
San Jose Branch 10 Orchard Valley Branch 54, San Jose

Mission Trail Branch 35, Palo Alto

Story of Charles Cook, a B-17 Pilot Edited by Rich Scholz, Member Branch 35

I always wanted to fly, and WWII gave me an opportunity that was far beyond my expectations. As a new B-17 pilot, I arrived in England on my 21st birthday. When I stowed my gear, the previous occupant's belongings were still in my assigned room... two days in a row, the 94th

Bomb Group went on raids, with none returning. That day, I confronted the realities of war.

Mission days started at 1:00 AM... then breakfast, mission briefing, takeoff, join



formation, bomb about noon, come home, debrief, dinner around 6:00 PM, and finally back to our quarters for sleep. The missions themselves were exciting and sometimes very frightening. Weather was often bad. At times takeoffs and landings were in near zero visibility... some didn't make it! Flak was so dense, we wondered how anyone could survive. One time a burst took off our rudder and stabilizer, missing our tail gunner by six inches. Another time, flak hit our bombardier, blowing him into a bulkhead... his flak suit saved his life. Another time, flak hit our top turret, spraying our flight engineer with shards of Plexiglas... he also survived. Raids included hundreds of fighters – ours and theirs – swarming all over. On a Hamburg raid, we got credit for part of a German fighter. One time over the North Sea, a submarine fired on us, blowing out my windscreen... we completed the mission in minus 57 degree temperature.

We were shot down twice, but the crew was able to get back to England. In one case, a fighter led our limping plane to an abandoned German airfield in France. In spite of very bad weather and some unfilled bomb craters, we were able to land. Later, a C-47 picked us up to return home. On one run, we barely missed ditching in the Channel, when all four engines quit, due to carburetor ice... we got them running just in time. Survival time was a matter of minutes in that icy water.

There were many more experiences, but the foregoing is an idea of what it was like. Overall, my crew and I were very lucky to survive our assigned 35 missions and forged a bond, lasting a lifetime.

A Lucky Pilot

We recently had quite an interesting speaker by the

name of **Frank Fasmer**, a member of the branch, and a former P-47 pilot during World War II shown in the cockpit of his P-47. Frank enlisted in the Army Air Corps in 1942 and completed his flight training at Luke Field in



Arizona. He was then sent to England and two months after "D" day, he sailed across the channel on an LST and from there he hitchhiked to Lyon, France, where he joined his P-47 Squadron.

Most of his missions were to find and destroy "Targets of Opportunity." The enemy territory was divided up into grids and each squadron was assigned a grid... any trains, planes, tanks and military equipment that were sighted, were destroyed. The P-47 Thunderbolt—also called the "Jug"—came equipped with eight 50-caliber machine guns, and could carry two 500 pound bombs and four, five-inch HVAR rockets. It was the largest, heaviest, and best-equipped fighter in WWII. It also had a supercharged Pratt & Whitney Double Wasp 2435 HP engine that pushed the Jug to over 470 mph.

During one of Frank's missions, he encountered one of the new German jet fighters -- the Messerschmitt ME262 -- head on. They both closed so close and fast, all they could do was give each other the infamous one-finger salutation.

During his tour, Frank flew 100 combat missions, and earned 20 air medals along with the Distinguish Flying Cross. Although several pilots in his squadron were lost in combat, Frank's plane never received a hit. Either the Good Lord was watching over him or he was a pretty good pilot... or maybe a little bit of both!

Frank retired as a Battalion Commander from the LAFD in 1979 and moved to Amador County. He now leads a much calmer life as a Master Gardener.



San Quentin--Hell on Earth Chris Lewis, Branch 47 Member

Our recent speaker was Vernell Crittendon, former



senior public information officer for the prison, seen in the picture. Vern gave us a fluid, interesting and very thought-provoking presentation on San Quentin, its history and the current situation of what can only be described as, "this hell on earth". We are really indebted to people like Vern who have dedicated their ca-

reers to this very important, but distasteful area of public service.

It is appalling to realize that there are a total of approximately 176,000 people in prison in California and that the recidivism rate is 76%! The situation seems hopeless... and, at San Quentin in 2006, there were 196 men and 4 women on Death Row. Why do so many people, in increasing numbers, fall into a life of crime? Vern quoted an FBI source that claimed that you could spot the bad ones by the time they reach Third Grade. They come mostly from single family, lower class homes and have problems socializing in First and Second Grades. The problem is how to correct this core societal issue.

One bright spot in this gloomy situation is that in times when our nation is threatened, the inmates show an amazingly patriotic side. During World War II, they made a lot of support material, including the torpedo skirt underneath the Golden Gate Bridge... and, after 9/11, San Quentin raised \$8,000 for the dependents of those killed in the attack.

Vern gave a great presentation and now that he is retired, we hope he will consider becoming a member of Branch 47.
