

The future of Sons In Retirement depends upon what we, the current leaders at all levels of SIR, do to assure the long term health and vitality of branches. For the last 20 years SIR membership has been steadily declining. Current membership is at about 20,000 as compared to about 30,000 in 1990. There have been 184 branch charters issued. There are now 150 branches. Seven branches closed within the last year and



there are more about to close. There is no end in sight to these declines unless we take assertive action to reverse the trend by continually recruiting and inducting more members.

We know the mechanism of branch failure. While branches are healthy and vital with strong memberships, branch leaders do not emphasize recruitment. Over time new member inductions are not sufficient to replace members lost to attrition. Membership declines. The average age of branch memberships increase because not enough new younger members are inducted to maintain a balance of younger and older members. Participation in activities and events wanes and branches become less desirable to existing and potential members. Branches muddle along for a few years continually losing members until they are no longer viable. Then they close and the retired men in these communities are no longer able to get the benefits of SIR membership.

For several years SIR leaders have developed and implemented plans for increasing membership. Even with these efforts, branch membership losses continue unabated. In an attempt to find additional solutions to the problem, we questioned leaders of currently successful branches as to how they are increasing the memberships of their branches. By learning about their solutions, we can then train ourselves to implement the recruiting elements found to be successful by these leaders.

There are 46 branches that maintained or increased membership in the year ending April 2009 – 31 of these branches increased membership. We asked Big Sirs of these branches to describe two or more of the most important elements of their successful recruitment efforts. Most of these Big Sirs responded, and the following are answers from some of them:

Glenn Cheetham, Branch 8: The time proven method of all advertising is word of mouth. A happy Sir will recommend to a friend and trust him to tell the truth. Keep the guys happy, get them involved and keep telling them to invite a friend or neighbor to lunch. We have incentives like a free lunch drawing for people who bring quests. With our great bunch of happy quys, we feel that get them in the door and they will want to golf program, at over 35 courses, is one of the best recruiting come back. Introduce guests to membership and make them aids. feel happy.

strong leadership. We have past Big Sirs, going back to 1991, who are still active contributors and participants in our branch's management and activities. This continuity, I believe, has been retiring, we are stressing that full retirement is not necessary and is the key to our successes.

The majority of our new members are introduced by active members. Many have interest in and/or have been quests at our fishing, golf, poker and/or travel activities. Some have transferred from other Area 33 SIR Branches because of same. Important to note is: Active members will not invite a potential new member unless they themselves are enjoying their SIR Experience.

I think that our initial attrition is about 10% or 20 lost active members each year. Our goal is to average 2 new active members each month. This should enable us to hold our membership numbers with a good potential for growth. I'm pleased to say that we are on track to-date in 2009.

Ron Marguglio, Branch 128: Growth is the byproduct of an organization whose members enjoy their association and want to share their experience with others. The key to a successful branch is developing a fun atmosphere with a lot of good things to do. I believe the most important element for success is a first class agenda of events and activities. We have a goal to encourage each member to participate in as many activities and events as possible. To accomplish this we have created a new position to proactively focus attention on activities in order to encourage members to try something new. Each month, at the luncheon, specific activities are highlighted.

The key to recruiting is to have involved members who enjoy the comradeship and activities they experience in SIR and want to tell others about our great group.

Mike Vadnais, Branch 160: One thing I do at the end of the meeting is gather the applications and make it a point of calling each new "potential" during the week before the next meeting and thank them for coming and ensure that we have interested them enough to return. We also entice new members by inviting them to a "Free Lunch." I make it a point at every meeting to tell everyone to bring in "your friends and neighbors."

Tim Hall, Branch 113: There have been two approaches towards securing new SIR members that I think have helped Branch 113 grow. First, at every meeting, we stress inviting new potential members to our gatherings. Second, and probably most effective, is recruitment via SIR-sponsored activities.

Bill Shankles, Branch 145: I always conclude my input to our monthly newsletter (The Grapevine) by saying: "See you at the next luncheon meeting and bring a guest." When a member training this year. By continuing with plans previously brings a guest, the guest eats **free** the first time.

I try to have guest speakers that speak on subjects that our age group would most likely be interested in and on a variety of subjects.

outstanding Golf Chairman. Many of our new members have become members because of our golf program.

Don Mattson, Branch 35: All members are regularly reminded to promote membership in SIR at various activities to which they belong. We get many new members from church groups, bicycling and golf. As our members meet new people, they are encouraged to promote the organization. Our very active

Our town newspaper publishes a senior section and we are Pete Politi, Branch 37: Branch 37 has a long history of regularly mentioned and the paper periodically will write an article about membership in SIR.

> As many men nearing retirement age are no longer fully and that lunch once a month is not hard to plan and activities are available when they are able to participate.

> **Jim Pekkain, Branch 132:** My goal at the first of the year consisted of the membership getting to know each other better & bringing in new members. Basically it involved to just ask a friend to join SIR. If you don't ask, you don't get results. So far it has been successful....as members get older, it is imperative that we bring in new and younger members to keep the branch going.

> The above are representative of all responses and show the high level of commitment of these leaders to branch recruitment efforts. New members are being recruited in their branches because these leaders are providing leadership to make it happen. Each leader and each branch is unique. but this leadership commitment to recruitment is basic to all respondents.

> Satisfied members urged to recruit their friends and neighbors, is by far the most important recruiting element reported by these branch leaders.

> Satisfied members are the result of participation in activities and events that are of interest to them. Some of the branch leaders reported numerous activities. Others reported fewer, but very popular activities, such as golf and bowling. The key ingredient seems to be for branch leaders to emphasize and strongly support activities and urge members to invite their friends who have interests in these activities to join.

> If the leaders of these 46 branches, which are located in every one of the ten SIR Regions and vary in size from small to large, can maintain and increase branch membership annually, then most others can as well.

> According to the responses of these leaders, the importance of every other element of new member recruitment pales in comparison to:

- 1. Leaders committed to recruitment.
- 2. Satisfied members who are urged to recruit their friends.
- 3. Participation by members in activities and events of interest to them.

These three elements will be the focus of leadership implemented and by developing and implementing more detailed plans around these three elements, the goal of stabilizing SIR membership becomes more of a reality in the not too distant future. This is pretty exciting stuff. Let's all get

Looking at the history of SIR, it would appear that most of our branches have failed to share the benefits of SIR membership with other retired men. In the first 40 years, SIR averaged about four new branches per year ...would you believe our last charter for a new branch was given in 2003, until this year, when we now have two provisional Branches. Even if your branch has maintained membership, it has probably not reached out to all of those retirees who could enjoy our activities. The following ideas may be helpful to increase your Branch membership.

The **Leadership Action Plan** (LAP) has had good success in identifying areas of our branches where improvements in member rewards and retention can improve attraction to new recruits. Your Big and Little Sir can self-assess these areas in your own branch ...then you can develop goals and develop an action plan.

SIR Happenings is a source of good ideas from many branches and is published quarterly. You might want to print out additional copies and place them on your luncheon tables or even post a copy on a bulletin board for members to see at each luncheon

Some more ideas on recruiting and retention:

Recruitment using sir cards and SIR brochures

- Are you using SIR Cards for members?
- Are you using SIR Brochures?
- Have any of your members given one to their spouse for her friend's husband?
- Are you joining other branches to place Area Brochure holders in public locations?
- What is your conversion rate of guests to new members?
- Do you have an Area Publicity & Recruitment person?

Activities for members

- Is your branch mainly a single sport branch?
- How many activities do you have?
- How many couples activities?
- Do you have any Area activities?

Membership relations

- Do you use the Membership Program Implementation?
- How many new members are still with you after two years?
- Do you interview your new members for satisfaction and suggestions after six months?

Committee volunteers

• Do you have a job or committee function for each of your BEC Directors?

Self-assessment

- Based on the dozens of replies to the LAP questionnaire, you can now review your own branch efforts in three key areas.
- You can work with your Area Governor to set goals in areas you want to improve.



He kept a daily log of his hero Richard Ira Bong, who was shooting down Zeros with his P-38 in the Pacific and heard all the stories about how the B-17s and P-51s were dominating the air war in Europe. As soon as he graduated from high school in 1951 ...he joined the Air Force. He made the Air Force his career and after retirement remained an aviation buff.

Recently, he invited his Pastor to go with him on a ride in a B-17. When they arrived



on the ramp, at Mather, they saw the B-17G, "Liberty Bell," in all its wartime splendor. After shelling out the required \$430 each, they met the other 10 passengers, were given a safety briefing, ear plugs, and strapped into aircraft. Jim lucked out and had a bucket seat in the rear of the airplane and could see the ramp and tail wheel through the aft wheel well. Jim said that this was the most fun he's ever had on a flight, even though he has logged many hours on C-47's (Gooney Birds), C-124's (Old Shaky), C-119's (Flying Boxcars) and C-54's. SIR Insurance Coverage

Chairman State Insurance Committee

The SIR Insurance Committee provides the insurance coverage that the Branches and their members need to protect themselves and SIR during the myriad of activities that the Branches sponsor on behalf of their members. The policies that the committee obtains to protect the organization are:

General Liability. This policy insures against claims which may have been caused by SIR activities. This provides protection to the organizations that provides our meeting places for luncheons, picnics, sporting events, etc. This policy enables SIR to provide to these organizations a Certificate of Insurance describing our general liability coverage.

Vehicle Insurance. This coverage is necessary to protect SIR in case a SIR member is negligent when using his own car in a SIR activity and the resulting damage is greater than the member's own vehicle policy limits.

Liquor Liability. If a Branch serves its own liquor, the Branch requires a State liquor license and insurance for liquor caused damages. Our policy provides this coverage and liquor liability is included in the Certificate of Insurance provided to our meeting places.

Fidelity Bond. All officers, directors and members are bonded for dishonest acts.

Moneys and Securities. A loss due to burglary or robbery of monies handled by a Branch Treasurer, Golf or Bowling Tournament Chair and others is covered under this policy.

Foreign Travel. This policy covers SIR travel activities outside the US and Canada.

The SIR claim history has been close to perfect, i.e., only one claim has ever been filed against SIR and that involved a San Francisco Branch activity in 1995, where a member was using his car to transport a SIR choral group and had an injury accident. He was an "assigned risk" and had only \$50,000 in liability coverage, far lower than the coverage of 99% of our members. When the claim was filed, it exceeded the member's coverage and SIR was therefore included as a defendant. Two years later and after much paperwork, the claim was closed at less than the member's coverage and SIR's insurance was not affected... Whew! Thus, SIR has a clean insurance claim record and this is reflected in our low premium cost.

The Committee is a standing committee composed of three members. At this time the Chair is John Thomason, from Branch 92, in Santa Rosa. John is a former Risk Manager for the City of Anaheim and managed the insurance program for the City, Convention Center, Stadium and Electric Utility. The other members are Bob Ingersoll and Roger Borgerson both, from Branch 8, in Walnut Creek. Bob is a former independent broker who finished his career as an employee of a major property and casualty carrier. Roger is a former Claims Manager for a major carrier.
