President Boh's Column

As we approach the end of 2011, I would like to take this opportunity to review what we tried to accomplish this year and note our successes and talk briefly about an area where we were not quite so successful.



In my first Happenings column this year, I asked you to Be A Friend - Bring A Friend to help SIR grow and prosper. Many of you responded and the number of guests and, ultimately, new members has increased significantly over the previous years.

Another significant improvement in membership is the result of many, but not all, Big

Sirs and their BECs capturing and using the information in the Form 27 to improve their Branch. That has given each Big Sir a valuable tool to help manage Branch growth and when used, has been extremely successful.

Another very positive and important trend this year has been the overall increase in activities available to our members. Many branches have started new activities on their own, while some have combined with other branches to sponsor joint activities that neither would be able to support independently. It is this working together among Branches that will allow us to continue to offer more and more varied activities to our members and allow us to increase the interest of potential new members.

Exactly how well have we done with membership this year? We have inducted 1627 new members through end of September. That is an annual rate of 11.4% of our membership statewide. We lost 2203 members in that same time period. The net loss of 576 members is somewhat misleading due to the fact that we have asked Branches to clean up their rosters and remove members that were, in some cases, incorrectly shown as active members for years. By making the rosters more accurately reflect the true active member count, it will be easier to assess the true membership picture in the future, but it also had a negative short-term effect for this year. In addition, 212 of the members lost were in Branches that closed this year.

The one area that has been a bit of a disappointment is the lack of participation in the leadership roles throughout SIR. I still see and hear about unmanned vacancies at the Branch, Area, and Regional levels this year and on into 2012. I again ask all of you to consider sharing your experience and expertise to help SIR remain a healthy and vital organization. Without volunteers, there is no SIR.

We have done some of the difficult things that were necessary for our future and I believe that the remainder of this year and on into 2012 will reward our efforts and SIR is fully capable of showing true growth in the next one or two years. It is due to the efforts of all of you who have worked hard to make that happen. Thank you and keep up the good work.

Bicycling has been a monthly activity since 2003 for the five Area 16 Branches located in Mountain View, Redwood City, and San Mateo. It was started by a few members of branch 35 who biked regularly on the many bike routes in the area and who thought it would be something other SIR members would enjoy as well.

The bicycling group is made up of every one that shows up for the ride, including wives and guests (see picture). Usually there are about 15 riders for an outing. The rides are scheduled for the second Thursday of each month and the ride description and directions to the trailhead are published in advance in the Branch newsletters. In addition, an email announcement is sent to those who want to be on the email list.

We are fortunate to have an abundance of biking trails in our area. We have designed eight different rides that vary in length from 14 to 20 miles. The terrain for each of the rides is mostly flat and almost entirely on designated bicycle/pedestrian paved paths, with almost no street riding. Most any bike can be used, including road, mountain, and hybrid bikes. Most of the rides are located near San Francisco Bay so there is wonderful scenery to enjoy as we pedal along the wetlands and various paths.

Safety is a priority. Helmets are required and rides are cancelled should there be rain or other unfavorable weather conditions. Stops are made periodically to keep the group together and ensure the ride tempo is agreeable for everyone.

The highlight of each ride is about halfway along the way, when a luncheon stop is made at a golf course clubhouse or restaurant. This provides time for rest and for everyone to get better acquainted and share mutual interests. Bicycling is a great way to get exercise while enjoying new and exciting sights that will pleasantly surprise you.



Happenings Travel Bulletin

January 21-27, 2012 Florida Keys Adventure

Enjoy a prime time visit to Miami, Key Largo, the Florida Keys and four nights in Key West. In Miami we'll take a city tour and a short air boat ride in the Everglades National Park. Then in Key Largo we'll cruise in a glass bottom boat through the largest living coral reef off our coasts. 
