The plane, a B-17G – sometimes referred to as the "Aluminum Overcast" back in WW II days – was brought to the West Coast by the EAA (Experimental Aircraft Association), which is one of largest pilot organizations in the world. The stop in this area was at the Hayward Airport. I have never flown in a B-17 bomber and it was quite an experience. I got the feeling of what it must have been like to be a young airman in WWII flying missions over enemy territory. To my surprise, the plane didn't seem as roomy as I had expected and was very noisy. Some of us got to sit in the bombardier's seat, the navigator's seat, the top turret gunner's chair, the waist gunner's positions, and to spend time in the cockpit with the pilots. I didn't go further forward than the bomb bay, but was satisfied that I had the good experience of what it is like to fly in a B-17.



Ladies are Welcome in Many SIR Activities

This is the first in a series of articles by the Publicity & Tools Committee suggesting how ladies can be included in many of our Branch activities and the benefits of doing so.

Ladies cannot join SIR and attend luncheons, nor can they administer any activities. However, they do support their retired husbands' interests and well-being. Where space is available, they are welcome as guests in many activities. After enjoying the couples' social interaction, ladies frequently ask their friends if their husbands would be interested in SIR. Let us know if you have a couples' activity to add or if you have questions on how to start one. Here are two examples:

Four or more couples can enjoy wine tasting. Hosts can supply the wine and the costs would be shared. For example, Wine Finders in Branch 8 meets every two months, tasting a varietal wine selection like Sauvignon Blanc. Each couple brings a wine that they like, but the cost must be under \$15. Sometimes a wine under \$5 wins the most votes. Each couple also brings an appetizer. We have had gatherings as large as 12 couples, and the wine was separated into two groups of six bottles. This is a fine social event and the ladies and Sirs really enjoy it.

Any number of Sirs and also ladies can take part in the Branch 8 Heads Up Walking activity. This is also open to Sirs from nearby Branches. As most of the walks are on flat surfaces, like a bike trail, any level of walker can participate. These are one hour hikes, so a fast walker can walk for 30 minutes and then turn around to catch up with more leisurely walkers. After the hike, we usually gather at a coffee house for talk and refreshments.

Area 22 Bowling Champs



SFO Aviation Museum

Last February, Branch 4 was fortunate to have a very engaging speaker for the luncheon meeting, John Hill, Curator-in-Charge of the Aviation Library and Museum at the SFO Museum. John is responsible for all of those fascinating exhibits within the San Francisco International Airport terminal buildings. Sitting with him at the head table, I found him to be very friendly and very knowledgeable about air transport history, one of my interests. He gave us a fascinating presentation on the history of Pan American World Airways and the first flight in 1935 of the China Clipper flying boat from San Francisco Bay to Hawaii. He explained that a feature of the Museum, in the SFO International Terminal, is a re-creation of the interior of the original 1937 San Francisco Municipal Airport passenger lobby. In that space is a fascinating display celebrating the first flight of the China Clipper.

As a new Travel Chairman, I wanted to arrange some local tours, to supplement the multi-day trips and cruises offered by other Branch Travel Chairmen and those promoted in Sir Happenings. John was more than willing to lead a group of us on a tour of his aviation museum in the International Terminal and we had 18 attendees for the tour. John explained the features and history of the museum and gave us detailed explanations of the exhibits celebrating the history Pan American and those beautiful flying boats. What to do when Parking is a Problem?

What does a branch do when the number of parking spaces at their luncheon venue is insufficient for its membership?



This has been a recurring problem for Branch 8 at the Walnut Creek Elks Lodge where local street parking was limited to 2 hours. Sharing rides with other members helped, but this became more difficult to arrange for new members and applicants. As Membership Secretary, I looked for a way to map member's addresses so we could see exactly where our members lived thus organizing rides could be simplified.

The mapping process could be done manually, but with 270 members (back in 2007), it would be a major problem to maintain the map. However, a software program for converting addresses to geographic coordinates was available and that solved the problem, until the company went out of business in 2008!

More recently, mapping has been made simpler, and now using a site – www.batchgeo.com – it is easy to create free maps showing where members live, or where branches are located. The maps are created as Google map pages, which means you can easily zoom in to the street level, and in some cases you can actually see an image of the house and the streets in the neighborhood. The error rate is now improved. In my early maps about 10% of the icons were not as close to the real address as one would hope.

The upper Map at the right shows the location of all our Branch members. The lower Map is an example of where four members live relatively close to each other and could easily share rides. Additional information can be included, so when an icon is clicked it displays some roster information as shown in the lower Map - personal sensitive information has been hidden in this example.

Since January 2011, Branch 8 meets at the Concord Hilton in Concord... no parking problems now, but members can still use the maps to find a rideshare partner.

For example, the Rolling Roamers of Marin/Sonoma send their schedule to the Bulletin Editors of all the Branches in their Region 10. We encourage Big Sirs to survey their membership and if

Happenings at the State Board Meeting *Excerpts from the minutes of the June 2011 Meeting*

Remarks from State Officers:

President Bob Mannell in his opening remarks said that on his recent visits to many branches he has been pleased to see they have slowed membership losses and many branches are now showing gains in membership.

Vice President Jim Stedman said in his visits to different committees, in his ex-officio role, he has noticed that the committees are all dedicated and working hard.

Secretary Eckart Sellinger noted the gathering of Rosters from the 145 branches was laborious as over half of the branches did not meet the March 1st deadline and required a lot of follow-up communication.

Assistant Secretary Charles Moss reported all branch forms SI-100 (reporting for Corporations to the State) are being processed and the State has made it easier by allowing electronic filing and paying by credit card.

Treasurer Adolph (Gus) Lopez said the Department of Treasury is just now sending missing Form 990 notices for 2008 tax year to the branches and asked that the Branches send them to him and not take any independent action.

Assistant Treasurer Karl Ryden indicated there are still some Branches that routinely do not complete the all the information on the Form 28 and he needs each line to be completed. Another continuing problem is to get all the branches to submit the form by the 10th of the following month.

Committee Reports:

Nominating Committee Chairman Buck Kendrick was not able to attend so committee member, Dean Steichen, gave his report. He said the committee recommends the following for the 2012 Officers: President, Jim Stedman...Vice President, Richard Dettmer...Secretary, Eckart Sellinger... Assistant Secretary, Charles Moss...Treasurer, Michael Berry... Assistant Treasurer, Jim Long. The Board approved the slate.

Certificates Chairman Jim Donovan proposed listing the recipients of the Senior, Super Senior, and Century Presidential Certificates in the State Roster Website and received agreement to do so.

Publicity and Tools Chairman Walter Schick discussed how to implement and use the Area Contact and Activities roster concept.

Bowling Chairman Carl Elvik recapped the Bowling Statewide meeting held in January and said they have a major effort underway to update their Bowling Manual but are having trouble finding resources to do it. He indicated there are still 11 State Tournaments scheduled for this year and that Branch 62 recently won the State tournament held in Brentwood.

Training Chairman Jim Stedman indicated the State Training Session is scheduled for October 18th and all 2012 Big Sir's, Area Governors, and Regional Directors are expected to attend.

Membership: Vice President Jim Stedman discussed a Form 27 Membership Report for the four month period ending April 30th. He discussed several items covered in the report including there are 18,769 SIR members in 145 active branches, a loss of 122 members since last December 31st and 934 new members over the same period. He said all of the Branches are working very hard at recruiting.

Insurance Chairman John Thomason said that SIR Inc will not conform to the Moose Lodge insurance requirements and so the few branches meeting at Moose locations will have to find another meeting place. John announced that he will be stepping down as Insurance Chairman after next year.

Travel Chairman Larry Garvin said they are getting close to finalizing the SIR 55th Anniversary Event for next year.

New Business:

Growth & Management Committee: President Bob Mannell announced that Harry Hubinger has resigned as Chairman and asked for suggestions on someone to replace Harry.

Old Business:


California State Fair Booth: Ralph Lingus led a discussion about SIR having a booth at this year's State Fair in Sacramento, if there is enough time to apply and if not, next year.

Regional Director Reports: The balance of the meeting was taken up by reports from the Directors on activities in their Regions with emphasis on membership retention and growth.

Concluding Remarks: President Bob Mannell said he thought this was an excellent meeting with good discussions on all topics and thanked everyone for their participation.


