "kamikazes" or "divine wind." I witnessed the devastation caused by a single kamikaze attack on a small aircraft carrier during the Lingayen Gulf



invasion of the Philippine Islands. A twinengine bomber dove into the USS Ommaney Bay on the starboard side of the flight deck,

its bombs exploding below the flight deck.

We went alongside the carrier to rescue men trapped on the burning flight deck. My battle station, in the gun director above the bridge, afforded me a close-up view of the rescue operation, the death of a proud ship, and the agony of her crew. *Burns* placed her bow against the carrier's forward flight deck to rescue three trapped men. Small caliber ammunition in the ready magazines of the carrier started to explode. Suddenly a thunderous explosion shook the *Ommaney Bay*, and showered us with debris.

Fortunately, the large explosions did not injure any of our crew, but the blasts killed two men on a nearby destroyer. Fires spread throughout the ship, turning it into a blazing inferno. After all remaining members of the crew had abandoned ship, the *Burns* sank the *Ommaney Bay* with a single torpedo. The torpedo struck with a tremendous blast, and broke the mortally wounded carrier in half. Pieces of the ship splashed into the water all around us, but fortunately none struck our ship. Within six minutes after impact, we sadly watched *Ommaney Bay* sink beneath the sea.

The *Burns* rescued 158 surviving officers and men of the *Ommaney Bay*. The carrier lost ninety-five men killed and sixty-five wounded in the kamikaze attack.

This Sir Helped turn the Tide at the Battle of Midway

Our Branch member, **Bill Cullin**, was born in Pittsburgh on November 30, 1917 and shortly thereafter, his family moved to Seattle. After attending the University of Washington, Bill decided to join the Navy and completed flight school in Corpus Christi about the time Pearl Harbor was attacked.

Cullin found himself assigned to a reconnaissance squadron and became involved in the Battle of Midway. Japan's fleet centered around the four large aircraft carriers that had been part of the force that attacked Pearl Harbor. The U.S. Fleet had only two seaworthy aircraft carriers –USS Enterprise and USS Hornet – and a hastily patched together USS Yorktown. Cullin was a member of the squadron that spotted the Japanese fleet

At the end of the battle, all four Japanese carriers were sunk and the U.S. lost the Yorktown. The Battle of Midway was a turning point in the Pacific and was the first major defeat for the Japanese armed forces.

After twenty years of Naval service, Bill embarked on a highly successful business and teaching career, working for several aerospace companies and teaching at several institutes including the War College and USC.

Bill's wife Shelly (pictured with Bill), also had a distinguished professional career. She modestly describes her career as a "Cabaret Singer," but she was more than



that... She was an actress and a singer on radio and television, and musical theater and performed with the likes of Carol Channing, Xavier Cugat, and Robert Mitchum.





When certain songs are played it helps them remember where they were, what they were doing, and who they were with."

"In some cases some of the people we play for have been waiting for an hour or so for our show," said banjo player *Glenn Lee*. "When we come on you'd swear they are asleep...but all of a sudden they smile and their eyes light up. We play music that was popular 50 or 60 years ago and it brings back memories for a lot of them. When you see that joy, that excitement in them, it is a feeling you just can't get over."



At a Lake Wildwood Branch luncheon last fall, Big Sir **Bob Welti**, introduced a twenty-year old paratrooper in full combat uniform who was home on a two-week leave from Afghanistan. His introduction of the speaker



was personal and quite emotional, because it was his Grandson, PFC Greggory Gibbs.

Greggory is with the much heralded, 173rd Airborne Brigade, based an hour or so out of Chokay, Afghanistan in the dangerous southeastern part of the country. His 20-man platoon – at their semipermanent mountain checkpoint position – has a clear view of neighboring Pakistan and the constant muzzle and mortar blasts of incoming enemy fire aimed at him and his buddies.

His presentation included videos and stills of his experiences and those of his comrades. "We have two main firefights a week that last from 30 minutes to two hours," said Gibbs. "The other five days there is something less intense. In these little firefights, they're checking how we respond," he says. "They analyze our actions to prepare for another main attack days later. To counter them we never repeat the same plan for our command area." His platoon has four Humvees. "When on patrol I'm in the lead vehicle and operate a 50-caliber machine gun." Greggory and his team also do a lot of walking. "Many days we'll do six to eight hours going from 4,000 feet to 6,000 feet or more – up and down – walking an hour and resting five minutes, then trekking again." Foot patrol duties include gathering intelligence, vehicle and home searches, engaging the enemy and interacting in a positive way with Afghanis.

At the conclusion of his talk, a questioner asked when he will be returning to Afghanistan. "I'm going home October 8," he said. When asked his definition of "home," he replied, "Afghanistan is home for me and my fellow paratroopers. My comrades are my life. I cry with them ... I bleed with them ... I laugh with them ... we share our triumphs and our fears ... our highs and lows. They are my family ... my best friends. We live together and tomorrow, we may suffer together. Yes, I am looking forward to going home and being with them again." He paused and looked lovingly at Grandfather Bob Welti. "I am very lucky. I have two families - two homes - that I love and that love me."


bulk mail rate – this has become very costly. If we are able to save money in this manner, the cost for golfers participating in State Tournaments will be a little more affordable.



President Art's Column

The success of moving to paperless breathes continual life into the Sir Organization. Without this success, it is difficult to imagine what SIR would be like today, if still active. Recently I discussed this with Past President Dwight Sale, Chairman of the INFOSYS committee.

The fundamental principals of SIR have remained unchanged since our founders set them up in July of 1958. How we are organized and how we conduct our business has slowly changed and developed since then but those changes have been eclipsed by the dramatic change in the behind the scenes operations that have occurred in the last 10 to 12 years. We have gone from informing Branches of SIR and corporate requirements using paper to informing members using electronic means like Email and the SIR Website.

We forget the enormous and costly effort it took to print and distribute these documents. Past Governors and Directors will remember the onerous job of personally getting some 90,000 pages into the hands of Branch personnel. Annual printing costs used to be 5 to 6 thousand dollars with a like amount for postage when documents could not be delivered by hand.

The transformation of these operations began in 1997 with Dwight Sale's development of the SIR database. At the same time, Jack Rhondeau founded the State Website, sirinc.org. While the website was for the entertainment of our members and the prestige of SIR it later became the source of all documents.

Past President Jim Faverman, familiar with the Database, suggested that Dwight chair an information system committee and INFOSYS was born.

This group was really the beginning of a SIR information system that was to be used by other SIR officials to perform their duties. INFOSYS has matured into an indispensable tool for SIR.

Past President Dwight Sale, who has guided this INFOSYS effort since 1997 wants to turn over the reigns to someone else at the end of this year.




Bullet Train to LA Coming Soon Frank McMillan, Bulletin Editor

San Francisco to Los Angeles by train in two and a half hours! ...that's the prediction of transportation expert Rod Diridon, who spoke to the members of Branch 141 in San Jose, on the future of high-speed rail travel in California.

Diridon is Executive Director of the Mineta Transportation Institute in San Jose and is considered the "father" of modern transit service in Silicon Valley. He has been instrumental in promoting the development of a high-speed rail route between Los Angeles and Sacramento, with extensions to the Bay area and San Diego.

He cited the success of high-speed rail systems in Japan, France and Germany, which have been operated profitably for many years. In California, with its ever-growing population, such a system could relieve congested freeways and offer an alternative to costly air travel.

How soon could high-speed rail travel become a reality in California? By 2018, according to Diridon.

Typical of the pictures is the one shown of our Area Governor **George Christman** proudly showing off his new tattoo in 1950 and how it has aged in 58 years.







Shad FishingBill Cline, Fishing Group Chairman



buried at Mt. View, including more former California Governors than are buried in all other cemeteries combined.






Editor's Note: Jim Stedman, Dick DeVoe and Jeff Baily of Branch 146 (see photo at the end of this article) have done some excellent research on the reasons for the continuing decline in SIR membership. Jim Stedman presented their findings during a talk at the last SIR Annual Meeting. The following are some excerpts from his talk that should be of interest to all of us:

SIR Membership Losses– What we have learned

If we remain complacent, Sons In Retirement will continue to descend toward extinction in the next decade. In the chart below we have plotted the total membership of SIR over the period 1988-2007. Depending upon how we extrapolate this data we might predict that SIR will not be around in 10 years. We have learned what is causing membership loss and what needs to be done to avoid these dire predictions.



A STUDY OF SIR MEMBERSHIP LOSSES


more are near failure.

We studied the branch membership records for the 183 SIR branches that received charters. We found that SIR branches have been losing members for most of its 50 year history. In the first 34 years this fact was hidden because new members in new and growing branches exceeded members lost by existing branches. In the last 16 years members lost in existing branches have exceeded the new members in new and growing branches. The rate of total SIR membership loss has increased annually. It was 4% in 2007, and the trend is continuing in 2008. Membership loss is so widespread that 93% of SIR branches now have fewer members than in their peak membership year. Twenty-seven branches have failed – all within the last 15 years-and many

In December 2007, we studied the 23 branches in Region 6. The cause of branch membership loss is best described by the former Big Sir of one of the 23 branches, a typical branch that has lost members. He was asked why his branch had 89 members at the end of 2007 after having a peak of 267 in 1990, and why it has been unable to return to its larger membership size. He answered: "My branch used to be vigorous with a long waiting list. Leadership did not stress recruitment. Fewer and fewer members were inducted each year. Membership became old, activities diminished, and the branch **started losing members**. Some members became dissatisfied for various reasons and left the branch. Branch membership has just continued to get older and lose members. Attempts to stop the losses have been unsuccessful. The advanced average age of the membership is the main reason why enough new members can't be attracted."

There are three essential lessons to be learned from this typical branch. The first is that the leaders of branches that are healthy and can attract new members need to continually and aggressively recruit and induct a good supply of new members and resolve any issues that may result from branch growth. The **second** is that an insufficient supply of new members will result in an increase in branch average age and a decrease in the percentage of younger members. The branch will begin to lose members because it is less attractive to both its existing and potential members. The **third** is that once branch membership gets too old it is nearly impossible for branch leaders to attract new members and branch failure will be the likely result.

The branches in Region 6 vary in branch average age from a low of 69 as shown on the left side of the following chart to a high of 85 on the right side of the chart. This chart demonstrates that the percentage of


younger members 69 and under decreases and that the percentage of members 80 and over increases as branch average age increases.

There is a correlation between branch average age and membership loss. The 6 branches with the youngest average ages on the left side of the chart have lost an average of about 12% of their membership from their peak membership year. The 6 branches with the oldest average ages on the right side of the chart have lost an average of about 63% of their memberships from their peak membership year. The startling fact is that the branches listed on the right side of the chart were at one time on the left side. The reason for the movement from left to right is that once a branch gets to a "comfortable" size in the minds of its branch leaders, aggressive recruiting is curtailed and then branch average age increases because there aren't enough new, and often younger, members inducted annually.

It is possible to stop increases in branch average age and prevent membership loss. Branch 146, the Pleasant Hill Branch, is an example. It was chartered in 1988 and grew rapidly to 200 members in 1993 at which time membership was capped and a waiting list started. The membership cap, with one increase to 210, remained until the end of 2005 after being in place for 12 years. During those years inductions were limited to replacement of members lost to attrition. Attrition was low and branch average age increased each year until reaching 76.2 in late 2005. Why? Because not enough new younger members were inducted to offset the annual aging of the existing branch members.

Rather than allowing branch average age to continue increasing and risk losing members, membership policies were changed in late 2005. The branch was allowed to grow to its current size of about 265 members by inducting those on the waiting list and by recruiting new members at the rate of about 10% of branch membership annually. Since the end of 2005 the branch average age has remained constant at 76.2.

The "New Member Relations" Coordinator helps new members integrate into the branch by assisting them in becoming involved in the more than 30 branch activities and events available for members. The "New Activities" Coordinator helps to continually add additional activities and more groups within existing activities. Member retention is high. The



long-term prospects for Branch 146 are bright so long as current recruitment and induction rates and member retention programs are maintained.

New members are the life-blood of any organization. This is especially true of SIR branches because we all join at about age 65 and then get older too quickly. Our branches get older right along with us if we don't induct new members at the rate of about 10% of branch membership annually, e.g. 20 new members annually for a branch of 200.

Nearly all new members are recruited by active members. Branch leaders need to continually remind and encourage active members, especially new active members, to bring guests to lunch and sponsor new members. Sponsors of new members need to be publicly congratulated at luncheon meetings. Membership contests with rewards as incentives for sponsoring new members are important.

Branch membership losses can and must be stopped in those branches that are still able to attract a good supply of new members. **Vibrant, growing branches are exciting and fun... declining branches are not!**

The State Individual Championship is November 3rd and 4th at Poppy Hills. The Open Play portion is filling up pretty well.



After the meeting in San Mateo, I drove back to my mountain home in Pollock Pines and began to delve into the SIR Secretary files to find out more about the "early days" of Sons in Retirement. In a document entitled "A Brief History of Sons in Retirement" prepared by H. Gordon Beesley – the SIR President in 1984 – I found a wealth of historical background material on the formation of our organization. SIR Beesley tells of the first real meeting as a club that met at the Clairmar Restaurant in San Mateo on July 23, 1958. At this meeting there was much talk about operations – structure and By-Laws – and the rules and regulations needed for a successful club – there were nine retirees in attendance.

It was not until the next meeting on August 12, 1958, that the founders selected a name for the group. Damian Reynolds read a list of possible names for the club that included the following: "Faithful Old Fellows," "Young Oldsters" and "Restful Sons." They agreed on "Sons In Retirement" ...thank goodness they didn't choose one of the suggestions — "Honey Dews." And so, SIR was baptized.

By December 1958, the group decided to have a news-sheet or bulletin. Damian Reynolds was the designated Editor and Volume 1, No.1 – named, "Yes Sir" – was published – that was in February, 1959.

The wealth of information about the expansion of Branch One that first year included: incorporation on February 11, 1959 and the first roster printed with 108 members listed, including each member's name, address, phone number and previous business affiliation. In March, the Executive Committee arranged for the first liability insurance coverage.

The Club's activities during the first year expanded. The first tours and trips were arranged. The first guest speaker was invited to the August 1959 luncheon. The first Holiday party and first opportunity for wives to participate as guests took place in December. Several articles appeared in the "San Mateo Times" and "The San Francisco Chronicle" publicizing SIR. As interest in SIR grew, membership increased to 230 members by the end of December 1959 Sons in Retirement was off and running!!

Congratulations to you, Branch One!! We wish you continued success and more fun times as you begin year number 51 ... "Cock-a-Doodle-Doo."

Leadership Action Plan Buck Kendrick, SIR Vice President

The State Board, meeting in Vallejo on January 20, approved a voluntary Leadership Action Plan (LAP) to address the membership loss crisis. The LAP was approved as a result of extensive research on "branch aging" and its devastating impact on membership within most of our SIR branches.

Branch aging is now recognized to be the root cause of the long-term decline in SIR membership and is a situation which must be addressed at the branch level for survival of SIR, as we have known it. These findings were summarized in the last issue of the "SIR Happenings" and were presented at the training sessions for 2009 Area Governors.

The primary purpose of the LAP effort is to assure that branch leaders understand the membership crisis, recognize the unique effect on their own branch's long term health, and then take the necessary steps to stop or reduce branch aging. Most branches have failed to offset the natural ageing of its members through induction of sufficient numbers of younger members annually. As the mature branch memberships age, the branches begin losing their former energy and vitality. If these attributes diminish over time, the change directly affects many other reasons why the branches become less attractive to potential and existing members.

This "top down" Leadership Action Plan will enhance the long-term survival of currently successful branches and any other branches that are still capable of survival. It will emphasize responsibility and accountability for membership-related issues through all SIR leadership levels – Branch Executive Committees, Big Sirs, Area Governors, Regional Directors, President, and Board of Directors. It also will offer leadership oversight, training and positive suggestions to the branch leaders on how to recruit and retain new, younger members.

A new Leadership Action Committee (LAC), headed by Vice President Buck Kendrick and reporting to the Executive Committee, will implement this plan in the coming weeks. The LAC will be staffed with participating Regional Directors and others who have shown strong

Membership Programs that Work Stan Barkey, Big Sir (2008)

Bringing in new members should be one of the top priorities of every branch of SIR. In our branch we have several practices that help with this.

We constantly encourage our members to bring guests. Our practice is that when a Sir brings a guest, the sponsor calls in to let us know the name of the guest and pays for the guest's lunch ...when the guest joins the branch, the sponsor receives reimbursement for that lunch. When the guest and sponsor arrive, the guest receives a computer printed name badge similar to the badges of members. We have special tables set aside in the front of the hall for guests and sponsors, so they receive preferred seating. During the meeting, guests are given a special welcome after they have been introduced by the Big Sir. This helps others in the branch, who may already know a guest, to come up after the meeting to welcome him.

Application forms are placed at the guest tables, so it is convenient for them to complete the application following the meeting if they are ready to join. They can also take the application with them and send it to our Membership Director.

The Membership Director has an important role since he is the one who does the follow-up with each guest and keeps him on his "Hot List," until he joins the branch or tells us that he has decided not to join.

New Members and their sponsors are invited to an orientation meeting about an hour prior to the regular luncheon. During this orientation, new members receive their Branch Roster along with a briefing on branch activities. Assistant Membership Director Arden Anderson is shown using his laptop and a PowerPoint

presentation that helps make this orientation more interesting and enables us to be consistent and thorough. We include a brief history of SIR, along with information about all of our activities. We make



this interactive rather than making it a boring lecture.

Sponsors are encouraged to include their new

Sponsors are encouraged to include their new members in their table group and help them build new friendships within the branch. We have learned that getting new members involved in at least one activity, in addition to the monthly luncheon, is the key to retention of members, so we strongly encourage sponsors to help make this happen.

Happy Members and Recruiting Glenn Cheetham, Big Sir

Here are some of the ways that we recruit and keep our current members happy that have been quite successful for our Branch:

Hand out a copy of the Newsletter to all the luncheon guests so they can read about the Branch and its activities. We also provide extra copies at luncheons for members to give to friends. Its great inexpensive advertising... written by the people involved.

Identify Activity Chairmen. We all wear nametags at lunch. We added the titles of Activity Chairmen under their names ... i.e. Golf Chairman, Fishing Chairman, etc. This gives recognition to the Chairmen and it identifies the person who, guests and members alike, should talk to about the activities our Branch offers ...in a casual luncheon and social hour setting.

Identify Birthday Boys. We have a drawing each month for a free lunch for one or two of our Birthday Boys. Then we ask all of them to stand and we sing happy birthday. To identify birthdays during the social hour, we put a small, temporary smiling face sticker saying Birthday Boy on the nametag. Other members congratulate them ahead of time...they love it!

Give special certificates of appreciation from the Branch for "behind the scenes" volunteers. We have fellows who work for years without recognition in such things as finding weekly golf marshals. When they "step down" we give a framed certificate in front of the membership or at the Ladies Day Luncheon.

Constantly encourage members to become involved in activities. Remind them to just try it. If they don't like it -- no obligation -- no harm done.

Encourage new activities and try them out. Tell members to talk to friends about non-offered interests and start their own activities. For example, we have a wine tasters group ...some members then started an "inexpensive" wine group to share and compare bargain wines.

Encourage "couples" activities -- besides travel -- with ladies as guests. We have monthly activities such as our recent "A Day at the Races" (ladies loved the turf club atmosphere) and local tours of historical landmarks followed by lunch at a local restaurant. The ladies love to socialize and to get to know each other as well as feeling involved with their husband's social activities, when they are doing things with their husbands and meeting friends.

You might want to give some of these ideas a try.

interest in the success of the plan.

Branch Assessment Report – In order to establish a baseline for focusing leadership attention, a Branch Assessment Report will be requested from each participating branch. The 23 branches in Region 6 completed their Assessment Reports in 2008, confirming the methodology and the importance of this effort. This report will be used as an initial evaluation of each branch's health for the long term. The Leadership Action Committee will collect the Branch Assessment Reports and provide a Branch Evaluation Summary to each Regional Director, with pertinent data and recommendations.

Branch Membership Action Plan – It is anticipated that branch leaders will review their own Branch Evaluation Summary in collaboration with their Area Governor. From these deliberations, a Branch Membership Action Plan will emerge which addresses membership-related issues unique to its branch. This will no doubt entail regional or area meetings, training sessions, and/or leadership visits to the branches.

Here is a sample Branch Membership Action Plan:

- We will induct (10%) of present active members next year.
- We will establish a monthly guest target projected to allow us to meet our monthly induction target.
- We will offer incentives for bringing in members, with appropriate publicity for award winners.
 (Examples-quarterly free lunch drawing for latest sponsors, branch payment for guest lunches, Area quarterly award presentation for greatest sponsor performance, annual Region award presentation etc.).
- We will give awards for most prolific sponsors in the branch.
- We will have a contest with teams comprised of current members.
- We will develop recruiting aids and distribute them for use.

A Branch Quarterly Membership Report will be completed by all participating branches. This report will not only standardize membership reporting but is important for the branch to review and to show accountability for its membership performance, it is also essential for Regional Directors and Area Governors, who are responsible for improving membership-related issues within their assigned Regions and Areas.

The State Growth & Membership Committee, and its task force committees, is charged with collecting and developing ideas and methods for membership recruiting and growth and in concert with the LAP implementation, will be distributing to all branches proven successes and new ideas for consideration.

Membership News and Great Ideas that Work

Recently the Growth & Membership Committee under Chairman, Gary Pelton, conducted a brainstorming session, focusing on good ways to recruit new members. The following are twelve interesting ideas that came out of that session:

- 1. Visit local spots of Active retired persons such as Senior Centers, Community Centers, local Bocce courts, horseshoe pits, etc. Become involved in some outside activity that you like and talk up SIR.
- 2. Carry Invite cards and use them.
- 3. Present a perspective new member a Free Lunch Card with your info on the back.
- 4. Distribute a few fliers, brochures, and business cards. Don't leave it up to the other guy.
- 5. Give your sweetie a couple of brochures and cards to hand out to her lady friends. They are usually more sociable than men.
- Offer an End of Year surprise award to the top branch recruiter such as a perpetual trophy cup or plaque with the winners name and year engraved on it.
- 7. Talk to branch members who also belong to other organizations and ask them to contact those friends, who have dropped out, about what a unique organization SIR is and invite them to lunch or some SIR event.
- 8. Tell someone about SIR and then take them to their first SIR meeting. This step is very crucial. It may be the only chance you get.
- 9. Ask any and all of your recent inductees about their hobbies and ask them to head up their favorite activity, whatever that may be in your branch.
- 10. Remember this... women are usually more social than men and they have more contacts.
- 11. If the new "LAP" program isn't for your branch of less than 100 members, but you still want to continue to bring in new members and keep them, you might do well to re-visit the long standing "Membership Program" found on the SIR website under Documents, then under "Membership Program".
- 12. The best tool you will always have is still your handshake.






work to attract new members. As I thought about our Branch, I concluded that it's not just about what we do outside our meetings, but more importantly, what we do at our meetings.



The Future of Sons In Retirement Jim Stedman, Region 6 Director & Chairman State Training Committee & Member

The future of Sons In Retirement depends upon what we, the current leaders at all levels of SIR, do to assure the long term health and vitality of branches. For the last 20 years SIR membership has been steadily declining. Current membership is at about 20,000 as compared to about 30,000 in 1990. There have been 184 branch charters issued. There are now 150 branches. Seven branches closed within the last year and



there are more about to close. There is no end in sight to these declines unless we take assertive action to reverse the trend by continually recruiting and inducting more members.

We know the mechanism of branch failure. While branches are healthy and vital with strong memberships, branch leaders do not emphasize recruitment. Over time new member inductions are not sufficient to replace members lost to attrition. Membership declines. The average age of branch memberships increase because not enough new younger members are inducted to maintain a balance of younger and older members. Participation in activities and events wanes and branches become less desirable to existing and potential members. Branches muddle along for a few years continually losing members until they are no longer viable. Then they close and the retired men in these communities are no longer able to get the benefits of SIR membership.

For several years SIR leaders have developed and implemented plans for increasing membership. Even with these efforts, branch membership losses continue unabated. In an attempt to find additional solutions to the problem, we questioned leaders of currently successful branches as to how they are increasing the memberships of their branches. By learning about their solutions, we can then train ourselves to implement the recruiting elements found to be successful by these leaders.

There are 46 branches that maintained or increased membership in the year ending April 2009 – 31 of these branches increased membership. We asked Big Sirs of these branches to describe two or more of the most important elements of their successful recruitment efforts. Most of these Big Sirs responded, and the following are answers from some of them:

Glenn Cheetham, Branch 8: The time proven method of all advertising is word of mouth. A happy Sir will recommend to a friend and trust him to tell the truth. Keep the guys happy, get them involved and keep telling them to invite a friend or neighbor to lunch. We have incentives like a free lunch drawing for people who bring quests. With our great bunch of happy quys, we feel that get them in the door and they will want to golf program, at over 35 courses, is one of the best recruiting come back. Introduce guests to membership and make them aids. feel happy.

strong leadership. We have past Big Sirs, going back to 1991, who are still active contributors and participants in our branch's management and activities. This continuity, I believe, has been retiring, we are stressing that full retirement is not necessary and is the key to our successes.

The majority of our new members are introduced by active members. Many have interest in and/or have been quests at our fishing, golf, poker and/or travel activities. Some have transferred from other Area 33 SIR Branches because of same. Important to note is: Active members will not invite a potential new member unless they themselves are enjoying their SIR Experience.

I think that our initial attrition is about 10% or 20 lost active members each year. Our goal is to average 2 new active members each month. This should enable us to hold our membership numbers with a good potential for growth. I'm pleased to say that we are on track to-date in 2009.

Ron Marguglio, Branch 128: Growth is the byproduct of an organization whose members enjoy their association and want to share their experience with others. The key to a successful branch is developing a fun atmosphere with a lot of good things to do. I believe the most important element for success is a first class agenda of events and activities. We have a goal to encourage each member to participate in as many activities and events as possible. To accomplish this we have created a new position to proactively focus attention on activities in order to encourage members to try something new. Each month, at the luncheon, specific activities are highlighted.

The key to recruiting is to have involved members who enjoy the comradeship and activities they experience in SIR and want to tell others about our great group.

Mike Vadnais, Branch 160: One thing I do at the end of the meeting is gather the applications and make it a point of calling each new "potential" during the week before the next meeting and thank them for coming and ensure that we have interested them enough to return. We also entice new members by inviting them to a "Free Lunch." I make it a point at every meeting to tell everyone to bring in "your friends and neighbors."

Tim Hall, Branch 113: There have been two approaches towards securing new SIR members that I think have helped Branch 113 grow. First, at every meeting, we stress inviting new potential members to our gatherings. Second, and probably most effective, is recruitment via SIR-sponsored activities.

Bill Shankles, Branch 145: I always conclude my input to our monthly newsletter (The Grapevine) by saying: "See you at the next luncheon meeting and bring a guest." When a member training this year. By continuing with plans previously brings a guest, the guest eats **free** the first time.

I try to have guest speakers that speak on subjects that our age group would most likely be interested in and on a variety of subjects.

Many of our members are golfers and we have an behind this effort.

outstanding Golf Chairman. Many of our new members have become members because of our golf program.

Don Mattson, Branch 35: All members are regularly reminded to promote membership in SIR at various activities to which they belong. We get many new members from church groups, bicycling and golf. As our members meet new people, they are encouraged to promote the organization. Our very active

Our town newspaper publishes a senior section and we are Pete Politi, Branch 37: Branch 37 has a long history of regularly mentioned and the paper periodically will write an article about membership in SIR.

> As many men nearing retirement age are no longer fully and that lunch once a month is not hard to plan and activities are available when they are able to participate.

> **Jim Pekkain, Branch 132:** My goal at the first of the year consisted of the membership getting to know each other better & bringing in new members. Basically it involved to just ask a friend to join SIR. If you don't ask, you don't get results. So far it has been successful....as members get older, it is imperative that we bring in new and younger members to keep the branch going.

> The above are representative of all responses and show the high level of commitment of these leaders to branch recruitment efforts. New members are being recruited in their branches because these leaders are providing leadership to make it happen. Each leader and each branch is unique. but this leadership commitment to recruitment is basic to all respondents.

> Satisfied members urged to recruit their friends and neighbors, is by far the most important recruiting element reported by these branch leaders.

> Satisfied members are the result of participation in activities and events that are of interest to them. Some of the branch leaders reported numerous activities. Others reported fewer, but very popular activities, such as golf and bowling. The key ingredient seems to be for branch leaders to emphasize and strongly support activities and urge members to invite their friends who have interests in these activities to join.

> If the leaders of these 46 branches, which are located in every one of the ten SIR Regions and vary in size from small to large, can maintain and increase branch membership annually, then most others can as well.

> According to the responses of these leaders, the importance of every other element of new member recruitment pales in comparison to:

- 1. Leaders committed to recruitment.
- 2. Satisfied members who are urged to recruit their friends.
- 3. Participation by members in activities and events of interest to them.

These three elements will be the focus of leadership implemented and by developing and implementing more detailed plans around these three elements, the goal of stabilizing SIR membership becomes more of a reality in the not too distant future. This is pretty exciting stuff. Let's all get

Looking at the history of SIR, it would appear that most of our branches have failed to share the benefits of SIR membership with other retired men. In the first 40 years, SIR averaged about four new branches per year ...would you believe our last charter for a new branch was given in 2003, until this year, when we now have two provisional Branches. Even if your branch has maintained membership, it has probably not reached out to all of those retirees who could enjoy our activities. The following ideas may be helpful to increase your Branch membership.

The **Leadership Action Plan** (LAP) has had good success in identifying areas of our branches where improvements in member rewards and retention can improve attraction to new recruits. Your Big and Little Sir can self-assess these areas in your own branch ...then you can develop goals and develop an action plan.

SIR Happenings is a source of good ideas from many branches and is published quarterly. You might want to print out additional copies and place them on your luncheon tables or even post a copy on a bulletin board for members to see at each luncheon

Some more ideas on recruiting and retention:

Recruitment using sir cards and SIR brochures

- Are you using SIR Cards for members?
- Are you using SIR Brochures?
- Have any of your members given one to their spouse for her friend's husband?
- Are you joining other branches to place Area Brochure holders in public locations?
- What is your conversion rate of guests to new members?
- Do you have an Area Publicity & Recruitment person?

- Is your branch mainly a single sport branch?
- How many activities do you have?
- How many couples activities?
- Do you have any Area activities?

Membership relations

- Do you use the Membership Program Implementation?
- How many new members are still with you after two years?

• Do you have a job or committee function for each of your BEC Directors?

Self-assessment

- Based on the dozens of replies to the LAP questionnaire, you can now review your own branch efforts in three key areas.



SIR Insurance Coverage

John Thomason,

Chairman State Insurance Committee

The SIR Insurance Committee provides the insurance coverage that the Branches and their members need to protect themselves and SIR during the myriad of activities that the Branches sponsor on behalf of their members. The policies that the committee obtains to protect the organization are:

General Liability. This policy insures against claims which may have been caused by SIR activities. This provides protection to the organizations that provides our meeting places for luncheons, picnics, sporting events, etc. This policy enables SIR to provide to these organizations a Certificate of Insurance describing our general liability coverage.

Vehicle Insurance. This coverage is necessary to protect SIR in case a SIR member is negligent when using his own car in a SIR activity and the resulting damage is greater than the member's own vehicle policy limits.

Liquor Liability. If a Branch serves its own liquor, the Branch requires a State liquor license and insurance for liquor caused damages. Our policy provides this coverage and liquor liability is included in the Certificate of Insurance provided to our meeting places.

Fidelity Bond. All officers, directors and members are bonded for dishonest acts.

Moneys and Securities. A loss due to burglary or robbery of monies handled by a Branch Treasurer, Golf or Bowling Tournament Chair and others is covered under this policy.

Foreign Travel. This policy covers SIR travel activities outside the US and Canada.

The SIR claim history has been close to perfect, i.e., only one claim has ever been filed against SIR and that involved a San Francisco Branch activity in 1995, where a member was using his car to transport a SIR choral group and had an injury accident. He was an "assigned risk" and had only \$50,000 in liability coverage, far lower than the coverage of 99% of our members. When the claim was filed, it exceeded the member's coverage and SIR was therefore included as a defendant. Two years later and after much paperwork, the claim was closed at less than the member's coverage and SIR's insurance was not affected... Whew! Thus, SIR has a clean insurance claim record and this is reflected in our low premium cost.

The Committee is a standing committee composed of three members. At this time the Chair is John Thomason, from Branch 92, in Santa Rosa. John is a former Risk Manager for the City of Anaheim and managed the insurance program for the City, Convention Center, Stadium and Electric Utility. The other members are Bob Ingersoll and Roger Borgerson both, from Branch 8, in Walnut Creek. Bob is a former independent broker who finished his career as an employee of a major property and casualty carrier. Roger is a former Claims Manager for a major carrier.

Most SIR forms, the SIR Manual, the State Roster and many other documents of interest are on the website. How should you view the Website? First launch your web browser. Internet Explorer and Mozilla Firefox are common web browsers.

In the address box type in "sirinc.org" without the quotation marks and press enter. The SIR website Home Page shown at the upper right will appear.

You will see on the Home Page headings like "How To Join" and "Branch Websites." Click on them and see what a good job our Webmaster and his website team have done.

To move from the "Public" Home Page, to the SIR section click on the "SIR Documents" link. You will be prompted to enter User Name (safety) and Password (first). Note: check the "Remember Password" box.

You are now on the "SIR Documents" page shown at the lower right where you will find a host of interesting documents. A recent view of the Documents page is shown in the image at right. For a test, click on the "Complete list of SIR Forms" link and then click on "Form 20-Branch Personnel" which is the form Branch Secretaries use to report new Branch Officers and changes. It can be filled in on the screen if you want and then printed or just printed as a blank form. It is also available as a Microsoft Word document. To access some of the SIR forms you need the "Adobe Reader"" on your computer. It is free and directions for downloading are on the website.

"SIR Documents" page is, "State Roster & Branch Locator."
These documents contain names and addresses, so to preserve members' privacy you are prompted for a User name and Password to view these documents. Your Branch Email Contact has the User name and Password and will gladly give it to you. It is SIR policy to not publish these.

Happenings at the State Board Meeting Excerpts from the minutes of the November 2009 State Board Meeting

<u>President Reiser</u> called the November State Board Meeting to order.

<u>Vice President Kendrick</u> made a number of comments and mentioned how pleased and surprised he was when President Reiser presented him with an Honorary Life Membership at a Branch luncheon meeting.

<u>Secretary Gruber</u> gave his report concerning some of the activities he has been engaged in and for the record, reported that we have 151 active Branches, two of which are in provisional status.

<u>Treasurer Mannell</u> went over financial matters in some detail and stated that SIRinc is in sound shape and will probably finish the year in good financial condition.

<u>Rules Committee member</u> Gruber, representing Chairman Tom Smith, presented some proposed rule changes. The rules were approved and will be posted on the SIR Website.

Area Governor Training Chairman Stedman delivered a complete summary of the recent AG Training meeting and said that evaluations of the meetings by the attending Area Governors and Regional Directors were generally very favorable.

Information Systems Chairman Sale emphasized the need to begin encouraging the Branches to elect Branch Secretaries and Branch Treasurers who are "computer literate". He suggested that we start by making suggestions and working toward eventually enacting rules to that effect. Sale explained the new Branch Database, to be made available for Branch use. It is intended to capture all kinds of data about individuals in a Branch and the resultant database can suit the needs of the officers and chairmen from that one source. Several Branches have already shown an interest in this program.

<u>State Certificates Chairman Donovan</u> covered the several types of certificates that have been issued so far this year. He highlighted the 66 Honorary Life Membership Awards that were presented during the year and mentioned that there are 154 HLM awards still available to the Branches.

President Reiser suggested several topics that the 2010 Board might want to consider. To stimulate readership of SIR Happenings, some kind of contest embedded in the newsletter might be helpful. He raised the possibility of a contest related to recruiting new members and suggested that the G & M Committee take a look at the idea. He mentioned that earlier in the year we had a presentation on a Public Relations program. We haven't been able to find a member to head up such an endeavor. Dave feels that the function is important to the organization and expressed his hopes that the position will be filled soon. Dave brought up the 30,000 color brochures that were distributed to the Branches. He believes the brochures were well received and the efforts were worthwhile, and suggested that the incoming Board may want to consider doing it again.

<u>2010 President Kendrick</u> presented President Reiser with an Honorary Life Membership certificate. Buck thanked the officers, committeemen and appointees that have agreed to serve next year. He said, as President, he will put forth his best efforts and solicited ideas from the rest of the leaders in the room for a successful year.

<u>President Reiser</u> adjourned the meeting. The next Board meeting will be in January.



I want to focus this year on developing strong leadership and goal setting. I think it is going to take new leadership from the Regional Directors, the Area Governors and the Branch Executive Committees to solve the problem. I hope every Sir in a leadership position will read my mission statement carefully and thoughtfully so we can all get on the same page.

The Regional Directors and Area Governors must assume a more intensive role in guiding and supporting the Branch operations and their membership efforts. It means much more face to face interaction with the Branch leaders...to train them and help them become more successful. Leaders at all levels must be familiar with their responsibilities, as outlined in SIR rules, to properly perform their duties and responsibilities.

According to Mike, he is an avid, but mediocre golfer,




and an even more mediocre bowler. He still follows English soccer and is a diehard Sharks fan. Whenever he can find some free time, he also likes to sing and play guitar.





Table Pool



RECRUIT, VITALIZE, AND RETAIN MEMBERSHIP IN 2010

Happenings at the State Board Meeting Excerpts from the minutes of the January 2010 State Board Meeting

<u>President Kendrick</u> conducted the meeting. The key points he made to the Board about the serious membership situation are summarized in his President's column on page 1 of this edition of Happenings.

Vice President & Past Treasurer Mannell covered year end finances. He said we ended up the year with a net reduction in funds of approximately \$3,500 and a cash balance of about \$105,000. He said we're in pretty good financial shape and have some excess funds on hand.

Assistant Secretary Stephens reported that Secretary Gary Gruber is in the hospital having back surgery and he would be recording the minutes. A member of the Board asked that Secretary Gruber be commended on his efficiency, timeliness in keeping the records and the website up to date and that he just does a marvelous job. President Kendrick noted that Secretary Gruber is part of a team lead by Dwight Sale and that the Team is doing a great job.

<u>Treasurer Berry</u> said he is still short a few form 28's before he can file our IRS statement for the year which establishes that SIR is a non-profit organization.

Information Systems Chairman Sale reported that one of our tasks this past year was the Data Base update to assist Branches in keeping their data electronically instead of in a shoe box or a file cabinet. The job has taken a year rather than the two months that was anticipated. A "beta" program will be becoming out soon. It will have a financial program, an attendance program, and other programs.

<u>Publicity Chairman Schick</u> talked about publicity for Sons In Retirement and his work with the LAP last year. He suggested a reward be provided for those who sponsor a certain number of new members. After much discussion, a motion to table the issue and refer it to the Rules Committee was passed.

<u>Bowling Chairman Elvik</u> handed out a schedule of the 23 tournaments that will be held this year which was approved by the Board.

Golf Chairman Drennan said that due to economics, participation in State golf events was down compared to previous years, so a focus on new venues was needed. The Board approved the schedule for 2010. He commented that the golf program does bring in new members.

Past President Mel Augustine reported he is responsible for the A's, Warriors, and Raiders games. He expressed concern about the lack of attendance by SIR members and we need to do a better job of promoting the games. The Board approved the dates for the games. Insurance Chairman Thomason reported the insurance premium has been lowered for 2010 as compared with the previous year. Travelers Insurance Company has reviewed our risks and lowered the premium slightly. He

noted there is an opening on the Insurance committee for a person that has a background in property management and casualty issues.

<u>Travel Chairman Perry</u> mentioned that last year SIR Branches scheduled 139 travel events – 25 went to foreign destinations – 8 were cruises to Alaska – and the remaining events were local or domestic. He expressed concern over the many Branches that have been remiss in submitting necessary forms required under the SIR Travel Code. He also said that he has been the Chairman for the past ten years and is retiring.

<u>**OLD BUSINESS:**</u> The Board discussed the effectiveness of the Tri Fold SIR Brochure and whether we should print some more. The response was not too positive...some Branches liked them, some were just ok, and some were just not happy with them. The Board decided to convert the file from PDF to a Word document and send it to contacts in the Branches.

NEW BUSINESS: Treasurer Mike Berry reviewed the mileage reimbursement rate and compared it with the IRS rate and proposed a reduction from fifty cents to forty-five cents a mile. Because of all the work involved in making the changes, the Board decided not to reduce the rate.

Training Committee Chairman Stedman presented a set of charts showing how membership has diminished and how it will continue to decline if the current path is taken. He showed that membership has gone from 32,000 at the peak down to 20,000 currently. He stated that as the Branches get older, they lose the ability to get leadership, activities, etc to the point that they can't recover. In his view the solution is to induct 10% of our membership each year. He offered a resolution for consideration by the Board which outlines the process for membership improvement and the survival of the Branches.

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

President Buck's Challenge



My principal thrust this year is to stabilize the membership level and stop continued losses. My goal is to find the bottom and level off the loss curve, so that we can start to grow membership again. To this end I have been working with the State Board to

emphasize leadership from the State levels to the Branches.

In a volunteer organization like SIR, it is most effective to lead by example and with face to face communications. It is never advisable to be dictatorial or overbearing in dealing with any other Sir in any position relative to your own. It is always best to try to achieve consensus before proceeding with any endeavor, but that said, leaders must step up to personal responsibility for performance of the duties and assignments of any position to which they are assigned or elected.

I feel we must move toward a "Pro-Active" model, offering effective leadership from the State Board through the Regional Directors and Area Governors to the Branch. I want the Directors and Governors to intensify their management oversight and support efforts to the Branches, and be the resource point of contact for the operations of the Branches. This will be somewhat upsetting to some of the more independent minded Branch leaders because the State will be seen as interfering with the Branch's historic mode of operation. Others will welcome the support and leadership guidance. While the

change in leadership culture will not be easy or quickly accomplished, the membership crisis demands that we start the process without delay.

At the April State Board meeting a resolution was passed that sets an annual recruiting goal for each branch of 10% of their membership. This is based upon the well established management principles of setting a goal and then focusing upon it until it is met or exceeded. We know that an arbitrary 10% goal will not stop the losses in all branches, but it was selected to try to stem the loss rate within a year. Without doubt, some adjustments will be needed to customize it for individual Branch situations.

Another part of the change that was introduced at the State Board meeting is to revitalize and expand the leadership training program. The Branch Leadership Guide, that you are familiar with, is being upgraded by the Training Committee under Jim Stedman. It will describe leadership responsibilities for the Regional Directors, Area Governors and Big Sirs. On October 19th we will provide training for all these leaders instead of just the Area Governors as we have in past years. The incoming Area governors and Big Sirs will then provide the training for incoming Branch officers before they take office on January 1st.

Together we can solve this membership crisis by developing and implementing effective leadership by the State Board of Directors, Regional Directors, Area Governors, Big Sirs, and Branch Executive Committees. It will take time and effort, but I believe leadership is the answer to the membership crisis of SIR.

Spotlight on SIR Officers

Bob Mannell - State Vice President

Our Vice President is the past SIR State Treasurer and his election to that position back in 2005 proved



to be a wise choice. At that time, SIR was not in good financial condition and during Bob's four years as Treasurer, expenses were dramatically reduced at the State level – in spite of a declining membership and as a consequence, declining revenues – but today, SIR is in excellent financial shape. Bob

says that he is proud to have been part of the team that made it happen.

Bob Mannell was born and raised on a farm in Northeast Kansas. He attended a one-room country school through the eighth grade and when he graduated from eighth grade, there were only three students in the school. After high school, he attended Kansas State University. Bob says that in one of his "less brilliant career moves," he left school to go to work for the Santa Fe Railway in the accounting department in Topeka, Kansas.

After a couple of career changes, a marriage, and two children, he joined IBM as a computer programmer in Kansas City. After 17 years with IBM, and a divorce, Bob moved to Maryland to work on an installation at the NASA Goddard Space Flight Center with ROLM...a telecommunications company that IBM had acquired. The last several years at ROLM were spent as a Product Manager responsible for Global Multimedia Messaging products.

ROLM's corporate headquarters were in Santa Clara and he took a ninety-day temporary assignment there in 1987. Bob liked the climate, the job, found a lady he loved and never left California. He held several corporate staff and management positions in service, sales support, and marketing during his tenure with the company, until his retirement in 2002.

In 2003, his father-in-law introduced him to SIR and he says he was hooked and became the Branch 39 Treasurer the next year. The following year a request went out to all the Branches to find a candidate for Assistant State Treasurer, but as it turned out, what was needed was a State Treasurer. Bob agreed to run and was elected. He served from 2005 through 2009, when he was elected Vice President.


Bob's other interests are golf, gardening, woodworking, and grandkids, but as usual... more interests than time!

Branch 58 recently had quite an interesting speaker who spoke about earthquakes and answered the question: Where have the sea lions of San Francisco's Pier 39 gone? The answer was ...off the coast of Oregon following bait fish that are following warm water currents! A geologist and long time student of earthquakes James Berkland (see picture) began to publish his earthquake predictions 21 years ago in his newsletter.

His earthquake predictions have continued to score better than 75%, or three times the chance expectation which is less than 25%.

Since mid-1997 he has maintained a Website (syzygyjob. com) with webmaster Will Fletcher. In his presentation Jim shared information about high tides, full moon phases,

and even keeping watch on the missing pet section of newspapers as indicators of upcoming earthquakes. He accurately predicted the World Series Quake and keeps a record of his accuracy in his newsletter.

This was a very interesting program that stimulated many questions and other observations from branch members - we recommend him to shake up your luncheon crowd too.

The group decided their next project would be a mission-style library stool. Members are building their stools from different woods —i.e., walnut, cherry, or maple, for different looks



The group has now grown to nine members, but we are always ready to welcome newcomers. The mission-style stool is a project that has taken several months to complete. The members with more skills have enjoyed helping those with less experience as they learn to do such things as gluing up the

thicker legs of the stool, and making mortise and tendon joints. We also learned to use special tools to cut and drill squared holes through the wood with matching parts to make tight fitting joints. There was a lot of band saw work and the use of routers and pattern bits for shaping the wooden parts of the stool.

The guys are having so much fun they have decided to meet twice monthly for half a day. Now, as the group approaches completion of the library stool project, we are discussing what to tackle next. Some possibilities include building a pair of custom saw-horses, a trophy case for a local school, a mission-style chair, or whatever? Happenings at the State Board Meeting Excerpts from the minutes of the April 2010 State Board Meeting

President Kendrick called the meeting to order. He reiterated the 2010 Mission Statement and the Slogan and was pleased to see them posted in Branch Bulletins around the state. He noted that Travel Chairman, Bob Perry had passed away and Larry Garvin has been appointed to the position.

<u>Vice President Robert Mannell</u> put in a plea for help in finding replacements for our leadership. He also discussed mementos for the Annual Meeting.

Assistant Secretary Hal Stephens said he would record the minutes in the absence of Secretary, Gary Gruber. As Chairman of the Badge Committee, he said our awards supplier is providing excellent service. He further stated that all the SI-100's have been filed with the Secretary of State on behalf of the Branches.

<u>Treasurer Mike Berry</u> reported that State funds are down somewhat due to the falling membership, but the treasury is still in very good shape. He said that he was pleased that all the Audit Reports he had received were clean, but he is still missing many reports.

<u>Assistant Treasurer Karl Ryden</u> was pleased to say that all 148 Branches had reported with the Form 28.

<u>President Buck Kendrick</u> (See the "Presidents Column" on the front page of this edition for a summary of the comments he made to the Board.) Each of the nine Regional Directors then reported on issues in their Regions.

InfoSys Chairman and Past President Dwight Sale talked about the data base changes, the membership in the database.

<u>State Certificates Chairman and Past President</u> <u>Jim Donovan</u> clarified the procedures for requesting and receiving Senior Certificates and asked that they be sent to him.

<u>State Insurance Chairman John Thomason</u> said that our insurance costs have gone down. He also mentioned a need to recruit additional members to the committee.

Chairmen of the sporting events, Past
President Mel Augustine, Chuck Roberts, Neil
Mayo and John Levis reported on SIR days at the
various sporting events including the Athletics,
Raiders, Warriors, Giants, River Cats, and the
Fresno team. Flyers will be sent to Branches in the
appropriate areas to let members become aware
of the events.

<u>Chairman "Smitty" Smith of the Rules</u> <u>Committee</u> proposed a series of rule changes.

Publicity Committee Chairman Walter Schick discussed Branch development saying that we now have a total of at least 75 different Branch activities.

President Buck's Challenge



I have been very encouraged by many of the branch reactions to the 10% recruitment goal that was set by the Board. Early results from the Form 27 reports and some of the quarterly reports, indicate that the process is working and several branches have already met their recruitment goal for the year, while others are ahead of pace for meeting it. We don't yet have enough information to know if we have leveled off the membership

loss trends, but I have confidence in the results of the "Pro-Active" leadership of our Directors and Governors. I have to note that not all of our branches have willingly agreed to participate and the leadership team has encountered some "push back." It is my goal that all the branches adopt the process and regain their healthy membership levels. Most of the reports from the participating branches praise the process and acknowledge that it really focuses their attention on their membership issues in ways they never had before.



(see picture). Attendance at our meetings averages about ten members. Tim Finley, who is also a Director and the Branch Photographer, is the "facilitator" of the group.



RECRUIT, VITALIZE, AND RETAIN MEMBERSHIP IN 2010

Happenings at the State Board Meeting Excerpts from the minutes of the June 2010 State Board Meeting

President Kendrick, in his introductory comments, complying with the Travel Code, especially in the was pleased to announce that Branch 35 has taken in 35 new members through May. Speaking for Vice President Mannell, Kendrick indicated that he has come up with a plan for mementos to be given to attendees at the August 2nd Annual Meeting. He then made some comments on items that would be coming up later in the meeting.

Assistant Secretary Hal Stephens reported that he would be processing the final set of Forms SI-100 for the year 2010. He also spoke about the badges that are available from Arnolds for Awards, and stated that the company is going to be recognized in an upcoming issue of SIR Happenings.

Assistant Treasurer Karl Ryden, reporting for Treasurer Mike Berry, stated that the State financial reports as of May 31st have been published and distributed. Basically, income is down and expenses are up, except insurance premiums are down.

G & M Member Stedman presented a detailed report on the implementation of the new Form 27 Branch Membership Report. 45% of the Branches have submitted the report and he is pleased with what the reported figures reflect. The instructions for the form will be simplified. He encouraged the Regional Directors to help him secure reports from every Branch.

Regional Directors each gave a report on the goings-on in his Region, mainly emphasizing membership and endeavors to maintain and increase membership counts.

Nominating Committee Chairman Reiser offered the slate of nominees for the 2011 Elected Officers, to be voted on at the August Annual Meeting.

Publicity & Tools Chairman Schick spoke on behalf of Growth and Management Chairman Hubinger and referred the Board to a report prepared by the committee chairman covering some of the projects the committee is working on. He also talked about some of the things his new committee is doing and referred members to the written report he had prepared.

InfoSys Chairman Dwight Sale led a discussion about the growing pains associated with getting Branches to implement the database program.

Travel Chairman Garvin reported that he is experiencing the old problem with Branches not submission of the proper forms to the State Travel Committee.

Training Committee Chairman Stedman outlined his plans for the October 2010 Training Session. Regional Directors, Area Governors and Big Sirs will be required to attend. The Branch Leaders Guide is being expanded to include all three groups and will be renamed "State Leaders Guide."

Rules Committee Chairman Smith presented some proposed rules changes and they were approved.

President Kendrick led a discussion of the mementos to be given out at the Annual Meeting and a motion to approve the cost was passed. Kendrick indicated he wanted to re-activate the RV Committee and covered some of the issues that needed to be addressed. A motion to re-activate the RV Committee was passed. He introduced a proposal to offer a Certificate of Membership to the Branches, available from the SIR Forms Page on the website. He showed a draft of the certificate and after discussion, a motion was passed to approve implementation of the certificate.

In his concluding remarks, President Kendrick said we have much work to do in the second half of the year to reach the 10% membership goal in all the Branches. He said he feels that many Branches are still operating the way they always have, which can lead to failure and encouraged the leadership to help the Branches adopt new ideas that work and also revitalize their activities to improve the health and vitality of the Branches and increase membership.

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

Most of us recognize a fiscal responsibility involved in membership and do contribute enough money to allow our branches to

State President Buck Kendrick, presented an Honorary Life Membership to Don Stacks for his outstanding service to Branch 74 (see picture). Don




has served as Big Sir and has been active in all of the Branch activities.


members. To see a list of all the 70+ activities that our Branches are currently offering, go to the SIR website: sirinc.org.

Green Energy

In October, 25 members from Branch 92 (including 3 wives) traveled by bus up to The Geysers to visit the steam production and power generation facilities of the Northern California Power Agency. The Geysers, located 40 miles north of Santa Rosa, is the largest geothermal facility in the world with two dozen power plants capable of continuously generating about 2 million kilowatts of "green" renewable energy from the underlying naturally occurring steam resource. More than 500 hundred production wells have been drilled to depths ranging from 6 to 11 thousand feet and the steam they produce is transported through a network of surface pipes for delivery to the power plants (see picture). This year marks the 50th anniversary of the commercial development that began in 1960.

After listening to a geologic explanation of why the steam



reservoir exists here (see picture), we learned how the wells are drilled to most effectively intersect the deeply underlying steamfilled fractures to maximize steam production. Next we were told the importance of

injecting water back into the reservoir water – including municipally treated wastewater transported by pipeline from Santa Rosa and Lake County – as a means to effectively create a continuously renewed supply of injection-derived-steam and to significantly extend the life of the power generating facilities.

We all learned a lot, enjoyed a nice clear day and the great views from the ridge tops, and the good fellowship of Branch members on a day away together.

Passion Play

On June 6th, several members of SIR and their guests embarked upon a nine day tour of Germany to include viewing the world famous Passion Play performed once every ten years by inhabitants of the village of Oberammergau (see picture). The play reenacts the agony and crucifixion of Christ and is performed to fulfill a pledge made to God which resulted in



the village being spared from the Black Plague during the 17th century.

Although the play was the main focus, the trip provided many opportunities to view historical and contemporary aspects of Germany. The group arrived in Frankfurt Germany and after exploring the city began preparing for a Rhine River cruise to Remagen and Cologne. The river cruise provided views of castle-crested hills, terraced vineyards and a host of picturesque towns along the river banks. A highlight was the side trek to view the remains of the Remagan Bridge, which during WWII was captured by American troops thereby fracturing the German army's western line. The afternoon was spent in Cologne where among other features the group visited the spectacular Gothic cathedral. The group took the train to Berlin for a two day exploration of the city's restaurants, nightlife, and historical sites such as the restored Reichstag, the Brandenburg Gate, and the huge Victory Column in Tiergarten Park. Of great interest, was viewing remnants of the Berlin Wall and Checkpoint Charlie, reminders of the time when the city was split into Eastern and Western sectors.

The group departed Berlin on a two-day bus trip to visit Leipzig, Nuremberg, Rothenburg and Munich on the way to Oberammergau. Each city has its own character and provided a diverse experience for our group.

The accommodations in Oberammergau were comfortable and our seats for the play were great. The stage was open with a covering to protect the actors from the weather. The play was performed in German and vividly portrayed the events which culminated in Christ's death on the cross.


The final days of the trip were spent visiting Lindau, the Black Forest, Heidelberg and finally Frankfurt, for the flight back home.





We thought the series would be of interest to our readers and so we have decided to publish the four part series beginning in this edition and the following three editions.

Rob, our recently-retired fictional hero, is discovering the downsides of not devoting a full day, every day, to his boss and his long-time employer.

Retirement was great at first. He slept in a bit each morning and read the paper before getting dressed. The long "honeydo list" was attacked and admittedly the easier jobs went first. He laid out detailed plans on how to handle the minor remodeling he and his wife had discussed so many times. He found Lowe's and Home Depot less crowded than he was used to on the weekends. He had always loved golf and long walks and now began to investigate how to enjoy them at his leisure. There was even a list of local attractions he'd always meant to visit, and they now appeared within the realm of possibility. He even enjoyed having lunch with his wife whenever she wasn't off to one of her activities. The thought of volunteering flicked in and out as well. Unconsciously he even expected a call or two from his employer or old business associates to ask him to do a little part-time fill-in work to help plug that gigantic hole he must have left at work.

But oh – the six month anniversary was coming up, and things were not as rosy as he had hoped. First and foremost, he was bored. The camaraderie and intellectual stimulation he had had at work was somehow missing. The major indepth conversations about sports and politics he had enjoyed with fellow workers was now limited to his wife. He knew how she felt about most topics as she did about his opinions. You can go over this just so many times. They had had a great time on that trip to Europe but after three weeks together, he was secretly glad to be home.

The call from his employer and other business associates never came, or if they did he got the feeling that they really didn't care about his opinion any more.

Golf presented its own problem. All the guys he used to play with on the weekends were unavailable during the week, and when he checked about joining them on the weekends he found the foursomes filled. So, in 2011, I'm asking you to "BE A FRIEND, BRING A FRIEND." Share that camaraderie and those activities that only SIR has to offer with your friends and at the same time, help regain positive growth in membership so we may continue doing the great things that SIR has done for retired men for the past 53 years.

One of our most promising successes in 2010 was significant slowing of membership loss in many branches. Form 27 became a required part of the monthly reporting on January 1, 2011. While I certainly have heard from a few Big Sirs that this is not their favorite monthly activity, it has proven to be a very valuable tool that provides critical membership information that was never captured and used in most branches. Extensive membership information and history is available on the SIR website where you can track our success and, in some branches, our lack of success. We have slowed, but not yet stopped, our overall membership losses. We must continue

New Member Recruitment Success Jim Stedman, Vice President

At its January 2011 meeting the state board of directors learned that new member recruiting efforts have reduced membership losses from nearly 5% in previous years to about 2.5% in 2010.

Branch leaders in 2010 were challenged to recruit new members at the rate of 10% of branch membership. The leaders in 88 branches responded. They exceeded the challenge and recruited at the rate of 13.2%. These branch leaders inducted 1,587 new members.

These Branch leaders report that they have attractive branches with activities and events of interest to their members. They report that modern retirees are joiners once they see opportunities for participating in these activities and events and for socializing with other retired men.

In 2011 we expect all branch leaders to respond to the challenge. Let's keep this positive trend going.

BRING A FRIEND TO LUNCH, **SPONSOR A NEW MEMBER**

to emphasize the recruiting of new members in all Branches at a pace greater than our average annual attrition rate of 10 to 14% in order to insure long term viability.

One of the continuing problems that SIR faces is the lack of volunteers for leadership positions in SIR. The problem exists at the Branch, Area, Regional, and State levels. I will talk about this in more detail in a future column, but in the interim, please volunteer to use the skills and experience you have gained in your work career to help lead this great organization.

I look forward to 2011 as a year of positive membership trends, greater member participation in leadership roles, more activities available to more members, and a resurgence of Sons In Retirement as "THE" organization for retired men. None of these objectives will be easy, but with everyone contributing we can make 2011 a growth year for SIR.

Writing Your Life Stories

Roger Sperling, Chairman Writing Your Life Stories Activity

Why do we write stories in our Sons In Retirement writing group? Why do we call this Branch 8 activity "Writing Your Life Stories" and not "...Your Life Story". Simply because we use a proven method to greatly speed up the daunting process of writing our personal histories to share with our families. We call this, "Writing our biographies...one story at a time."

Anyone who has tried to sit down to write his life story knows that it is difficult—and getting started is the hardest part of all. Even though we may have the urge to put into writing our personal history we don't quite know where to start. We might assume we should start at the beginning and put on paper (or a computer screen) a chronological recitation of the facts and dates, the persons and events of our life so far. While some skilled writers may be able to follow that path the rest of us can greatly benefit from another approach. By writing a series of short stories -- over a period of time -- we will accumulate enough recorded memories to tell the story of our life's journey.

Writing privately may be the loneliest occupation there is. Even professional authors admit to having "blank page fever" when it comes to getting their thoughts written down. Others explain how they need to have a discipline: writing so many



words or pages every day to get the job done. What are we as amateurs to do with this seemingly impossible task? Most importantly we choose to be part of a small group of likeminded men who meet regularly (monthly or more often) to have our memories stimulated about past events in our lives that allow us to write small pieces of our history.

Our concept is simple: by writing short stories—usually one or two pages in 20 or 30 minutes time—we capture a singular event, or describe a person's effect on our lives, or explain a decision that determined how we arrived at this point in our lives. We use the

experience of trained facilitators to guide us, through the use of examples of good writing by other authors, as well as lists of questions—we call them "triggers"—to stimulate us to remember a key event in our life experience (say in our childhood marriage) or a critical aspect of our personhood (say about our career or health).

One author has suggested that we focus on very small topics to sharpen our writing. She tells that on her desk is a tiny picture frame—only one inch on a side—to remind her daily to frame her stories in the smallest possible way. When we follow that advice we can more succinctly write from memory a meaningful part of our life that we want to tell our family. It is like a patchwork quilt: our short stories are like the small squares of a quilt that get stitched together to present a much bigger picture. Our stories when gathered ("stitched") together will tell our life story—who we are and how we got to where we are today.

It has been our experience over the last several years that part of the "magic" of the "Writing Your Life Stories" activity derives from small group dynamics. When we meet to write and read aloud our individual stories—those written in the class session and others written at home--we find it mutually supportive. Sharing personal stories (always voluntary) encourages us to bond together as we learn interesting details about other life journeys. And working together as a group and hearing other's stories, invariably "triggers" new thoughts about something each of us may some day write about.

We are not professional writers but it is a certainty, that when members of our families (spouse, child or friend) are able to read some day what we wrote about ourselves, they will be forever grateful.

We have established some objectives that the committee would like to accomplish. Some of these will take years to finish, while others can be achieved quickly. For example, we would like to assist in creating SIR RV Clubs in Branches, Areas and Regions where there is RV interest, but where no RV clubs now exist. We could provide them with guidelines, support, and suggestions to help them to establish their local RV club.

Another idea that was floated was to have some "Group" RV travel. This could be accomplished in several ways. One way might be to have Pre-programmed SIR RV trips. 

I don't expect a major run on these sites, but I encourage you techies out there to begin using them.

Over the next few years we will begin to test methods of recruiting by using these tools. Believe me, there is a generation out there waiting to climb aboard!

Happenings at the State Board Meeting Excerpts from the minutes of the January 2011 State Board Meeting

President Bob Mannell in his opening comments indicated | Rules Committee Chairman Gary Pelton referred to there will be continued emphasis on membership, recruitment, and retention this year and on the use of the Monthly Branch Membership Report (Form 27) and the Big SIR Quarterly Membership written report. He also wants to encourage more Branch and Area wide activities to make SIR more attractive to current and new members. Bob said management of SIR is a team effort and not up to just one person, indicating all 16 Board Members have the combined leadership responsibility. He said he encourages and will listen to any ideas the Board members have to

Vice President Jim Stedman indicated his priorities for this year are to support President Bob Mannell, to continue his work as Chairman of the Training Committee, and to continue his effort on recruitment and retention of members.

Secretary Eckart Sellinger asked the Regional Directors to remind their Branches the 2011 Branch Rosters are to be to him by the end of February and have to be paper based no electronic versions.

Treasurer Gus Lopez commented on the quarterly pro-rata process and requested Branches not seal their payment envelopes so tightly as it makes it very difficult when opening 150 plus taped envelopes each quarter.

Past Treasurer (2010) Mike Berry provided a recap of 2010 referring to the handouts he prepared for the meeting. In summary, he indicated the financial data at the State level shows a continuing decline in Revenue due to fewer members, the recession causing Bank Interest to be lower and fewer members traveling overseas, reducing the Foreign Travel fee income. The loss in revenue is offset by reductions in Insurance expense due to a lower membership.

Assistant Treasurer Karl Ryden said he needs the Branch Audit reports by the end of February. He discussed the Form 28 process and the need for Branches to submit them to him by the 10th of the following month.

Area Governor Gary Pelton provided a comprehensive status report on the Area 21 probation indicating success in a very difficult situation.

Nominating Committee Chairman Buck

Kendrick recapped his progress on finding candidates for 2012 State positions. He said it is all of our responsibility to help identify worthy candidates for State jobs and to let him know who to consider.

Information Systems Chairman Dwight Sale said he needs more help with different aspects of the SIR data base and asked for volunteers to contact him. One major objective this year is to finish updating the SIR Database Manual. He also commented on the effort to use the Data Base to help file the Form 100's. He encouraged the Branches to hold elections for 2012 on time and to make sure the Form 20 is filed out as soon as possible.

his handout documenting last weeks Rules Committee meeting and proposed rule changes.

Growth & Membership Chairman Harry Hubinger said the committee is focusing on current "Social Networking" Web sites for information and recruiting such as Wikipedia, U-Tube, Face Book, etc.

Publicity & Tools Chairman Walter Schick is in need of an additional member for his committee who has a professional background in "publicity". During his presentation he talked about their continued effort enhancing their SIR website section with proven ways of good practices for Branches to use.

Insurance Chairman John Thomason indicated he will be meeting next month with our broker to renew our insurance effective on March 1st.

Certificates Chairman Jim Donovan recapped 2010 certificate activity as follows: 327 Senior/Super Senior/ Century certificates issued...38 Honorary Lifetime Members... and 264 Certificates of Appreciation. He also noted that at this time there are 18 Branches that have no HLM's and there are 36 Branches that have no Senior/Super Senior/Century awards. He emphasized how important member recognition is to our success.

Training/Membership Training Chairman Jim Stedman pointed out that the decline in membership dropped significantly last year due to efforts started in 2008 to lift Branch maximum member limits and introduction of basic leadership methods of setting and measuring goals. The introduction of Form 27 and quarterly Big SIR reporting on membership was also introduced last year. He indicated 88 Branches are reporting using Form 27 and his goal for this year is to get 100% of the Branches reporting on Form 27.

Travel Chairman Larry Garvin said they have finished updating the Travel Agency documents and sent their Travel Newsletter to Branch Travel Chairmen. They intend to post approved travel agencies on the SIR Website soon.

Golf Chairman Gene Drennan presented the 2011 Statewide Golf Schedule for Board approval.

President Bob Mannell presented the 2011 State Bowling Tournament schedule for Board approval. He indicated the Committee is still looking for a tournament location and sponsor for the May 16-18 Annual State Tournament.

Regional Directors Reports: Each of the Regional Directors gave a report to the Board on the progress they are making in their Regions and also covered some of the challenges and problems they are facing.

President Bob Mannell said in closing the meeting that he is very pleased with the consistency of goals in the Regions such as the 10% Membership goal. He asked we keep in mind that we should do what we do in our jobs for the overall benefit of SIR at all times. He wants to keep the 10% Membership goal for this year and not raise it even though reality is 13%. He thanked everyone for attending and their continued support.



This is the first in a series of articles by the Publicity & Tools Committee suggesting how ladies can be included in many of our Branch activities and the benefits of doing so.

What to do when Parking is a Problem?

What does a branch do when the number of parking spaces at their luncheon venue is insufficient for its membership?

However, a software program for converting addresses to geographic coordinates was available and that solved the problem, until the company went out of business in 2008!

More recently, mapping has been made simpler, and now using a site – www.batchgeo.com – it is easy to create free maps showing where members live, or where branches are located. The maps are created as Google map pages, which means you can easily zoom in to the street level, and in some cases you can actually see an image of the house and the streets in the neighborhood. The error rate is now improved. In my early maps about 10% of the icons were not as close to the real address as one would hope.


The upper Map at the right shows the location of all our Branch members. The lower Map is an example of where four members live relatively close to each other and could easily share rides. Additional information can be included, so when an icon is clicked it displays some roster information as shown in the lower Map - personal sensitive information has been hidden in this example.

Since January 2011, Branch 8 meets at the Concord Hilton in Concord... no parking problems now, but members can still use the maps to find a rideshare partner.





Happenings at the State Board Meeting Excerpts from the minutes of the June 2011 Meeting

Remarks from State Officers:

President Bob Mannell in his opening remarks said that on his recent visits to many branches he has been pleased to see they have slowed membership losses and many branches are now showing gains in membership.

Vice President Jim Stedman said in his visits to different committees, in his ex-officio role, he has noticed that the committees are all dedicated and working hard.

Secretary Eckart Sellinger noted the gathering of Rosters from the 145 branches was laborious as over half of the branches did not meet the March 1st deadline and required a lot of follow-up communication.

Assistant Secretary Charles Moss reported all branch forms SI-100 (reporting for Corporations to the State) are being processed and the State has made it easier by allowing electronic filing and paying by credit card.

Treasurer Adolph (Gus) Lopez said the Department of Treasury is just now sending missing Form 990 notices for 2008 tax year to the branches and asked that the Branches send them to him and not take any independent action.

Assistant Treasurer Karl Ryden indicated there are still some Branches that routinely do not complete the all the information on the Form 28 and he needs each line to be completed. Another continuing problem is to get all the branches to submit the form by the 10th of the following month.

Committee Reports:

Nominating Committee Chairman Buck Kendrick was not able to attend so committee member, Dean Steichen, gave his report. He said the committee recommends the following for the 2012 Officers: President, Jim Stedman...Vice President, Richard Dettmer...Secretary, Eckart Sellinger... Assistant Secretary, Charles Moss...Treasurer, Michael Berry... Assistant Treasurer, Jim Long. The Board approved the slate.

Certificates Chairman Jim Donovan proposed listing the recipients of the Senior, Super Senior, and Century Presidential Certificates in the State Roster Website and received agreement to do so.

Publicity and Tools Chairman Walter Schick discussed how to implement and use the Area Contact and Activities roster concept.

Bowling Chairman Carl Elvik recapped the Bowling Statewide meeting held in January and said they have a major effort underway to update their Bowling Manual but are having trouble finding resources to do it. He indicated there are still 11 State Tournaments scheduled for this year and that Branch 62 recently won the State tournament held in Brentwood.

Training Chairman Jim Stedman indicated the State Training Session is scheduled for October 18th and all 2012 Big Sir's, Area Governors, and Regional Directors are expected to attend.

Membership: Vice President Jim Stedman discussed a Form 27 Membership Report for the four month period ending April 30th. He discussed several items covered in the report including there are 18,769 SIR members in 145 active branches, a loss of 122 members since last December 31st and 934 new members over the same period. He said all of the Branches are working very hard at recruiting. Insurance Chairman John Thomason said that SIR Inc will not conform to the Moose Lodge insurance requirements and so the few branches meeting at Moose locations will have to find another meeting place. John announced that he will be stepping down as Insurance Chairman after next year. Travel Chairman Larry Garvin said they are getting close to finalizing the SIR 55th Anniversary Event for next year.

New Business:

Growth & Management Committee: President Bob Mannell announced that Harry Hubinger has resigned as Chairman and asked for suggestions on someone to replace Harry.

Old Business:

California State Fair Booth: Ralph Lingus led a discussion about SIR having a booth at this year's State Fair in Sacramento, if there is enough time to apply and if not, next year.

<u>Regional Director Reports:</u> The balance of the meeting was taken up by reports from the Directors on activities in their Regions with emphasis on membership retention and growth.

<u>Concluding Remarks:</u> President Bob Mannell said he thought this was an excellent meeting with good discussions on all topics and thanked everyone for their participation.

President Bob's Column

As we approach the end of 2011, I would like to take this opportunity to review what we tried to accomplish this year and note our successes and talk briefly about an area where we were not quite so successful.



In my first Happenings column this year, I asked you to Be A Friend - Bring A Friend to help SIR grow and prosper. Many of you responded and the number of guests and, ultimately, new members has increased significantly over the previous years.

Another significant improvement in membership is the result of many, but not all, Big

Sirs and their BECs capturing and using the information in the Form 27 to improve their Branch. That has given each Big Sir a valuable tool to help manage Branch growth and when used, has been extremely successful.

Another very positive and important trend this year has been the overall increase in activities available to our members. Many branches have started new activities on their own, while some have combined with other branches to sponsor joint activities that neither would be able to support independently. It is this working together among Branches that will allow us to continue to offer more and more varied activities to our members and allow us to increase the interest of potential new members.

Exactly how well have we done with membership this year? We have inducted 1627 new members through end of September. That is an annual rate of 11.4% of our membership statewide. We lost 2203 members in that same time period. The net loss of 576 members is somewhat misleading due to the fact that we have asked Branches to clean up their rosters and remove members that were, in some cases, incorrectly shown as active members for years. By making the rosters more accurately reflect the true active member count, it will be easier to assess the true membership picture in the future, but it also had a negative short-term effect for this year. In addition, 212 of the members lost were in Branches that closed this year.

volunteering their time. The entire State Committee can be found on our SIR website under Bowling. Again, many thanks and remember Bowling is just a game... and enjoy it!





- A Sir's son attended a SIR luncheon Singular Possessive
- Some Sirs' wives attend SIR picnics Plural Possessive

State Golf Committee

As I begin 2012 as the new state golf chairman, I have begun to look at SIR golf in a much more detailed way and have found an interesting and somewhat disappointing trend. After the golf committee did some research on the membership history of all SIR NCGA golf clubs, we found that those clubs whose members are active NCGA participants in SIR Area, Division,

and State events have either grown or maintained a high percentage of their members. Conversely, those golf clubs whose members are not NCGA members or have seldom participated or not participated at all in these events, have almost universally seen a significant decline in membership of not only their golf club but their branch membership.

So far I haven't been able to gather enough detailed information to have a complete explanation for this, but certainly one of the important factors is that of the 18,000+SIR members state-wide, about 5,000 are members of SIR NCGA clubs. That means that roughly 28% of our overall membership is involved in golf. It also means that since we golfers account for more than 1 in every 4 SIR members, we have a chance to positively impact membership and participation of not only our golf clubs, but our Branches and SIR overall.

Based on the above observation, it seems one of the easiest and most enjoyable ways to improve participation and retain membership is to make a dedicated effort to publicize, promote, and participate in golf activities outside your branch events.

My request is that, before you dismiss this as just another promotion of SIR State Golf and the NCGA, look at you and your club and see where you fit. Do you and most or many of your members participate in qualifiers for State individual and team tournaments? Do you play in State sponsored tournaments like Las Vegas, Reno, and Solvang? Are you gaining or losing members? If you find this relationship between minimal or no active participation and membership loss is true for your local club, what are you going to do?

I certainly don't think this is the only answer to the continuing decrease in SIR golfers and likely not even the best one, but it is certainly worth thought as we all try to keep our Branches and Branch golf clubs healthy and growing.

All state sponsored tournaments are handicap tournaments suitable for all levels of players and are open to any SIR member with a current NCGA handicap. Come join us and meet and compete equally with SIR golfers with handicaps ranging from single digits to the max of 36.4, all enjoying this great game called golf.

Happenings at the State Board Meeting

Excerpts from the Minutes of the January 17, 2012 Meeting

Study Session: Prior to the Board Meeting, President Jim Stedman led a study session focusing on the mission and objectives of Sons in Retirement at the State and Branch levels.

President Jim Stedman called the meeting order and thanked those who participated in the Study Session about what SIR is and what SIR should be in the future. He noted that we need to support the Area Governors and Branches in reaching the goal of increasing membership by 10% each year and having 70% luncheon attendance.

Secretary Eckart Sellinger asked the Directors to follow up with their Area Governors to make sure Branches submit a printed copy of their Branch Rosters on time.

Membership & Form 27: The President said that the Form 27 End of Year Reports were sent to all Directors. He then referred to the year-end reports and recapped some of the Branch successes last year. Two Directors commented that we need to continue to emphasize the value and need for the Form 27.

Training Committee: Chairman Dettmer identified the Training Committee members and said they will meet for the first time next month.

Golf Committee: Chairman Bob Mannell said the State schedule is set and is on the SIR Website.

INFOSYS Committee: Committee member, Derek Southern reporting for Dean Steichen, said the Committee had redesigned the lead page of the SIR Website with a new look involving banner graphics and are looking for further ideas to improve the page. They are also developing analytics to track usage of the website, and specific pages on the site, so they can focus their energies on improving the most used areas.

Treasurer's Report for 2011: Outgoing Treasurer, Gus Lopez, indicated SIR was in good financial health at the end of the year. He will be transferring the books to current Treasurer Mike Berry today. Treasurer Berry indicated he would have a 2012 budget available for review before the April Board meeting.

G & M Committee: Chairman Walt Schick pointed out that Bumper Stickers and Hats are available and that 350 hats were sold in 2011. He modeled a new high quality SIR jacket that will soon be available. Walt discussed the updated new member application form with a list of 70 SIR activities on the back of the form. President Stedman said he and Walt have agreed on the following roles for the G&M Committee: 1-Membership Development (programs etc to help Branches and the State meet their objectives); 2-Eventually take over the management of the Form 27; 3-Manage the SIR email and phone communications; 4-Both internal and external PR; 5-Round tables.

Rules Committee: Chairman Dick DeVoe said there are 363 Rules and 90 Bylaws as of this time and they are working

to simplify and reduce duplication. At today's meeting, the Board approved 6 rule changes.

Travel Committee: Chairman Larry Garvin said the work to celebrate our 50th anniversary with a Cruise to Alaska in August 2013 from San Francisco is still ongoing.

Insurance Committee: Chairman John Thomason said our premium is only increasing \$600 for this year. John has chaired this committee for 8 years and wants to find a replacement by next year.

Bowling Committee: The new Committee Chairman, Del Locke, said the committee has already set their objectives for this year.

Certificates: Chairman Jim Donovan said 38 HLM, 19 Senior HLM, 4 Century, 36 Super Senior, and 241 Senior Certificates were made in 2011 which was close to the 339 made in 2010.

Regional Director Reports: The 8 Regional Directors that attended the Board Meeting gave reports basically covering what they are doing to increase membership in their Regions.

President Jim Stedman closed the meeting, thanking everyone for their participation and reminding all that the next meeting will be on April 3, 2012.

Many of the focus statements of professional sports teams apply to SIR Branches: Practice the fundamentals and execute, execute, execute. Don't rest on your laurels, redouble our efforts. Keep bringing in new players to maintain a balance of new and experienced players. Keep your eye on the ball. The objective is to be the best

we can be. The goal is to win the championship.

The fundamentals for Branch leaders include providing interesting and entertaining luncheons with good food and speakers in settings that are attractive to members and potential members, providing activities of interest to members that promote camaraderie and providing new member recruitment programs that result in ongoing supplies of new members. Branch leaders need to keep their eyes on these fundamentals and execute, execute, execute. This is a process that must be pursued relentlessly. The championships are won when branches are healthy, with good balances of newer and experienced members and capable of sustaining themselves for the long term.

Branch leaders have gotten off to a great start in the first quarter of 2012. It is clear that all Branch leaders are attempting to make their branches the best they can be.

In the first quarter of 2012, over half of SIR Branches met or exceeded the goal of inducting new members at the annual rate of10% of Branch membership. 79 branches inducted 546 new members, an annual rate of about 20%. This means that the leaders in these Branches are executing very well. The proportions of newer members in these Branches are increasing dramatically. These leaders cannot rest on their laurels. They need to redouble their efforts to maintain these gains.

There is another example of good execution and significant progress. In 2011, only 40 branches achieved the goal of 70% luncheon attendance. In the first quarter of 2012, 63 Branches achieved the 70% goal. This progress was the result of Branch leaders improving all aspects of their Branches, especially luncheons, and removing nonparticipants from their rosters.

I am happy to report this good progress. Branch leaders are keeping their eyes on the ball. We can expect continued improvement.

Big Sir Survey

Derek Southern, Member Training Committee

When you want to know what's happening, ask the members doing the work!

"Comment is free," wrote the editor CP Scott of the respected UK Guardian national newspaper in 1921, "but facts are sacred."

In preparation for the 2013 Big Sir Training Meeting in October the Training Committee asked the basic question, "What do Big Sirs most need to know to help them in their year of office?" There were several differing opinions, so the committee decided to obtain information from the Big Sirs of 2011. I created an internet survey to determine both successes and problems. The good news was that 60% of the branches reported meeting the 10% induction rate target while more than half reported at least 70% attendance at luncheons, so a lot of branches are doing good things.

In terms of identified problems, "Getting Volunteers" and "Complacency of Members," were identified by almost half the respondents as their main problems. Three problems tied with 10% response rates as the next most important and they were: "Getting potential new members to attend a luncheon" – "Completing State forms 27 & 28" – and – "Generating new activities."

But are those two main problems related to the health of the branch?...85% of the Branches reporting neither problem, met the 10% new member induction googlegroups.com where they will be published.

goal, but only 42% of branches reporting either or both problems, met this goal. There was also a big difference between branches with and without problems in the rate of meeting a goal to create two or more new activities. The luncheon attendance goal was met equally by Branches with or without the problems. This data is presented graphically in the chart at the end of this article.

What can the State organization do to help Branches reporting problems of complacency, or apathy, and members who don't volunteer? The Big Sir and Executive Committee (BEC) of each branch are actually the people who have to solve these problems. The State can offer advice, but each branch is responsible for

recognizing and correcting its own problems. The task for the Training Committee will be to emphasize proven routes to success, and to give ideas to Big Sirs who need some help overcoming problems of volunteerism and complacency.


The formula for success seems quite simple: If individual Sirs – YOU and I – decide that Sons In Retirement is an organization that we want to succeed, then WE need to put some effort into making it a success.

Over the years there have been a number of hard working members whose efforts have created what we enjoy today. Today, with membership still on the decline – but at a much lower rate – we must focus our energy to maintain the objective of "Men Enjoying Active Retirement." Give your ideas to your Big Sir, to a BEC member, or to your Area Governor... then follow up and ask what is being done! Some Branches have no problems finding volunteers, and these are the most successful branches, but even they should not become complacent.

The sooner we, the members, understand that the future of SIR lies in our own hands, the more likely SIR is to survive. A minority of members currently does the majority of the work, so let's volunteer to help.

Get involved. Make our SIR organization THE place to enjoy an active retirement!

INFOSYS Committee Report

In my first Column, in the winter edition, I introduced you to the SIR INFOSYS Committee members and gave you a brief description of what we do. In this column, I would like to tell you about the overall concept of the SIR website and the regular

changes made to it every month.

The main webpage (<u>www.</u> <u>sirinc.org</u>) has two main

functions. The first is to introduce visitors to SIR. It has a new image banner showing men our age, having fun, doing activities they enjoy, with text



down the middle explaining the basics about SIR and providing contact information. There are buttons down the left side providing access to additional, more detailed information on SIR and button icons on the right illustrating and detailing some of the more popular activities provided by SIR. Much of this information may be of interest to our new or existing members as many do not know much about SIR outside their own Branch.

The second main function is to provide a link (i.e. a portal) to **Member Information**. This section of our website is protected from automated search programs, frequently referred to as "bots", which can search websites for names, addresses, phone numbers, email addresses and other information to be used by individuals or companies for legitimate or illegitimate uses. Our website prevents these "bots" from searching our web pages by asking you to enter the User name (safety) and Password (first) provided on the screen. Generally, "bots" cannot read the screen so are unable to gain access.

The Member Information webpage is loaded with links to information relevant, primarily to Branch Leaders, but to regular members as well. It has buttons to access the SIR Leaders Guide, SIR Manual, Forms, SIR Logo Apparel, SIR Happenings, and State Activities. It contains links to Key Documents (e.g. Schedule of Operations), State Communications,

Organizational Information, Membership and Recruiting Information, Training Information, Travel Information, some "How To's," Computer User Information and other materials.

Many of these links are updated monthly. The rest are updated when something has changed or new information is available. A "NEW" date is posted to the link when the underlying document has been updated. A brief look at the Member Information web page shows that 15 links have been updated in the past 6 months.

Even links to older documents are important as the underlying materials are probably "new" to newly elected Branch Leadership. As you know, most Branches have many new leaders each year. Branch Officers (e.g. Big SIR, Little SIR, Secretary, and Treasurer), BEC members, Committee Chairman and even regular members should become familiar with the contents of the Member Information web page. You will find answers to almost any SIR question on this web page.

Branch Officers, as well as Area Governors and Region Directors, wishing to learn more about their duties, or how to perform them, can find many informative documents in the **Training Information** section. Ideas and tools for new member recruitment are located in the **Membership & Recruiting** section while other great sources of information can be found in the **SIR Leaders Guide, SIR Manual, Organization Information** and other links on the web page.

The SIR INFOSYS Committee works hard to keep the look and content of the SIR website current and relevant. Most of the content comes from the Forms (e.g. Form 28, Form 27, Form 20, Certificate Requests, etc.) produced by the Branches and sent to INFOSYS for processing. This data is reviewed and entered into the SIR Database to produce the reports available through the links on the Member Information web page. Other State Committees produce documents which form the remainder of the content on the SIR website (e.g. Travel, Training, Recruiting, Organization Information, etc.). All this is available to SIR Leaders and members at the touch of a button. Make use of it!


Region 7, South Bay - Sunnyvale south to Monterey Visual Aids to Focus on SIR Goals Richard Kabanek, Region 7 Director

Sons In Retirement has adopted two important goals to increase membership: 10% recruitment and 70% luncheon attendance. Historical data show that Branches that meet these two goals over a long period of time are healthy and successful. During officer training late last year, I stressed these two goals and asked that they be added to the Branch Bulletins and BEC notes. Well... after several months of not seeing them in those documents, I began to think about how we could get that message out to the membership. I kicked around some ideas and finally came up with a Visual Aid for the members to see at their luncheons.

The Visual Aid idea was discussed with the Region 7 Area Governors and they all liked it. We decided upon a Visual Aid that would have a thermometer showing recruitment and a line graph showing the luncheon attendance. The Governors came over to my house and we made a Visual Aid Chart for each of the 21 Branches in Region 7.

These charts are shown at each luncheon and the Membership Chairman explains last month's progress toward their Branch goals. It's too early to tell if they are doing any good, but at least the Branch knows where it stands on the SIR goals. I think long term they are going to help the Branches focus on their goals.

INFOSYS Committee

The SIR Database is the basis for many reports and documents presented on the SIR website (www.sirinc.org). This database contains about 20,000 records of past and current SIR State Officers, Honorary Life Members (HLMs), State Committees, State Appointees, Regional Directors, Area Governors, Branch Officers and certain other

key Branch members. It is the basis of the State Roster and Branch Locator reports as well as Membership Statistics and a lot more. Branch membership counts, HLM, Senior, Super Senior and Century Certificates are recorded and tracked in the Database as well.

The e-mail and USPS addresses contained in the Database are used for the many communications sent to Branches, State and Branch Officers. Additionally, the Database provides an important historical perspective for all the SIR State and Branch Officer positions held by these members, the dates of their service in each position and a lot more.

A less visible, but equally important function of the Database is to provide data and documents supporting California and Federal tax-exempt reporting so SIR and SIR Branches can remain tax-exempt. This data is used by the State Treasurer and Assistant State Treasurer when they file all necessary documentation on behalf of SIR and SIR Branches. The Database also provides the Branch membership assessments which financially support State



SIR and pay for insurance.

The SIR INFOSYS
Committee works hard
to keep the content of
the SIR Database current
and relevant. Dwight Sale
performs most of this work
but the State Treasurer,
Assistant State Treasurer
as well as the Certificates
Chairman also update the

Database regularly. Most of the content comes from the Forms (e.g. Form 28, Form 27, Form 20, Certificate Requests, etc.) produced by the Branches and sent to INFOSYS for processing. This data is reviewed and entered into the SIR Database to produce the reports available through the links on the Member Information web page. All this is available to SIR Leaders and members at the touch of a button. Make use of it!

Some active branches have hosted a focus group on a day away from the BEC meeting. This group should include any BEC members, past officers and other members that have interest in looking for opportunities for the Branch. A typical focus group might meet for two or three hours to

talk about where the Branch can improve.

After your next year's officers are elected, would be a good time to have a focus group meeting.

Once these opportunities are outlined and ranked, individual committees can gather to discuss goals and action plans to put improvements to work.

Form 27 establishes and monitors goals for each Branch to continue to be healthy and vital. These goals can start the discussions in your focus group.

Seven Branch Health Indicators

There are seven main indicators of Branch health. Including the first four that are on the monthly Form 27, these are:

- 1. Are new members being inducted at a 10% or higher annual rate? (Form 27, line 11)
- 2. Is total membership maintained or growing? (Form 27, line 15)
- 3. Percent of members attending regular luncheon meetings (Form 27, line 18)
- 4. Are guests (potential members) attending at a 20% or higher annual rate? (Form 27, line 19)
- 5. Do you have ten or more Branch-specific activities, including couples activities?
- 6. Are new members being retained at a 90% level after one year?
- 7. Does 35% of the membership volunteer for committees, BEC, and luncheon positions?

Five Branch Committee Functions

Branches should consider five committees to work on the goals and action plans that come up from a focus group. Descriptions of these committees are in Ideas and in the new Operation Guide & Recruiting Information pages on www, SIRinc.org

- 3. Activities

- 5. Member Relations

Excerpts from State Meeting

The Meeting was called to order by President Jim Stedman **Treasurer's Report:**

Mike Berry gave an extensive report on the following items:

- Audit Report: He discussed the last Audit report which had a satisfactory result and he proposed several changes to improve the annual audit process.
- Tax Reporting: He is still working on Federal tax filings which were not done last year.
- Financial Reports: Mike covered the highlights of the May Balance Sheet and Income & Expense report.

Membership

The number of branches that had 70% of their members attend luncheons increased from 40 last year to 63 in the first quarter of this year. There are some Branches that don't submit the F27 on time and a very few who have not submitted a form.

Committee Reports

Nominating Committee: Dean Steichen reported there is a candidate for each State position and they will be put forth for election at the Annual Meeting in August. Candidates are: President – Rich Dettmer; Vice President – Maynard Rodland; Secretary – Dick DeVoe; Assistant Secretary – Ron Flagel; Treasurer – Mike Berry; Assistant Treasurer – Jim Long.

<u>Training Committee</u>: Rich Dettmer reported they did a survey of this year's Big Sirs and found they now have a more realistic view of their job. The Training Committee is developing this year's curriculum around addressing the issues learned from the survey. <u>INFOSYS Committee</u>: Dean Steichen reported they have two new members to help with Data Base activities...and, on the web side of the committee, they have been keeping the information current and added a Branch website model for Branches to build their own websites.

<u>G & M Committee</u>: Walter Schick reported on the continued success of combining Publicity & Tools with Growth and Membership activities. One key focus is their support of the Training Committee.

<u>Rules Committee</u>: Maynard Rodland led the Board through the recommended rule changes and they were adopted. <u>Bowling Committee</u>: Del Locke said Bowling activities are doing very well. The State Team Championships had 21 teams in each of the A and B Divisions held at Pinole Valley Lanes.

Regional Director Round Table

Each Director was requested to come up with two characteristics of Branches that meet the 10% New Member Goal and two characteristics of those who do not meet this goal. Two detailed lists were developed at the meeting.

Adjournment

President Stedman adjourned the meeting until the Annual Meeting on August 6th.



Dick DeVoe – State Secretary



Visit to Famed Presidio Cemetery Paul Rosenberg, Branch Treasurer

In August, members and guests of our Branch visited the San Francisco National Cemetery in the Presidio of San Francisco. This cemetery was the first national cemetery established on the West Coast and marked the development of national cemeteries extending beyond the battlefields of the Civil War.

The many graves and monument in the nine acre cemetery include a wide range of historical figures and events that shaped our nation's history. To give just a few examples: The grave of an African-American soldier who was one of four African-American soldiers awarded the Medal of Honor in the Spanish American War – an impressive Boxer Hostilities monument – a memorial dedicated to soldiers killed by the worker's union in the 1893 Pullman strike – the grave of a soldier earning two

Medals of Honor while bravely fighting the Indians in the West – the Obelisk Monument to Four Soldiers (see picture) – the grave of the pilot who crashed during the first transcontinental air race in 1919 – and the grave of a woman who was a Union spy in the Civil War.

The extensive tour was lead by Docent Galen Dillman. All agreed that his presentation was remarkable for the insights he offered into American history through the stories of heroes and of ordinary people serving our nation.

I prepared a 26 page story from my notes and some further research about all the graves and monuments that the group visited. The many interesting photographs in the story were captured by Master Photographer Bert Dormann.



Involve your New Members

New Members have fresh ideas of what they want in SIR. Use their interests and ideas as soon as they become members. Here are some areas that can work in your Branch:

Activities Committee

As different activities would appeal to more guests, form an Activities Committee to try out different ideas



Include couples activities as they are easy to start. Let's Dine In could have maybe 7 couples, and rotate from house to house. When you get a waiting list, form a second group on a different night. Wine Tasting is easy to start—up to 6 couples each bring a type of wine and an appetizer. Again, rotate from house to house. Form additional groups as your waiting list grows.

Greeters

Hey Computer Guy

Some tips on sending emails:

When you forward an e-mail, DELETE all of the other addresses that appear in the body of the message (at the top)... that's right, DELETE them. Highlight them and delete them, backspace them, cut them, whatever it is you know how to do. It only takes a second. You MUST click the "Forward" button first and then you will have full editing capabilities against the body and headers of the message. If you don't click on "Forward" first, you won't be able to edit the message at all.

Whenever you send an e-mail to more than one person, do NOT use the To: or Cc: fields for adding e-mail addresses. Always use the BCC: (blind carbon copy) field for listing the e-mail addresses. If you don't see your BCC: option, click on where it says To: and your address list will appear. Highlight the address and choose BCC. When you send to BCC: your message will automatically say "Undisclosed Recipients in the "TO:" field of the people who receive it.

ALWAYS hit your Forward button from the actual e-mail you are reading. Ever get those e-mails that you have to open 10 pages to read the one page with the information on it? By forwarding from the actual page you wish someone to view; you stop them from having to open many e-mails just to see what you sent.

When you receive a personal e-mail (not a forward or group mailing), please hit reply and let the sender know you received it.

Another tip that I learned from the computer seminar on my Alaska cruise:

It is a waste of money to buy Norton, Macafee or any other anti-virus program. The Windows Security Essentials that is installed on Windows 7 and can be down loaded free for other windows systems, does a better job and allows your computer to run faster. I replaced the Kapersky that I was using on my lap-top with Windows Essentials and it runs noticeably faster.

Hello. If we haven't met, let me introduce myself. My name is Richard L. Dettmer (Please call me Rich) the 2013 president of Sons In Retirement, Inc., the statewide governing body for SIR. I'm looking forward to meeting many more of you as I travel the state this year honoring Sirs receiving Branch awards. While visiting Branches and meeting fellow Sirs is the most

enjoyable part of being President, I probably won't get to all the Branches or meet all of you. My regular letters will try to keep the membership informed of the activities, goals and direction of SIRinc throughout the year.

Of course we start this year with thanks to Jim Stedman, the 2012 SIRinc President, and his team who successfully led us last year and continued assisting senior men to enjoy their retirement years by providing opportunities to maintain new and existing friendships with other members.

Like last year, we will maintain measureable goals to insure the health of SIRinc. If you asked the members in our Branch who always has a smile on his face and has the most positive attitude, the answer would be unanimous... Greg Schweitrzer! Greg is an avid golfer and highly competitive. After a 25 year break, he took the sport back up and re-fell in love with the game. He joined Branch 69 in September 2011 to make new golfing buddies and to take advantage of our three different golf groups. But, within weeks of joining, Greg's life changed dramatically.

Greg had an infected area in his arm and went to the ER. He was diagnosed with Necrotizing Fasciitis, also known as MRSA, the dreaded flesh eating disease. Within hours, his right arm and shoulder were amputated in order to save his life. He spent 41 days in the hospital undergoing eight more surgeries.



Even with all of his problems -- the trauma of losing a limb, the painful recovery and the required extensive physical therapy – Greg showed up at one of our monthly luncheons after missing only three luncheons and we were all apprehensive, not knowing what to expect. But Greg came in with a big grin on his face and the first thing that he said was, "I am going to play golf again." Greg has a small golf course cut out of the brush on his acreage in Wilton. His best therapy has been practicing for hours every day, trying to master his one armed swing (see picture). He is able to drive the ball 160-180 yards and is working on improving his consistency. He is now a regular competitor in our Short Course Group and looks forward to the day when he can start winning again. In a recent match he scored 3 pars and a birdie and has broken 100 in tournament play.

The story doesn't end there. On January the 7th, Greg emailed some of his golfing buddies as follows: "Hi Guys. I just had to let you know that I scored a Hole-in-One at the Bradshaw Golf Course today with Ron as my witness. It was on the 9th hole... 110 yards going in. I used my 8 iron and nailed it! It was our second time around. The first time around I shot a 41, with no pars. The second time around, I shot a 33... three pars and the hole-in-one. Par at Bradshaw is 27. See you on Guys on Thursday." Greg is truly an inspiration to the rest of us duffers.


News from the State

It could also enhance how Branches view their Governors in that they would be doing something positive in support of their Branches rather than having to just be traffic cops, rule enforcers, report collectors, etc. Finally, I would hope that it may give Governors more cause to develop a closer relationship with Branches in order to better represent the good things they do.

Like I said, I want to keep it simple so I am leaving it up to Regional Directors to use the criteria they want to use in the determination of which Branch deserves to be singled out as the best in their Region. I would expect them to consider the 10%-70% goals. In addition, they may want to consider attrition vs. recruitment; activities; new ideas; programs; etc. So in part it will be quantitative based on what's already there and in part subjective based upon opinion. That is just fine! Excellence cannot be measured by numbers alone.

We are not too late to make the Spring edition of SIR HAPPENINGS so I would like to shoot for that edition as the start-up recognition event. I'm hoping that we can generate some positive dialog by sharing great work!


Furry Creature


An Unforgettable Hike



State Board Meeting

Editor's Note: The following are very brief excerpts from the minutes of the January 15th State Board Meeting and we encourage our readers to visit the SIR website – sirinc.org – for the full meeting transcript as recorded by State Secretary, Dick DeVoe.

The meeting was called to order by President Dettmer who said that we need to continue to focus on helping turn around the continuing membership decline and the loss of Branches. The Form 27 has been effective in requiring branches to focus on specific performance-related data. The 10% new members–70% attendance goals have also been successful and will continue as important goals.

Treasurer Mike Berry reviewed the financial reports and reported that the 2013 budget shows a shortfall. This projected shortfall is primarily due to the revenue loss from decreased membership. The budget was approved with the notation that all leaders are encouraged to trim expenses.

G&M Chairman Jerry Milano discussed a chart showing the troubling membership decline from 2004-present. To help combat the membership problem, the G&M Committee has established four growth projects for 2013:

- Direct mail advertising
- Stronger support of Branches
- Strategic alliances with various organizations
- Identifying locations for new Branches

G&M Committee's Form 27 Subcommittee Chairman, Jim Stedman, summarized his 2012 Membership Report as follows:

- 2133 new members were inducted, 3090 members were lost, for an 848 net member loss.
- Average Branch size was over 200 members 20 years ago; today it's 127.
- Branch members' average age has become much older at the same time Branch average size has been declining.
- Only one-half of all Branches have shown they can recruit at least 10% new members annually, the minimum considered necessary to stabilize membership.
- Seven Branches closed in 2012, greater than any previous year.
- It will take a long time for SIR to stabilize membership.
- Healthy Branches are the key to stabilization, and stabilization can only be achieved by recruiting at a minimum of 10% new members annually.

Additional reports were given by the: INFOSYS Committee; Rules Committee; Travel Committee; Golf Committee; Certificates Sub Committee; the Bowling Committee; and each Regional Director gave a status report on his region.



Branch Survivability with Hope for the Future

The most critical issue facing SIR for the long-term is branch survival. Why? In less than 25 years, SIR has lost over 50 branches, and the failure rate is accelerating. In the past 15 months alone, ten branches have closed – including one with well over 100 members.


Survivability Action Team Founded


In December 2012 four members with similar concerns about Branches' deteriorating health came together to form the Survivability Action Team (SAT) as part of the State Growth & Membership Committee. One of its first findings was from regional/area leaders confirming that some closed Branches could have been saved if only proper identification and timely intervention had taken place. This knowledge increased the SAT members' determination to find appropriate indicators of every Branch's failure risk. No branch is immune to failure, as evidenced by 50+% of formerly healthy closed branches that once had over 200 members each.

Survivability Indicators

An early breakthrough in the SAT's research is reflected in the Chart on the left titled "What Can We Learn about the History of 50 Closed Branches?" Almost 74% of failed branches had 7 or more of their last 10 years with a membership decline. The other 26% lost membership 4, 5, or 6 of their last 10 years.

The Chart on the right shows why that information is so important in helping to predict failure risk in existing branches. 51% of our Branches are already at extreme risk of failure with 7 or more years of decline in the past 10 years. Another 26% are considered at moderate risk, and only 7% are at low risk.





This important indicator was followed by others using data that had never been available before – including from the Form 27 monthly branch report that began 3 years ago. The SAT then developed and produced a simple but revealing survivability summary sheet for each of the 135 existing branches.

Reigniting the SIR Spirit

In the past, there was no easily available information to warn regional and area leaders about the insidious decline toward failure for so many Branches. Now we have information that gives an early warning. The SAT calls this high-reward endeavor "Reigniting the Sir Spirit."

SAT Mission & 1st/2nd Phase

- Provide continuing Branch survivability-related information for each Branch,
- Share that information with Regional Directors, Area Governors, and Branch leaders in order for them to evaluate the survivability risk level of their Branches,
- Identify current effective tools for survivability improvement and to research new and/or improved tools,
- Provide experienced services of the SAT to those Branches committed to survival.

As part of the 1st phase rollout, Power Point presentations have been completed with 7 of the 10 Regional Directors and most of their Area Governors. The other 3 presentations are planned to be completed by the end of April. The 2nd phase is for a Regional Director, Area Governor, and/or SAT member to present the information to Branch leaders. The key to the survivability of Branches will be their leaders' understanding of their survival risks, their commitment to survive, and their actions short and long term to meet that commitment.

How to Recruit Branch Leadership

Are you having trouble getting your members to take leadership positions in your Branch?

Do you make announcements that there is an open position and you need someone to fill it and nobody comes forward?

I sympathize with you because that was also the case in my Branch. However, there is a way to guarantee that you get the people you want in leadership positions and have all positions filled every year, with just the right people. What is this magic process? ...I call it:

"THE FOUR STEPS TO GET BRANCH LEADERSHIP"

First of all, a little background on me to give this information some credibility. I was a Boy Scout Executive – paid professional – not a volunteer – for 20 years. During the first 10 years, I worked in the field with the adult leadership of Boy Scout Troops and Cub Scout Packs. At least three or four times a year, I would get the complaint that "we need a Scoutmaster, or Cubmaster, or a Den Mother, or a Committee Chairman, etc. and no one will volunteer to take the job." I would meet with the existing leadership of the Scout unit and walk them through the steps recommended by the BSA to recruit leadership and not once –I repeat – not once in that period, did I ever fail to get the right person to take whatever position was needed at the time!

Does the complaint I mentioned above sound familiar to you if you substitute Branch needs like Little Sir, Secretary, Treasurer, Travel Chairman, Activities Chair, Recruitment Chair, Member Relations Chair, etc.? It did to me when I first heard the announcement from the head table that our Branch needed volunteers for a specific job and of course, no one came forward.

If your Branch uses the "FOUR STEPS TO GET BRANCH LEADERSHIP" exactly as written, you will get your man! If it has worked for the Boy Scouts of America for at least 75 years, it will also work for you. It is currently working really well for Branch 33. Last year in October we used the "Four Steps" process for the first time to recruit a Program Chairman. In February we began the 2013 Nominating Committee effort with a prospect selection meeting. Since then, that group has recruited: a Branch Executive Committee Director, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, and an Assistant Treasurer. By the time you read this article, we will I'm sure, have recruited the 2014 Little Sir.

monster fish up to the boat, without help, from 300 feet of water...to be honest, the dark side of the fish had been filleted.

A smaller group (usually 4 to 6) travels to various locations each summer for larger species. We have been to Baja California Mexico to fish the Sea of Cortez for Marlin, Sailfish, Dorado, and Wahoo: to Rivers inlet and



Vancouver Island in British Columbia for big halibut, and for the past several years to Sitka Alaska where we have had great catches of Salmon, Halibut, Lingcod, and Rockfish. We typically bring back about 90 pounds of frozen fillets per fisherman.

Our group meets on the second Monday of each month (except for December) at 9:30 am in the conference room of the Novato United Methodist Church where we exchange fish stories, plan trips, and share doughnuts and coffee. All Sirs are invited to join us!

They are thirty-six in number and are the public spirited musical ambassadors of SIR. They're known as the Country Aires and are sponsored by the Country Club Branch 33...see picture. In 2012, they entertained over 4000 folks at 68 appearances in the Greater Sacramento Area.

They range in age from 60 to 95, with an average of 77.6 years. Thirty are members of Branch 33 and the remainder are from Branches 107, 14, 127, and 9. They include retired educators, engineers, military personnel, governmental employees, insurance executives, a lawyer, a dentist, an auctioneer, a chef, a computer systems analyst, and other vocational areas. Overwhelmingly, they are proud veterans of military service, primarily from World War II, the Korean War, and Vietnam.

They've been entertaining folks since 1972! Of the current group, twenty seven are vocalists and eight are musicians. Since 1999, the ensemble has been under the distinguished direction of Clyde Kidd, a retired high school principal, who is ably assisted by Fred Stallcop, PBS and SHLM, who serves as Business Manager. For some ten years, the group also included a former broadcaster as its announcer/emcee.

Branch 33 is believed to be the only SIR Branch with a choir. It all started very informally when three Sirs stood in the rear hall of monthly meetings and began harmonizing...that was in 1971. A year later, the current organization was formalized, and ultimately a uniform of Gray trousers and Blue Blazers was adopted. In addition to its current Director, the organization has been well served by four Maestros, including Duane Hansen, who directed from 1995-1999 and who, at age 90, remains a valued member of the group.

The choir's history would not be complete without credit to Jean Weathers, an immensely talented pianist, who accompanied the vocalists from 1989 until her retirement in 2012. Pictured are the group's instrumentalists which includes a pianist, an accordionist, two banjo players, two guitarists, a keyboard bass, a harmonica virtuoso – plus a drummer, Houston Keehner, who at age 95, is the organization's senior member.

"Pay" for the participants comes in the form of satisfaction received during and after performances, as enthusiastic audiences applaud and otherwise demonstrate their appreciation.

As Director-Emeritus Duane Hansen noted in 2006, "The men take part because of a great love of music, a desire to find humor, camaraderie, treats, and expressions of appreciation."

Both SIR and residents of the Greater Sacramento area are, indeed, extremely fortunate to have this marvelous musical group. Rarely has any group given so generously to its community for so long!

At age 41, the Country Club Aires are going strong, ready and willing to serve as goodwill ambassadors for SIR!

Hey Computer Guy

The other day, I was sitting at the kitchen table doing my income taxes. I had all kinds of stuff scattered around... tax forms, W-2's, 1099's, bank statements, investment statements, etc. I got to thinking that this is just like my computer. I have all the stuff that I am working on, on my desk top. When I finished with my taxes, I bagged up everything that remained, put it in a large manila envelope and marked "2013 Taxes" on it and stored it away in a filing cabinet. I do the same thing on my computer. When I finish what I am doing on the desktop, I package everything and put it in a folder, name the folder, and store it in My Documents or My Pictures. This is an excellent way to be able to find anything that you created or saved. I must have at least 20 folders in My Documents. The same goes for pictures. It's easy to make a new folder. Just right click your mouse, select NEW, select FOLDER and name it. To get any file into that folder, just click on it (hold the mouse button down) drag the file to the folder and then release the mouse button.

Here's another tip...If you are a "Hunt and Peck" typist like I am, and often accidentally hit the Caps Lock key and type a lot of text in caps before noticing it and then have to retype all of it in a small case, you might be interested in a way to prevent this from happening by in effect putting an



alarm sound on the Caps Lock Key. To install a tone that sounds when you hit the Caps Lock key, go to Start, Control Panel, Ease of Access Center, Make the Keyboard Easier to Use. Then put a check on the Turn on Toggle Keys block. After that, you will hear a tone whenever you press

Caps Lock, Num Lock, or Scroll Lock. If you have Windows 7, just right click on the desktop, then Personalize, Ease of access center is on the lower left and the rest is the same. Send your computer questions or tips to: Hey Computer Guy, Franque12@surewest.net.

A number of SIR Rules and Corporate Bylaws were changed upon vote of the members of the corporation, two of which should be of special interest to all Branches.

The first deals with the permissibility of Branches to now impose dues on members in lieu of having to rely on voluntary donations or patently illegal opportunity drawings, raffles, etc. or seeking a State License to do so, legally. The impact of this change in bylaws and rule is that <u>now</u> the Branch may decide on relying on donations <u>or</u> imposing dues <u>or</u> any combination of the two in order to sustain its administrative costs. This power is returned to the Branch level and would be decided by each BEC which is answerable to the Branch membership.

The second change in a bylaw that should be of interest to the membership is the establishment of another Corporate Standing Committee entitled State Budget Oversight Committee. The committee would be responsible for tying the budget administration currently handled very well by the State Treasurer to existing, future SIR Goals with available and anticipated expenses and revenue. Of critical importance would be the reduction in State expenses in view of diminishing revenue to avoid, where possible, further Branch assessment increases while maintaining important SIR State core activities. When SIR membership stabilizes or even starts to grow and revenue increases, there would be a focus on reducing State assessments as well.

Both of these changes will better allow both the State and the Branches to address the "here, now" (the Gestalt, if you will) and future in our modern day

French Award to Sir Dan Franklin

Branch 8 member Dan Franklin was 16 when he joined the Navy in 1942. He was 17 on D-Day, when his landing craft was charged with delivering soldiers and ammo to bloody Omaha Beach.

"It's a short beach," said Franklin, 86. "The Germans were shooting down. We got the munitions off the boat, but 12 guys were just mowed down. How we escaped, God only knows."

Before the morning was over, that ship was shot out from under Franklin and his four crewmates. Another landing craft picked them up. It hit a mine, killing eight of the 10 men aboard. Franklin was blasted out of the boat and onto a temporary dock. He spent the night sleeping on a third landing anchored to Allied flotilla boats that had been intentionally sunk to create an artificial breakwater.

More than 68 years after his heroism helped liberate France from the Nazi occupation, Franklin was honored with the Legion of Honor Medal in a Memorial Day ceremony at the Presidio in San Francisco. This award was established by Napoleon Bonaparte in 1802 and is considered to be France's highest honor and it has been awarded to many surviving American veterans for their heroism on D-Day.

Franklin – who was accompanied at the ceremony by his wife, Marilyn and several children and grandchildren – said that he didn't feel especially meritorious at the time. "I felt like a survivor," he said. "Especially after that second boat blew up. Guys I knew got mowed down, and I'm standing there without a scratch. That kind of gave me the feeling that, if it's meant to be ...it's meant to be."



turns sharing lots of intriguing history, tales, and anecdotes about Chinatown and the 16 of us were thoroughly entertained.





Chuck, who has hiked extensively, felt this was the most challenging hike he has ever done. Bob Slyker, a lifelong hiker who has climbed as high as 17,500 feet on Mt. Everest, agreed it was very difficult. And for me, it was my first – and last – backpacking trip.

Committee Reports

Survivability Action Team (SAT) & Branch Survival Dick DeVoe. SAT Chairman



"The most critical issue facing SIR for the long-term is Branch survival. NO Branch is immune to failure." With over 50 SIR branches lost within 25 years -- the failure rate accelerating – and more than 50% of the failed Branches once had 200+ members – Branches ignore these words at their peril!

The Survivability Action Team (SAT) was formed to address Branch survival and is completing its first year of operation. Phase 1 focused on identifying survivability indicators, developing effective tools for improving Branch survival, and then getting the word out.

Power Point presentations were held with Regional Directors, Area Governors, and Branch Big Sirs in many Areas over several months. These presentations included membership-trend graphs and other pertinent factors, which were compared with

data from highly successful as well as failed branches. The Branch summaries can be found on the SIRinc website (<u>sirinc.org</u>), on the Member Information Page under Branch Information a link named "SAT Branch Membership Charts."

Phase 2 is completing original presentations in Areas not yet scheduled, while focusing on Branches requesting SAT assistance. In that regard, SAT members have met recently with leaders from several individual Branches having difficulty filling key Branch positions for 2014. Those efforts thus far have proven successful. In the past, Branches have unfortunately closed (typically at year-end or early in the New Year) because no one would step up to fill key positions. The tragedy ...Branch members who had enjoyed years of fellowship in their Branch suddenly found themselves with no Branch at all!

Phase 2 also addresses the reality that Branches at risk of failure typically require considerable change from within. The SAT is available to assist in survivability plan development. Of paramount importance are (1) recruitment of sufficient new members (including younger members) to offset annual attrition and (2) retention of existing members. Therefore, leaders in Recruitment, Member Relations, and Activities development become crucial. There are many things a Branch can do to improve its survivability short and long term. With the SAT's support and Branches' commitment to survive, good things can happen.

An integral part of the SAT's Phase 2 includes encouragement of Branches to establish a Branch

Sir Walter Schick from Branch 8 and a member of the Survivability Action Team which is a part of the State Growth and Membership Committee made a presentation to Pathfinder Branch 59 Branch Executive Committee supplying some tools to measure the health of the Branch and the importance of these measurements to aid in the survival of the Branch.

Growth Coordinator reporting to his BEC through the Big Sir. He would act as liaison to his BEC and to the Survivability Action Team on Branch growth and survivability, plus provide continuity on these matters as Branch leaders turn over. A Branch Growth Coordinator job description is found on the SIRinc website under: http://www.sirinc.org/protected/BrAreaTools/recruitingleaders/.

The Survivability Action Team exists as an educational resource and experienced support group for Branches at all levels of survival risk. Contact your Area Governor whenever you perceive the SAT can be of assistance.

The <u>SIR Leaders Guide</u> is a synopsis of the most common Rules, Procedures and Schedules. It should be the Branch Leaders most used publication. The <u>State Roster</u> has the names, addresses, email addresses and phone numbers of all State, Region, Area and Branch Leaders. It also has contact information of all State Committees (e.g. Insurance, Golf, Bowling, Travel, INFOSYS, etc.). The <u>SIR Manual</u> has all the State and Branch Rules as well as some guidelines for implementing them.

You can even find information about what's going on in your own Branch or nearby Branches from Branch websites where newsletters and other publications can be found. Branch specific regulations should be printed in Branch Rosters and may be available on Branch websites.

The SIR website has all the SIR Forms, links to order SIR Apparel and Banners, links to this publication (SIR Happenings) and lots more.

If you are interested in what is happening at the State Leadership level, check out the SIR State Communications section for **Treasurer and Board Meetings** reports.
