One of the pleasures of being the SIR State President is the privilege and honor to present an Honorary Life Membership (HLM) award. As I travel to the branches, there is also a side benefit. I am getting to know first hand the geography of northern California.



During the first three months there were eight HLM presentations. As I write this,

we have twelve more that have been approved with scheduled award dates. Two additional applications are on hold waiting for more information.

At the April State Board Meeting, Past President and Certificates Chairman, *Jim Donovan*, gave an explanation of the criteria for becoming an HLM and an explanation of informal guidelines that may be used in determining the qualifications of an HLM candidate. Area Governors and Directors were present and should now be in a better position to evaluate the applications as they are received. If asked, they can share this information with the branches. While these are informal guidelines, they may help a branch with their decision when there is a difficult choice to make between candidates.

We were also told that a few branches have no Honorary Life Members. There are also some branches that are not taking advantage of the two percent rule, which would allow them additional Honorary Life Members. Please keep in mind, that the HLM is not to be treated lightly or awarded merely on the basis of good fellowship. It is to recognize exceptional and extraordinary service.

If my schedule permits, I would enjoy visiting more branches to present the Honorary Life Membership awards and in the process learn more about the geography of Northern California.

Finally, remember the slogan for this year "Let's have a good time in 2009"

Membership News and Great Ideas that Work

Recently the Growth & Membership Committee under Chairman, Gary Pelton, conducted a brainstorming session, focusing on good ways to recruit new members. The following are twelve interesting ideas that came out of that session:

- 1. Visit local spots of Active retired persons such as Senior Centers, Community Centers, local Bocce courts, horseshoe pits, etc. Become involved in some outside activity that you like and talk up SIR.
- 2. Carry Invite cards and use them.
- 3. Present a perspective new member a Free Lunch Card with your info on the back.
- 4. Distribute a few fliers, brochures, and business cards. Don't leave it up to the other guy.
- 5. Give your sweetie a couple of brochures and cards to hand out to her lady friends. They are usually more sociable than men.
- Offer an End of Year surprise award to the top branch recruiter such as a perpetual trophy cup or plaque with the winners name and year engraved on it.
- 7. Talk to branch members who also belong to other organizations and ask them to contact those friends, who have dropped out, about what a unique organization SIR is and invite them to lunch or some SIR event.
- 8. Tell someone about SIR and then take them to their first SIR meeting. This step is very crucial. It may be the only chance you get.
- 9. Ask any and all of your recent inductees about their hobbies and ask them to head up their favorite activity, whatever that may be in your branch.
- 10. Make sure that when you have a Ladies Day event someone should personally present each Lady with something SIR that they can carry home such as Branch Business Cards, the "New" glossy Tri-fold brochures, a news letter, etc. In some cases widows are non-paying guests and should help out. Remember this... women are usually more social than men and they have more contacts.
- 11. If the new "LAP" program isn't for your branch of less than 100 members, but you still want to continue to bring in new members and keep them, you might do well to re-visit the long standing "Membership Program" found on the SIR website under Documents, then under "Membership Program".
- 12. The best tool you will always have is still your handshake.




Three Keys to Bringing in New Members


Senior Honorary Life Member Don Reed, Bulletin Editor



Long before the internet, cell phones, and high-definition TV, a March 1972 story in the Auburn Journal, chronicled an organizational meeting of Placer Gold Branch 37 in Auburn. The first meeting brought 45 prospective members together for lunch at Lou LaBonte's, one of Auburn's oldest restaurants.

The black and white picture below shows a full slate of elected officers at the first regular meeting held the following month at Walker's Restaurant... notice the dressy attire the men were wearing. Most folks probably don't remember that the new Branch was sponsored by the Fort Sutter Branch 14. The news story went on to say that Sons In Retirement, at that time, had 8,300 members and 37 Branches. It told about the founding of Branch 1 by Damian Reynolds

and described what SIR is all about. Branch 37 started right away trying to bring in new members, as a spokesman for the Branch pointed out how someone interested in joining the new Branch could get information and a membership application.

Today, Branch 37 is still very much alive and well with some 200 members. Its activities include probably the largest fishing group in all of SIR with over 100 members, an active golf club, and quite a large poker group. The Branch has prided itself on providing an entertaining monthly luncheon with some really good speakers and great food at the Elk's Lodge... the colored pictures, taken at a recent luncheon meeting, shows a big difference in dress and maybe also the atmosphere.


