President Buck's Column

This is my first column in SIR Happenings as President and I want to talk about what I think it will take to solve our very serious membership crisis.

Our Slogan for 2010 is: RECRUIT, VITALIZE, AND RETAIN MEMBERSHIP IN 2010.

The Mission of Sons In Retirement is to provide leadership at all levels that will result in strong, long term Branch

health and vitality by recruiting and inducting enough new members annually to grow the membership level of the Branch and by providing a wide variety of activities of interest to Branch members, to retain their current members.

I want to focus this year on developing strong leadership and goal setting. I think it is going to take new leadership from the Regional Directors, the Area Governors and the Branch Executive Committees to solve the problem. I hope every Sir in a leadership position will read my mission statement carefully and thoughtfully so we can all get on the same page.

The Regional Directors and Area Governors must assume a more intensive role in guiding and supporting the Branch operations and their membership efforts. It means much more face to face interaction with the Branch leaders...to train them and help them become more successful. Leaders at all levels must be familiar with their responsibilities, as outlined in SIR rules, to properly perform their duties and responsibilities.

The objectives of Sons In Retirement come from our charter which was granted by the State of California to achieve the goal of serving the needs of retired men in our communities. I don't think we are meeting this obligation when we let SIR diminish in size and Branch leaders can no longer provide the activities and associations desired by retirees...so, the prime responsibility of leaders is to maintain the health and vitality of the Branches so they will meet the needs of retired men in their community.

The Branch membership crisis demands that we change without delay. We can solve it together by developing and implementing pro-active leadership from the Board of Directors, through the Regional Directors and Area Governors, to the Branch Executive Committees. It will take time and a lot of effort, but if we don't do it, we won't stop the serious decline in membership that has been going on for years.

Sierra Hills Branch 79, Auburn Branch Honors its WWII Veterans Don Dill, Past Big Sir

Branch 79 honored its remaining 15 WWII Veterans for their contribution to their country during the January luncheon at the Elks Lodge in Auburn. The program was conducted by Big Sir Earl Montgomery – past Big Sir Dennis Beverage – and past Big Sir, Don Dill. The celebration began with the posting of the colors by the Auburn Color Guard, followed by a fifty-minute video highlighting each veteran's contribution to WWII. The film traced each honoree's active duty contribution and how WWII set the path for the rest of their lives. Each honoree contributed to the event by reciting a significant



war experience ...some of which became quite emotional. At the end of the program, Auburn City Council member, Mike Holmes – in his retiree's Captain's uniform – and Big Sir Earl Montgomery presented each

Honoree with a certificate of recognition for their accomplishments. Pictured is Mike Holmes (on the left) and past SIR President Jim Musci, receiving his certificate. Over 150 Sirs attended the affair, which was the largest turnout for a monthly luncheon in recent years.

Spotlight on SIR Officers

Mike Berry — Treasurer



Mike was the 4th child born into an Irish immigrant family in the United Kingdom. His grandfather and all of his uncles were coal miners and the family lived in what is known as "the Black Country" in the UK, which was mostly coal mining and steel works ...in fact, the Industrial Revolution began there.

After leaving grammar school,

Mike signed up as an indentured clerk in order to qualify as the UK equivalent of a Certified Public Account. At that time, it was possible to qualify with a combination of indenture and self-study, but today, University attendance is required. He qualified in 1960, and ten years later became a Fellow of the Institute of Chartered Accountants, a qualification he still holds today.

Immediately after qualifying, Mike decided to take a position as a computer programmer to see "what these computers can do." From that time on, until his retirement in 2003, computers were his career although his accounting background came in quite handy in later years when he became the business manager of a computer consulting service.

Mike's computing career took him all over the world. He became a frequent speaker at International Conferences and was the only speaker at the Australian Business Conference to be asked back for a repeat performance!

Mike married his wife, Jan, in 1962 and they later moved with their two children to Silicon Valley to accept a position with a major computer manufacturer. After Jan retired from banking, they moved to Windsor and in 2003 Mike also retired and joined Sons In Retirement that same year. He has been the Little Sir and Big Sir of the Windsor Branch and is currently the Bowling and Travel Chairman. He also completed two years as Assistant State Treasurer.

In addition to Sons In Retirement, Mike volunteers for AARP's free Taxaide, and teaches Traffic School.

According to Mike, he is an avid, but mediocre golfer,




and an even more mediocre bowler. He still follows English soccer and is a diehard Sharks fan. Whenever he can find some free time, he also likes to sing and play guitar.

Buck Kendrick's broad experience and accomplishments during his life have certainly prepared him well to be the President of Sons In Retirement.

He was born and raised in Plant City, Florida. In high school, Buck participated in many sports, while receiving numerous awards for his scholastic achievements ...Buck says



his only "C" was in typing because his fingers were slow.

After graduating from high school, he moved on to the University of Florida, majoring in electrical engineering and graduated with honors. He also graduated from the ROTC program and received his commission as a 2nd Lieutenant.

In 1958, Buck completed Air Force flight training near the top of his class and got his choice of assignment as a fighter pilot. After further training, he was assigned to an all weather defense squadron, flying the F-102 supersonic delta wing aircraft. He flew in the squadron for four years, until he had completed his military obligation and separated from the service as a captain.

After the Air Force, Buck joined a company involved in telemetry tracking equipment, supporting the test ranges at the Cape and Vandenberg. That company was acquired and Buck left to work for Philco Ford's Western Development Labs in Palo Alto. He stayed with the company through many name changes, but always worked in the satellite communications arena. In the early years he traveled worldwide dealing with various commercial and government customers and retired from Lockheed Martin in 1998 as Director of Integrated Logistics Support.

Buck joined Branch 35 immediately after retirement. Over the years, he has held many leadership positions in SIR ...Branch Membership Chairman, Little Sir, Big Sir, Area Governor, Regional Director, Chairman of the Growth & Membership Committee, State Vice President and in January became our President ...along the way he was awarded a well-deserved Honorary Life Membership by his Branch.

Buck has been married to his college sweetheart for 52 years and they have a large, tight knit, family of 4 children and 13 grandchildren. 


Sirs in the News


News from the Branches

RECRUIT, VITALIZE, AND RETAIN MEMBERSHIP IN 2010

Happenings at the State Board Meeting Excerpts from the minutes of the January 2010 State Board Meeting

<u>President Kendrick</u> conducted the meeting. The key points he made to the Board about the serious membership situation are summarized in his President's column on page 1 of this edition of Happenings.

<u>Vice President & Past Treasurer Mannell</u> covered year end finances. He said we ended up the year with a net reduction in funds of approximately \$3,500 and a cash balance of about \$105,000. He said we're in pretty good financial shape and have some excess funds on hand. <u>Assistant Secretary Stephens</u> reported that Secretary

Gary Gruber is in the hospital having back surgery and he would be recording the minutes. A member of the Board asked that Secretary Gruber be commended on his efficiency, timeliness in keeping the records and the website up to date and that he just does a marvelous job. President Kendrick noted that Secretary Gruber is part of a team lead by Dwight Sale and that the Team is doing a great job.

<u>Treasurer Berry</u> said he is still short a few form 28's before he can file our IRS statement for the year which establishes that SIR is a non-profit organization.

Information Systems Chairman Sale reported that one of our tasks this past year was the Data Base update to assist Branches in keeping their data electronically instead of in a shoe box or a file cabinet. The job has taken a year rather than the two months that was anticipated. A "beta" program will be becoming out soon. It will have a financial program, an attendance program, and other programs.

Publicity Chairman Schick talked about publicity for Sons In Retirement and his work with the LAP last year. He suggested a reward be provided for those who sponsor a certain number of new members. After much discussion, a motion to table the issue and refer it to the Rules Committee was passed.

Bowling Chairman Elvik handed out a schedule of the 23 tournaments that will be held this year which was approved by the Board.

Golf Chairman Drennan said that due to economics, participation in State golf events was down compared to previous years, so a focus on new venues was needed. The Board approved the schedule for 2010. He commented that the golf program does bring in new members.

Past President Mel Augustine reported he is responsible for the A's, Warriors, and Raiders games. He expressed concern about the lack of attendance by SIR members and we need to do a better job of promoting the games. The Board approved the dates for the games. **Insurance Chairman Thomason** reported the insurance premium has been lowered for 2010 as compared with the previous year. Travelers Insurance Company has reviewed our risks and lowered the premium slightly. He noted there is an opening on the Insurance committee for a person that has a background in property management and casualty issues.

<u>**Travel Chairman Perry**</u> mentioned that last year SIR Branches scheduled 139 travel events – 25 went to foreign destinations – 8 were cruises to Alaska – and the remaining events were local or domestic. He expressed concern over the many Branches that have been remiss in submitting necessary forms required under the SIR Travel Code. He also said that he has been the Chairman for the past ten years and is retiring.

OLD BUSINESS: The Board discussed the effectiveness of the Tri Fold SIR Brochure and whether we should print some more. The response was not too positive...some Branches liked them, some were just ok, and some were just not happy with them. The Board decided to convert the file from PDF to a Word document and send it to contacts in the Branches.

NEW BUSINESS: Treasurer Mike Berry reviewed the mileage reimbursement rate and compared it with the IRS rate and proposed a reduction from fifty cents to forty-five cents a mile. Because of all the work involved in making the changes, the Board decided not to reduce the rate.

Training Committee Chairman Stedman presented a set of charts showing how membership has diminished and how it will continue to decline if the current path is taken. He showed that membership has gone from 32,000 at the peak down to 20,000 currently. He stated that as the Branches get older, they lose the ability to get leadership, activities, etc to the point that they can't recover. In his view the solution is to induct 10% of our membership each year. He offered a resolution for consideration by the Board which outlines the process for membership improvement and the survival of the Branches.
