- In CA, about 500 men turn 65 every day





A "Heads Up" to Branches for 2020

- It is likely that the assessment will be increased by \$1.00 a year (from \$6 to \$7)
 - Reasons for the change
 - Increase Town Hall meetings from one to four (two times a year one in the west and one in the east)
 - Increase AD meetings with BS/LS to at least once a quarter
 - Potential hire of a person to write template press releases for Branch use
 - More frequent leader training
 - It's been five years since assessments were increased (2015)
- There is a possibility that out insurance payments may substantially increase due to a Branch recently named in a lawsuit – stay tuned



Results: Age—Over 300 over 85 years old!




Advance Directives


- Advance care planning and advance directives are gifts you give yourself and others

Advance Directives: Not as Good News




Falls




Falls – What You Can Do?

- Make sure you are getting enough vitamin D




Amount of Exercise Per Week: Kudos!




2019 Recommendations



The SIR Foundation – The SIR Foundation

- Founded in response to the fires in Paradise and Magilia
- Collected \$ 45K+ in donations from Sir members
- As of July 31 paid out 69 grants of \$300
 20 Sirs declined grants

- If there are no further recipients identified
 - Donations will be made to the two Branches to replace equipment
 - Another round of grants can be made ~\$200 each

Fiduciary Responsibilities of Directors – Stu Williams

- Responsible for managing within the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws
 - This includes SIR Policies and Procedures which expand on the Bylaws
- Conduct all activities and affairs under Board direction
- Legal obligation to use proper care
 - Perform duties in good faith, in the corporation's best interest as a "prudent person" would
 - Make reasonable inquiries to properly evaluate a situation
 - Applies to virtually all duties and responsibilities including election of Directors

Liability Exposure for Board Members of a Non-Profit

- As long as duties are performed in good faith and best interests of the corporation – no liability
 - You are protected as a volunteer, non-compensated Director
 - This does not limit the liability of the Corporation for acts or omissions caused by the volunteer Director
- In Summary, provided a volunteer Director:
 - Acts within the scope of his duties
 - Does not commit gross negligence, act in wanton and reckless ways or engage in self-dealing, and
 - Liability insurance in the required amount is maintained
- He is provided strong protection from personal liability

State Responsibilities to Branches – cont'd

- Develop a publicity program and build SIR's image in the communities where we are located
- Seven things to consider
 - Constantly remind members to recruit supply with materials
 - Train and build a cadre of Branch member-recruiters
 - Man booths at community health fairs, non-profit days, farmers' markets, golf expos, home shows, etc.
 - Participate in parades
 - Advertise in free or almost free vehicles Patch, Nextdoor, local shoppers' guides
 - Place Sir posters in grocery stores, pro shops, bowling alleys, libraries
 - Give your members yard signs
