

Please Read—Sir vs SIR etc.

Editors Note—

Every time I send a draft copy of our Branch 59 newsletter (called the Pathfinder), or a draft of the SIR Happenings, to my Assistant Editor, Fred Gotthardt, he has me change as many articles as can be change to reflect the correct usage of our organization's name. I have mentioned this usage issue previously but Fred and I thought that the information below should be shared.

Fred sent me a copy of "A SIR Primer" written by Dwight Sale in 1998 and then revised.

A SIR Primer April 23, 1998 Revised May 31, 2001

When I first became involved with Sons In Retirement administration as Branch Secretary I was never quite sure how to refer to either my fellow members or the organization in my written documents. I have not been able to find a good "guide" for this but have found little snippets of information here and there and will put them all together for your information.

"SIR" stands for "Sons In Retirement, Incorporated." Note that there are no periods. S.I.R. stands for a gay rights group in San Francisco and they do not want to be confused with us.

SIR can never be plural as there is only one "Sons In Retirement, Incorporated" even though "Sons" is plural. That is why we write "Sir" when referring to a member and not SIR as it makes no sense, in my opinion, to say he is a "Sons In Retirement, Incorporated."

The possessive would be: "I gave the SIR's Manual to John."

A single member reference is the most difficult for me. "John is a member of SIR" seems OK to me but "John is a SIR" meaning "John is a Sons In Retirement" is very awkward (probably because of the plural "Sons"). I suggest we say "John is a Sir." What this means is that "a member of SIR" is a "Sir."

A group of members would be: "Many Sirs gave their SIR's manuals to their Big Sirs."

"Sir" is also used as a courtesy title and serves to recognize the individual as a member of SIR. As an example: "Sir Dwight Sale wrote this Primer"

Combined: "SIR's activities include outings with many Branches of SIR having picnics to which Sirs' wives attend. At one picnic a Sir's brother came as a guest. Sir Dwight Sale furnished this information"

If you agree with this "Primer", great. If you don't agree, then let me know your suggestions/ideas. This
"Primer" has no official sanction and I promise to never bring it up as a rule change.



The next scheduled Kayakers outing will be at Lake Del Valle, Thursday February 7, 2019 at 10:00 AM at the boat launch ramp. In addition, other impromptu outings may be scheduled. Note that all boats used in the Lake Del Valle must be inspected prior to launch to insure that troublesome mussel specials do not invade this drinking water reservoir. What "inspection" means in practice is that your boat and all gear (PFD's, spray skirts, external clothing like wet suits) must be completely dry. Allow about 15 minutes for inspection, which means leaving Livermore about one half hour before the 10:00 AM meeting time at the boat launch ramp.



We intend to have other trips to various locales throughout the coming months. First Thursdays at Lake Del Valle is a standing event. We continue to encourage folks to propose a trip on our google group email list kayaking-friends@googlegroups.com at any time. If you do this, state the place, time, distance, and any other pertinent information about the environment and intended skill level.

For those who do not have a kayak, but are interested in trying some kayaking, there are those in the group that have a spare kayak and are willing to share. Also, if you need to share a ride in order to transport yourself, boat, and gear, let us know and that can be arranged.

Our last outing was at Lake Del Valle on January 3, 2019. After a frosty morning, it was a very pleasant day on the lake. Water level remains low, but there remains plenty of water for us to do a leisurely 7.4 mile tour from the boat ramp to the dam. Come join us next time!



"Space, the Final Frontier,"
oops, wrong phrase. "Alaska,
the Last Frontier!" That is
the right quote. The SIR
Board of Directors asked me
to write about a trip that

Luann and I took this last month to Alaska. You might ask "Why did they go northwards in the winter?" Well, let me tell you the story. Luann has always wanted to see the aurora borealis, or the northern lights as more commonly known, so I arranged a trip. The aurora borealis is the fancy name for a natural light display, predominantly seen in the northern latitudes. Auroras are produced when the earth's magnetism is sufficiently disturbed by the solar wind. The resulting ionization emits light a varying color and complexity.



Did we see the aurora? Yes, as the picture above shows. However this trip was not just a fancy light show in the sky. Here are a few other things we did over the week:

World Ice Championships: Annually held over the last 30 years, the event attracts 100's of carvers and over 45,000 visitors. The month long competition features multi-ton ice sculptures in a variety of competitions – single & multi ice blocks, single carvers & teams, and timed trials. Arctic Circle: From Fairbanks, our group flew to the town of Coldfoot in the Arctic Circle. From there we drove back to Fairbanks along the Dalton Highway (as featured in the TV show "Ice Road".

Trucker's). This trip allowed us to visit the Alaskan pipeline, go sledding in the arctic, and even walk along the frozen Yukon River in the ice-covered north. Chena Hot Springs: Discovered in 1905 the hot springs have been a destination for the cold weary residents of Alaska for over 100 years and a world destination once the word got out. Currently, the resort features an ice hotel and ice bar where your drinks are served in ice carved martini glass. Supposedly, when the outside air reaches -20 D you can sit in the 105 D hot spring and feel your hair begin to freeze. Aurora Winter Train: Traveling between Fairbanks and Anchorage, this 12 hour journey shows off the quiet serenity of the pristine Alaska landscape. Our trip features views of Denali, snowy forests, a wolf, caribou, and moose. This is the same train featured in the "Railroad Alaska" TV show. Dallas Seavy Racing Kennels: Dallas Seavy became the youngest Iditarod racing winner in 2012, and he later won the event in 2014, 2015, and 2017. The Seavey family has been racing for generations and Dallas has set up a premier kennel in the town of Talkeetna. Our group went on a dog sledding tour (even Luann mushed the sled), learned about the Iditarod Race and romped with adorable Alaskan puppies, who are in training to become future Iditarod Champion's. Overall, it was an excellent opportunity for Luann to realize her longtime desire to see the northern lights and for us to experience "Alaska, the Last Frontier."

REELING WITH RYNIEC

Winter is still here till March, 20th, but it is a good time to think about the first fishing for 2019. And, that would be Bass on the fly rod. In the Mother lode, we have a lot of



opportunities to chase the Largemouth Bass. There are abundant cattle ponds and small reservoirs that hold the Black Largemouth Bass... Sometimes getting on the private ponds can be a "who do you know" deal or pay a gate fee to get in for the day. One of our good locations is Salt Springs Reservoir, located near Milton. It holds some large Bass and for a small entry fee can provide a fun day of catching. The Bass become active in spring based on water temperature. If the water temp is below 50 degrees, you probably will not get any action. If the water temp is 50-60, the fish will bite, but slowly and sometimes just mouth the bait. Above 60 the war is on and surface fishing can be crazy. The fly rods are usually a 6 or 7 wt. with floating or sink tip line. Poppers are our favorite bait, but nymphs and rubberleg pigboats can be productive also... The smaller cousin is the Smallmouth Bass, which is active in mid-summer when the waters are warm and lazy.

Most of the smallmouth action happens in the Delta or in spring runoff rivers that flow slowly during the summer. Eastern Oregon has some great river and reservoir Smallmouth fishing. The action can be ferocious at times, because these fish have a lot of power in the water and they do not leap in the air as much as a Largemouth do. I have seen rods break fighting smallmouth Bass. We usually fish Smallmouth with subsurface baits, like; crayfish patterns, nymphs, imitation worms, minnow patterns, mice, etc. And may use and 8 weight rod. I call them garbage eaters. So for action fishing, Bass can be your ticket to fun.

Once selected to go , you attend a Mandatory Orientation where you get the details regarding the trip. They give you a shirt, windbreaker, and a gym bag that will carry all that you will need for the 3 day trip for clothing , and medication. Each veteran will have a wheelchair. The veteran will have a Guardian. One of their own choosing or a volunteer who will push them in the wheelchair and assist them when needed. There will be a doctor and nurse to travel with the group

Consisting of 25 vets and 25 guardians. The group will travel on Alaska Airlines. You stay at the Hilton Crystal City Hotel where you are served a buffet breakfast and dinner and Potbelly Deli provides the lunches. You are taken by bus with police escort to 12 memorials over a two day period and its timed so you are there at the tight time for the main events. At both SFO and Reagan Airports, You receive greetings and acknowledgement for your service in the military that you have never received before. You will never be more proud to be




