# Leadership Action Plan Buck Kendrick, SIR Vice President

The State Board, meeting in Vallejo on January 20, approved a voluntary Leadership Action Plan (LAP) to address the membership loss crisis. The LAP was approved as a result of extensive research on "branch aging" and its devastating impact on membership within most of our SIR branches.

Branch aging is now recognized to be the root cause of the long-term decline in SIR membership and is a situation which must be addressed at the branch level for survival of SIR, as we have known it. These findings were summarized in the last issue of the "SIR Happenings" and were presented at the training sessions for 2009 Area Governors.

The primary purpose of the LAP effort is to assure that branch leaders understand the membership crisis, recognize the unique effect on their own branch's long term health, and then take the necessary steps to stop or reduce branch aging. Most branches have failed to offset the natural ageing of its members through induction of sufficient numbers of younger members annually. As the mature branch memberships age, the branches begin losing their former energy and vitality. If these attributes diminish over time, the change directly affects many other reasons why the branches become less attractive to potential and existing members.

This "top down" Leadership Action Plan will enhance the long-term survival of currently successful branches and any other branches that are still capable of survival. It will emphasize responsibility and accountability for membership-related issues through all SIR leadership levels – Branch Executive Committees, Big Sirs, Area Governors, Regional Directors, President, and Board of Directors. It also will offer leadership oversight, training and positive suggestions to the branch leaders on how to recruit and retain new, younger members.

A new Leadership Action Committee (LAC), headed by Vice President Buck Kendrick and reporting to the Executive Committee, will implement this plan in the coming weeks. The LAC will be staffed with participating Regional Directors and others who have shown strong

# Membership Programs that Work Stan Barkey, Big Sir (2008)

Bringing in new members should be one of the top priorities of every branch of SIR. In our branch we have several practices that help with this.

We constantly encourage our members to bring guests. Our practice is that when a Sir brings a guest, the sponsor calls in to let us know the name of the guest and pays for the guest's lunch ...when the guest joins the branch, the sponsor receives reimbursement for that lunch. When the guest and sponsor arrive, the guest receives a computer printed name badge similar to the badges of members. We have special tables set aside in the front of the hall for guests and sponsors, so they receive preferred seating. During the meeting, guests are given a special welcome after they have been introduced by the Big Sir. This helps others in the branch, who may already know a guest, to come up after the meeting to welcome him.

Application forms are placed at the guest tables, so it is convenient for them to complete the application following the meeting if they are ready to join. They can also take the application with them and send it to our Membership Director.

The Membership Director has an important role since he is the one who does the follow-up with each guest and keeps him on his "Hot List," until he joins the branch or tells us that he has decided not to join.

New Members and their sponsors are invited to an orientation meeting about an hour prior to the regular luncheon. During this orientation, new members receive their Branch Roster along with a briefing on branch activities. Assistant Membership Director Arden Anderson is shown using his laptop and a PowerPoint

presentation that helps make this orientation more interesting and enables us to be consistent and thorough. We include a brief history of SIR, along with information about all of our activities. We make



this interactive rather than making it a boring lecture. Sponsors are encouraged to include their new

Sponsors are encouraged to include their new members in their table group and help them build new friendships within the branch. We have learned that getting new members involved in at least one activity, in addition to the monthly luncheon, is the key to retention of members, so we strongly encourage sponsors to help make this happen.

**Editors Note:** The Branch 35 membership program closely matches the Membership Program Implementation document that is available on the SIRinc website, which was developed by members of Branch 35.

# Happy Members and Recruiting Glenn Cheetham, Big Sir

Here are some of the ways that we recruit and keep our current members happy that have been quite successful for our Branch:

Hand out a copy of the Newsletter to all the luncheon guests so they can read about the Branch and its activities. We also provide extra copies at luncheons for members to give to friends. Its great inexpensive advertising... written by the people involved.

Identify Activity Chairmen. We all wear nametags at lunch. We added the titles of Activity Chairmen under their names ... i.e. Golf Chairman, Fishing Chairman, etc. This gives recognition to the Chairmen and it identifies the person who, guests and members alike, should talk to about the activities our Branch offers ...in a casual luncheon and social hour setting.

Identify Birthday Boys. We have a drawing each month for a free lunch for one or two of our Birthday Boys. Then we ask all of them to stand and we sing happy birthday. To identify birthdays during the social hour, we put a small, temporary smiling face sticker saying Birthday Boy on the nametag. Other members congratulate them ahead of time...they love it!

Give special certificates of appreciation from the Branch for "behind the scenes" volunteers. We have fellows who work for years without recognition in such things as finding weekly golf marshals. When they "step down" we give a framed certificate in front of the membership or at the Ladies Day Luncheon.

Constantly encourage members to become involved in activities. Remind them to just try it. If they don't like it -- no obligation -- no harm done.

Encourage new activities and try them out. Tell members to talk to friends about non-offered interests and start their own activities. For example, we have a wine tasters group ...some members then started an "inexpensive" wine group to share and compare bargain wines.

Encourage "couples" activities -- besides travel -- with ladies as guests. We have monthly activities such as our recent "A Day at the Races" (ladies loved the turf club atmosphere) and local tours of historical landmarks followed by lunch at a local restaurant. The ladies love to socialize and to get to know each other as well as feeling involved with their husband's social activities, when they are doing things with their husbands and meeting friends.

You might want to give some of these ideas a try.

We are in the process of finalizing our golf tournaments for 2009. Leading off will be our first tournament of the year in Las Vegas at the Suncoast Hotel and Casino, with three days of golf at Angel Park's Mountain, Palm courses, and Aliente. This will be our first time staying at the Suncoast and we are looking for a full-field turnout, the dates will be April 27th through May 1st.

Following this, we will be holding our Annual Reno tournaments at the Circus-Circus Hotel. These Tournaments will be held during the first 3 weeks of June. Golf will be played at two new courses – Arrow Creek and Wolf run, with our final day being at our landmark Lakeside Course. This event has grown to be so popular that we have extended it from two weeks to three.

Our next event will be our yearly Team Scramble Championship at Poppy Ridge Golf Course on August 10th in Livermore. During the months of June and July, we will be holding qualifying tournaments at local golf courses to determine the final 32 four-man teams that will be vying for the championship at Poppy Hills.

Our Fall Classic will be held at the Santa Ynez Marriott in Buellton on September 13th through the 16th and we will be golfing again at Ranch San Marcos Golf Course and the River Course at Alisal – the format will be a 4 man, 2 best-ball.

Our next tournament, will be a new event that we are calling the "Fall Classic-Northwest" and will be held at The Kah-Nee-Ta High Desert Resort and Casino in Warm Springs, Oregon. We will be playing Golf at the Kah-Nee-Ta's Championship Golf Course for three consecutive days, using 3 different formats. This will be our first trip to Oregon and we are looking forward to a full-house turn out.

The Area and Division Qualifiers for the Individual Championship will be conducted in May and August respectively and the Championship will be held on November 3<sup>rd</sup> – 70 golfers will be competing in 7 flights, with the winners to receive a Championship, "Blue Jacket." In addition we will have open play for 70 golfers on Nov. 3rd and 144 golfers on Nov. 4th.

Our final Trip will be our ever-popular Mexico trip...this year's destination will be Puerto Vallarta, in November and December. Dates will be finalized soon. We will be staying at the world famous Paradise Village and we will be playing at the well-known El Tigre Golf Course. It is the intention of the Golf Committee to try and put together a comprehensive, and fun filled agenda, of the most popular tournaments to try to rebuild the golfing membership of the SIR organization.

interest in the success of the plan.

Branch Assessment Report – In order to establish a baseline for focusing leadership attention, a Branch Assessment Report will be requested from each participating branch. The 23 branches in Region 6 completed their Assessment Reports in 2008, confirming the methodology and the importance of this effort. This report will be used as an initial evaluation of each branch's health for the long term. The Leadership Action Committee will collect the Branch Assessment Reports and provide a Branch Evaluation Summary to each Regional Director, with pertinent data and recommendations.

Branch Membership Action Plan – It is anticipated that branch leaders will review their own Branch Evaluation Summary in collaboration with their Area Governor. From these deliberations, a Branch Membership Action Plan will emerge which addresses membership-related issues unique to its branch. This will no doubt entail regional or area meetings, training sessions, and/or leadership visits to the branches.

Here is a sample Branch Membership Action Plan:

- We will induct (10%) of present active members next year.
- We will establish a monthly guest target projected to allow us to meet our monthly induction target.
- We will offer incentives for bringing in members, with appropriate publicity for award winners.
   (Examples-quarterly free lunch drawing for latest sponsors, branch payment for guest lunches, Area quarterly award presentation for greatest sponsor performance, annual Region award presentation etc.).
- We will give awards for most prolific sponsors in the branch.
- We will have a contest with teams comprised of current members.
- We will develop recruiting aids and distribute them for use.

A Branch Quarterly Membership Report will be completed by all participating branches. This report will not only standardize membership reporting but is important for the branch to review and to show accountability for its membership performance, it is also essential for Regional Directors and Area Governors, who are responsible for improving membership-related issues within their assigned Regions and Areas.

The State Growth & Membership Committee, and its task force committees, is charged with collecting and developing ideas and methods for membership recruiting and growth and in concert with the LAP implementation, will be distributing to all branches proven successes and new ideas for consideration.
